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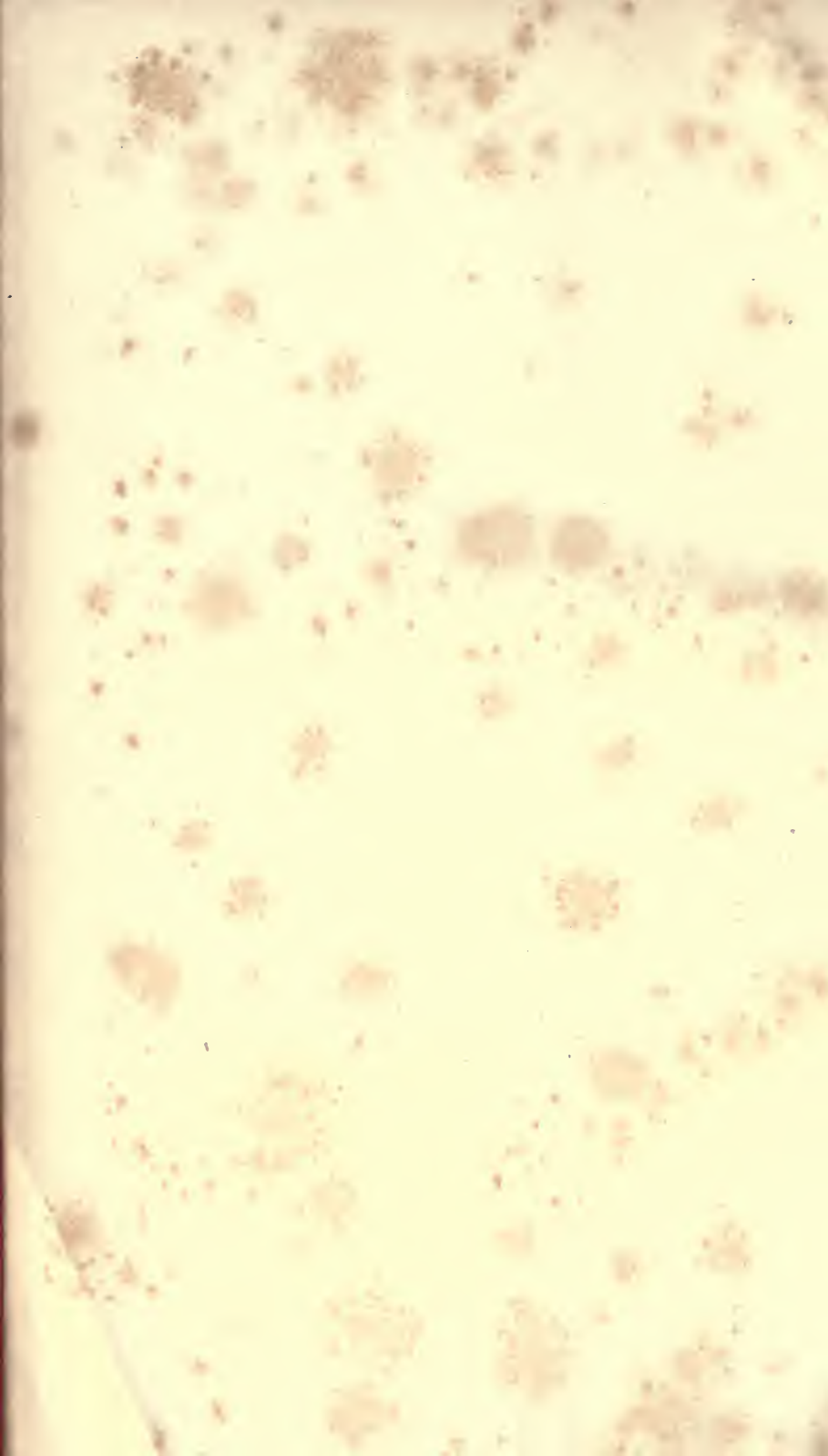
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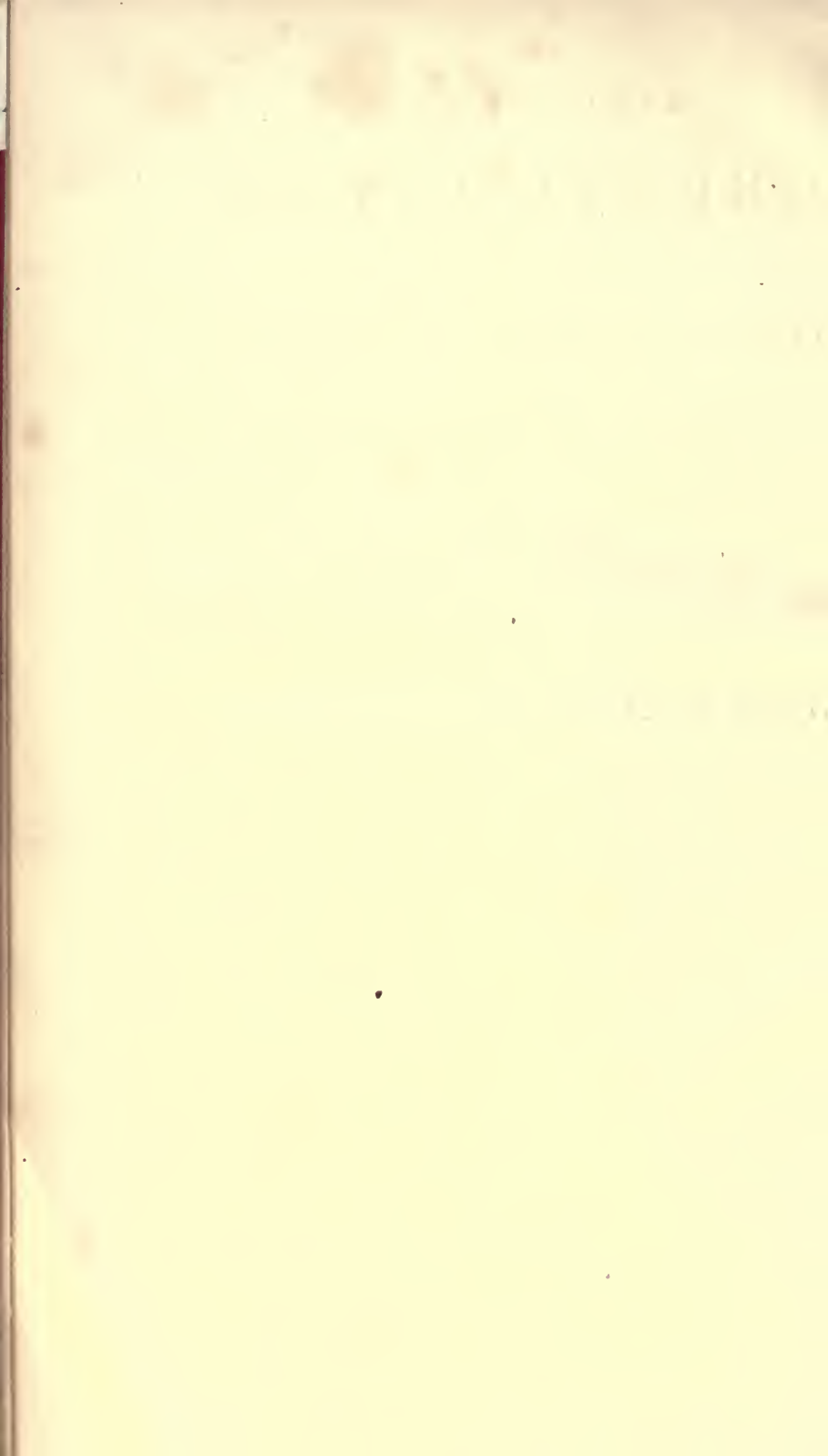

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RESPECTFULLY INSCRIBED
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THE Library, of which the following Notices include the most valuable portion, is the result of a continued and unwearied pursuit of nearly fifty years; guided by a very extensive knowledge of ancient and modern literature, and by a familiar acquaintance with rare and curious books. This Collection has been enriched from the successive sales of the valuable Libraries of Count Mac Carthy, Mr. Bindley, Sir M. Sykes, Mr. Hibbert, Mr. Heber, and others; and has been formed with much discrimination, both as to the selection of authors and to the choice of editions and copies. The entire Library consists of about twenty thousand volumes, among which are many of the earliest and most curious specimens of typography; first and best editions of the Classics, including an unrivalled collection of Homers; the scarcest Spanish and Italian Poems and Romances; the most complete series existing of the early editions of Ariosto; many books printed on Vellum of extreme beauty; a range of English, and more especially Irish, History perhaps unrivalled, among which will be found the rarest works on the Spanish Armada,

and the Divorce of Henry the 8th ; an assemblage of early Voyages and Travels from the original editions of Marco Polo and Contarini, Columbus and Vesputius, to the collections of De Bry, Hulsius, Hakluyt and Purchas, forming such a complete chain of uninterrupted information on the subject as no other Library can furnish. One striking merit perhaps may be claimed by this collection, that in no one of its branches is anything superfluous to be found ; while there is a sufficiency of information on all : and so various are its divisions and classes, as to meet the taste and satisfy the curiosity of the Bibliographer.

With regard to the arrangement of this Catalogue, the alphabetical order has appeared to us to be preferable notwithstanding it is liable both to the objection which Mr. Hallam raises against his own plan, “ that the law of synchronism which we have hitherto obeyed, bring strange partners together, and we may pass at once from Luther to Ariosto,”—and also, that the strength of the collection in its various classes cannot be viewed in its natural and proper divisions. To obviate in some measure this last objection we have added an Index, by referring to which under general heads, as for instance to America, Ireland, &c., all the authors on these several subjects will be found in the references to the Catalogue. This Index has also enabled us to point attention to different editions of the same Work, which by error have been printed under different heads ; for instance, the “ *Historia septem*

"Sapientum" is in the Catalogue under "Historia," "Ludus" and "Siete Sabios." In the Manuel du Libraire it will be found under "Historia" and "Sept Sages;" in Ebert under "Meister;" but in the Bodleian Catalogue of Mr. Douce's Collection, correctly under "Sapientes." Again the rare poem of "Hilarie on the Mass" is by mistake inserted under "Mass." The Titles have been given with that degree of attention which the different merits and value of each book seemed to us to deserve. When an early and curious edition has been correctly described in the standard works of Van Praet, Dibdin, Melzi, Panizzi and Brunet, we have contented ourselves with referring to those authors, whose works are in the hand of every Bibliographer, in preference to a detailed transcription of their remarks.

Mr. Grenville's Library contains a complete Series of books printed by the Roxburghe, Bannatyne and Maitland Clubs, and of the Societé des Bibliophiles at Paris, and by the Historical and Camden Societies, but we have not considered it desirable to include them in this work, as they are to be found in many catalogues, and are also still in the progress of publication. It might perhaps be objected that too many articles of little value have been inserted; but that has not been done without consideration; as they for the most part form portions of Classes which are particularly rich, and which it was important to exhibit in all their copiousness and strength.

With respect to the execution of our task, the entire responsibility rests with ourselves. We have only to beg those persons who take an interest in bibliographical pursuits to consider the great difficulty of doing justice to so large a number, and great variety of rare books in a work limited to the space of two volumes. It has long been a source of gratification to us, that we have been able to assist in bringing together a great part of the rarities of this Collection; and we shall ever esteem it an honour to have been entrusted with the office of laying open to general acquaintance, the richness of its treasures, by the publication of the present Catalogue, which will extend the knowledge of its copious and curious Literature; and make it, as its owner intended, instrumental, in exhibiting the progress of learning and marking the refinements of art.

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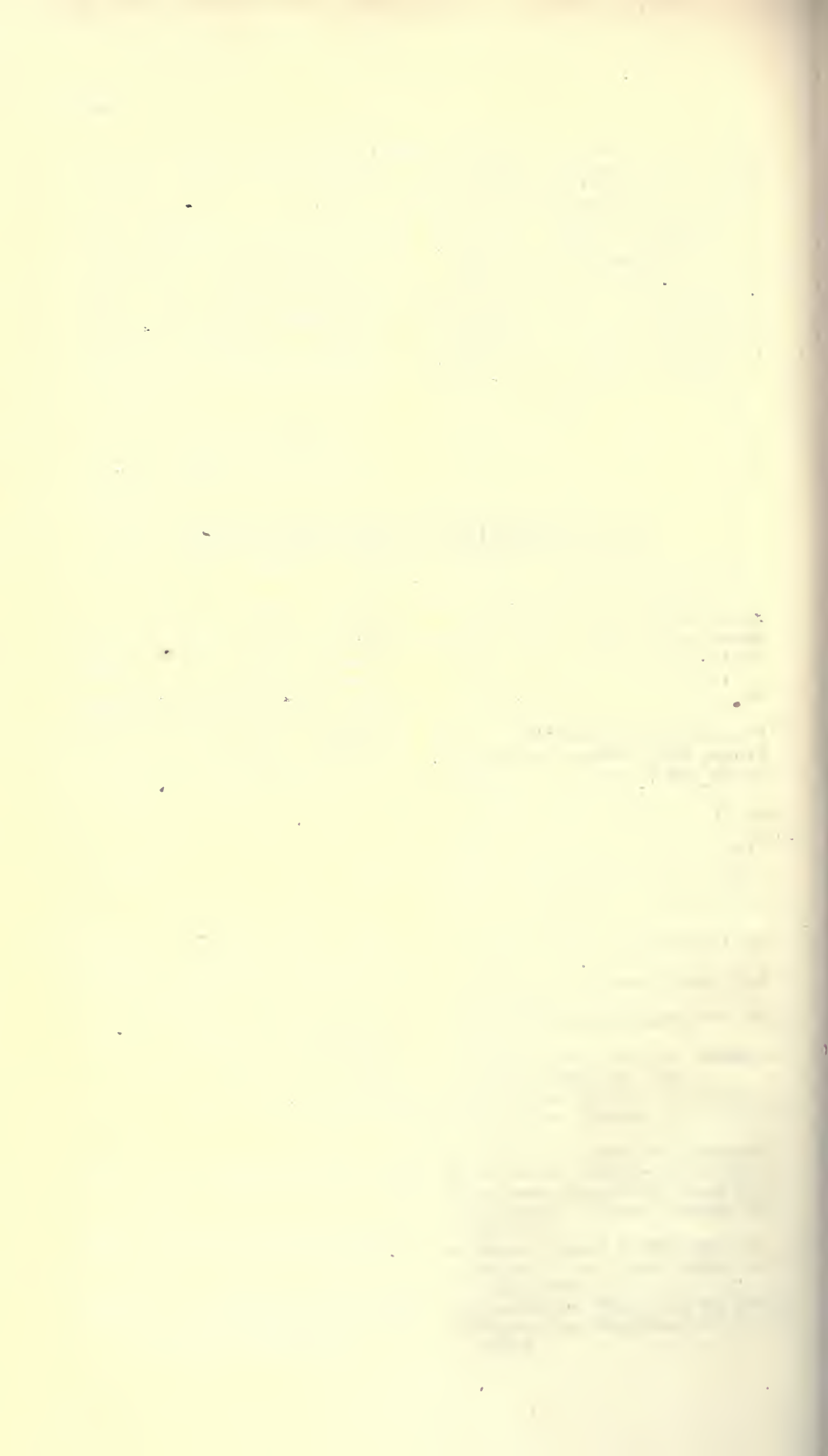

ABANO. Tractatus Magistri Arnaldi de Villa Nova de Arte cognoscendi Venena cum quis timet sibi ea ministrari—Tractatus de Venenis a Magistro Petro de Abbano editus. Finitum Mantue (*per Georgium et Paulum Teutonicum*) Anno Dom. MCCCC-LXXIII. Deo Gratias. 4to.

Fossi I. p. 1, describes this edition with his usual accuracy, and observes that no bibliographer appears to have seen it except Volta, sulla Tipogr. Mantovana, p. 14, 41, and his copy is imperfect; he says it was printed by Georgius et Paullus Teutonicus, who printed the Dante at Mantua in 1472 with the same type. An edition of this same year is found in Denis, in the Pinelli and Crevenna Catalogues, all with 26 lines in the page; this has 30 lines and 41 printed leaves. Haym Repertorium Bibliographicum, p. 2. gives only 25 leaves.

This is the First edition of the first He-

catomythium of Abstemius, who flourished at the commencement of the 15th century, and is very rare.

Herbert, p. 655 says, that this answer to N. Sanders's work "de Monarchia, Lovanii, 1571," was written by G. Ackworth, Dr. of Laws. It contains much curious historical reference, and relates also to Sanders's other famous tract "de origine schismatis Anglicani." Ackworth wrote also "Oratio encomiastica Bucerii et Fagii," and the preface to the second Book of Bucer's Works, Basil. 1577.

This is the first edition of a book which was of considerable estimation when it first appeared. The author had passed 17 years in Peru. N. Antonio, I. 801. Meuselius, III. i. 223. This work forms part of De Bry's Collection.

ACOSTA, JOSEPH. *The naturall and morall Historie of the East and West Indies.* Intreating of the remarkable things of Heaven, of the Elements, Mettalls, Plants and Beasts which are proper to that Country: together with the Manners, Ceremonies, Lawes, Governments, and Warres of the Indians. Written in Spanish by Joseph Acosta, and translated into English by E. G. London, *by Valentine Sims, for Edward Blount*, 1604. 4to.

ACUÑA, CRISTOVAL DE. *Nuevo descubrimiento del gran rio de las Amazonas.* Al qual fue, y se hizo por orden de su Magestad, el año de 1639. Por la provincia de Quito en los reynos del Peru. Madrid, *en la Imprenta del Reyno*, 1641. 4to. R. M.

The rarity of this book is known to all bibliographers. De Bure, No. 5656, quotes only five copies as known to him. Meuselius, III. ii. 16. and Clement, I. 42. may be consulted to the same effect.

Acuña, a missionary jesuit, was dispatched by the Spanish Government to obtain circumstantial information respecting the river of the Amazons, and the best means of rendering its navigation easy and advantageous. On his return he presented this work, which was printed at the expense of the King. The impression was scarcely completed, when the Spanish Court heard of the Portuguese Revolution, the loss of the Brazils, and the colony of Para, on the mouth of the Amazons. Fearing, therefore, that this work, no longer useful to themselves, might afford important information to the enemy, it was suppressed, and the utmost diligence

employed to regain and destroy the few copies which had gone forth.

Adamannus, the celebrated Abbot of Hey in Icolmkil, or Iona, about 690, received this account of the Holy Land from Arculphus, wrecked on the Irish Coast on his return from Jerusalem. This account known to Bede was *abridged* by him and quoted by him with great praise. The original MS. was *first printed entire* in this edition of 1619.

ADAMSON, JOHN. The Muses Welcome to the high and mightie Prince James by the Grace of God King of Great Britaine, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. At his M. Happie returne to his old and native kingdom of Scotland, after XIII yeers absence in Anno 1617. Edinburgh, *by Thomas Finlason*, 1618. *With woodcut portrait of K. James*. Fol.

The "Planctus," which is usually subjoined at the end, is, in this very beautiful copy, placed between pp. 44 and 45.

ADMONISHION. An Admonition to the Bishoppes of Winchester, London and others. From Roane, *by Michael Wood*. Anno MDLIII. the first of October. Eight leaves. 12mo. Bl. L. R. M.

Queen Mary, proclaimed in July, 1553, in August restored Gardiner to the Bishoprick of Winchester, and Bonner to that of London, from which Sees they had been displaced by Edward the VIth. This is therefore one of the earliest Protestant Appeals against these two Catholic Bishops. Gardiner being also made Lord High Chancellor, this book was necessarily either printed abroad or affected to be so. Other tracts of a similar description will be found in Herbert's Ames during Q. Mary's reign with the same printer's name and date. This was probably written by John Bale, Bishop of Ossory.

This book (falsely ascribed by some to Petrarch) is supposed to afford the first specimen of printed numerals; here placed in the centre of the margin. It is rare and is one of the first books printed by Therhoernen. Panzer, I. 274.

First Edition. The peculiar value of this copy arises from its being in Large Paper and quite perfect; the only other copy that is known is at Althorp, which wants the separate leaf at the end with the date, according to Dibdin, B. S. vol. v. p. 123. It should follow the *ten* leaves of Index.

A most beautiful book, richly ornamented with Fleurs-de-lys; evidently a presentation copy to one of the Royal Family of France, on Large Paper, ruled. It is dedicated to Henry III.

The Cat. de la Valliere says of this edition, "Cette édition est la plus belle et la plus complète de cette collection." Seemiller, II. 116, contradicts the assertion of its being the 'most complete,' and says that the Nuremberg edition of 1481 contains more epistles. Haym Repertorium Bibliographicum, p. 19.

This is a rare production of the press of Ulric Zell, who printed likewise five other works of Pius II, all of them s. a. et l. Panzer, I. 325, but his copy of this book wanted the preliminary leaf of verses from the Eclogæ Virgilii, which is in this copy. Laire Ind., I. p. 48.

The whole work occupies fifty-four leaves. 4to. B. M.

This edition is of great rarity. The printer who used this singular type is not

known. See Panzer, I. 93, who properly observes that this type is erroneously attributed to Valdarfer. The best account of this work of Pius II. is to be found in Freytag adparatus, II. 889. See also Haym Rept. Bibl. p. 27.

Of this very rare Tract no notice exists in any bibliographical work, nor is there any mention of any edition of these Proverbia. The type appears to be the same as that used by Therhoernen in the work de *Situ Pruthenorum*, which follows.

This is the original edition of the History of Bohemia by Pius II. Panzer, IV. p. 194. It is very rare.

The account given in Clement's note is curious and satisfactory, and shews that *this* edition contains strong Protestant opinions from Æneas Sylvius, afterwards Pope Pius.

Thomas Stanley, the learned editor of this book, and author of the History of Philosophy, and of Poems printed first in 1651, has been improperly described by all bibliographers as of a family in Hertfordshire. His father was Sir T. Stanley, of Essex, grandson to Thomas Stanley, a natural son of Edward Earl of Derby. See Sir Eg. Brydges, Brit. Bibl. IV. 361.

This Index, compiled by Raim. Marlianus and Bonus Accursius is printed in the same character as the Latin translation of the Fables, and commences with a dedication of Bonus Accursius to J. Fr. Turrianus, to whom he had dedicated the first Greek Æsop. It does not appear to be mentioned by any bibliographer, except Maittaire, who is referred to by Panzer, Vol. iv. 77.

First edition, and first in the present series of editions of Æsop; a series probably unrivalled in any private, and in most public, collections in Europe. The present copy contains—first part 70 leaves, second 69, and the third 38 leaves. The collation of the Boutourlin copy, see Brunet Nouvelles Recherches, Vol. i. p. 15, was probably incorrect.

The following is an extract from Mr. Douce's letter to Mr. Grenville respecting this MS. "This very curious MS. contains the metrical Æsopian fables usually ascribed to a Romulus (whoever he was) but in the prose preface, on the first page of the MS., to one *Salon* or *Salo*, of whom, as little that can be credited, seems to be known, as of the above Romulus. In this preface he is called a native of Pavia; but some Italian biographers make him a citizen of Parma, he might indeed have been both. In the printed edition of 1519, he is called "municipalis nostræ urbis (Parmæ)" and the editor takes on him to decide, that Romulus was only the reducer of the fables into prose. The metrical fables in

Mr. Grenville's MS. agree in arrangement with those in the above printed copy, which however contains two at the end, which are not in the MS. The expositions or prose reductions differ entirely from any other that Mr. Douce has seen, either MS. or printed. The prose preface too is wholly different, and extremely curious for the mention of Salo and his being a native of Pavia. In short, every MS. and printed copy of these fables, which were the favourites of the middle ages, tells its own story about the author, thereby making it a hopeless task to ascertain him."

The following is an extract from Mr. Douce's account of this MS. in a letter to Mr. Grenville. "It is to be feared, that about two leaves are wanting at the beginning of this most curious and interesting MS., which have contained the prologue or introduction to the fables, and probably additional matter by the translator; and it is also to be regretted, that the inaccurate modern title at the top of the first page has been substituted. The fables contained in the first part of this MS., as far as folio 100, are those which in the prologue would have been ascribed to Romulus (Augustulus), Emperor of Rome, who is said to have translated them out of Greek into Latin for the instruction of his son Tiberius, or Tiberinus. This assertion is, in all probability, fabulous; but the work is at least as old as the twelfth century, as many of the fables are to be found in the Speculum Historiale of Vincent de Beauvais, where they are given to Romulus.

"The Latin text of the present MS. differs with all the printed copies that I have seen, in having several lines added to the Moralizations, and these are often marked by the word *Additio*. The French translator has frequently expanded the fables and taken other liberties with the text, but these have rendered the work more interesting. The five last fables in this part, beginning with that, "De lupo qui invenit quoddam caput pictum" (see p. 92), are not in the printed copies of Romulus, though of the same construction as to the verses. On the other hand, the MS. has not five others that occur in the printed copies, among which is the celebrated story of the Ephesian matron. This part of the work is that which is sometimes cited by the name of "Ysopet" or the little

Æsop, which the translator has thought fit to bestow on it. The name of this translator has not yet been discovered, nor is likely to be, unless by examination of a copy in which the prologue has been preserved, for it sometimes happens that the old French poets *acrosticize* their names at the commencement of their works. At folio 102 we have the translator's epilogue to the above Fables, from which we collect, that he translated them for the ladies only, and that he was *not* an ecclesiastic. We may therefore venture to conclude that he was of the minstrel or fableour class of poets.

At folio 104 begin the fables of Avienus, there strangely disguised under the appellation of *Amouret*, which the ignorance of the scribe, who often betrays his want of knowledge in the Latin and even in the French languages, has corrupted from Avionet, the real word. The French translator, having called Æsop Ysopet, makes use of a similar term in Avionet.

On collation of Mr. Grenville's MS. of the Latin part of Avienus, it will be found that the moralities, as in the Romulus, are more ample than in the printed copies, and the French translator has taken *his* usual liberties. The last fable is not Avienus's.

The mention of "Madame Jeanne de Bourgogne" in the French translator's epilogue, has misled some former possessor of the MS., and induced him to give the composition of the translation a wrong date. He had supposed that Jeanne de Bourgogne, the wife of Philippe Le Long was alluded to, but this is not the case. It is Jeanne, the daughter of Robert II. Duke of Burgundy, married 1313 to the Dauphin Philip, afterwards Philip II. de Valois, who reigned from 1328 to 1350. Jeanne died 1348. The above is manifest from the subsequent mention in the Epilogue of Lainsne fil dou bon roy de France and Madame Bonne sa compaignie. The Dauphin John (afterwards Jean le Bon, prisoner at the battle of Poitiers) is this *Fils Aîné*, who in 1332 married Bonne, the daughter of John de Luxembourg, the blind and heroic king of Bohemia, slain at the battle of Crecy. She died 1349, a year before her husband came to the throne, after having had several children by him, and therefore this translation must have been made between 1332 and 1348, and probably near the latter year on account of the mention of Madame Bonne's children. The MS. has been written a few years afterwards. In Montfaucon's Catalogue of the MSS. in the R. Library at Paris, there appears to be only *one* of the present work, and it may be doubted whether England can produce another.

The accompanying translation of part of Köning's Dutch work (on the continuation of printing at Haerlem from Coster's types) and also Mr. Ottley's letter, sufficiently describe this extraordinary book.

From Köning's Essay on the Origin of Printing. Haerlem, 1816.

"We are of Meerman's opinion that the Art of Printing was continued at Haerlem for some time after the death of Coster. This not only agrees with the well known "*English Manuscript*," (?) which says, that printing was brought over to England by a workman in the Haerlem printing office, but is also more than probable, if we take into consideration;—

1st. That it is not probable Thomas Pieterszoon, who was an experienced workman, should abandon the undertaking suddenly after the death of his father-in-law Coster, particularly, as he could have the assistance of Cornelis, who, as an apprentice of Coster's, no doubt must have acquired some knowledge of the business.

2ndly. That some of the first printers quitted Haerlem when the art had utterly declined there: among others, N. Pieterszoon Van Haerlem printed at Padua, in 1476, and at Vicenza, in 1477. Hen. Van Haerlem in various towns in Italy, from 1482 to 1499, and Gerard Van Haerlem at Florence, in 1498. Santander, Dict. Bibl.

3rdly. But principally because the two undermentioned works are still extant; one of which, *in our opinion*, appeared between 1440 and 1450, and the other be-

tween 1465 and 1470, and which from the shape of the type, the mechanism of the press-work, and the water mark, *evidently come from the Haerlem press.*

These two works, which are in the rich collection of Mr. Enschedé of Haerlem, deserve more particular mention.

The first consists of two separate tracts, printed together, one of which is entitled: *Faciee morales Laurentii Vallensis al's Esopus grecus per dictum laurentiū translatus*, containing 33 fables, ending at page 22; and the other: *Francisci petrarche de salibus virorum illustrium ac faceciis Tractatus*. It is in 4to., on twenty-four leaves, or 48 pages.

That this little tract comes from the Haerlem press, *appears to me evident* from the following peculiarities, wherein it resembles the *Speculum Hum. Salvat.*

1st. That like the different *Speculums* it has neither folios, signatures, numerals, nor catchwords, and simply the full stop.

2dly. That the type is not only like others in the Dutch taste of the 15th century, but it is particularly like the two Dutch and both the Latin *Speculums* as well as the Haerlem *Donatus*.

3dly. That the types are sometimes founded two or three together, and are shallow and crooked in the mould, badly cut, &c., as may principally be seen in the capital M, standing constantly out of the line and often deeply impressed in the paper—proofs of the imperfection of the utensils, in comparison with those used at *Mentz*, or afterwards in the Netherlands.

4thly. The lines are of unequal length, and the pages of different breadths, &c.

5thly. That the type of a whole page placed perhaps in an oaken frame, of which the upper side may have been level with the letter-press, has caused some letters not to take the ink and left blank places on the page.

6thly. That the water-marks, which consist of a lily, the letter p, and the bull's head, are similar to those in various old prints and *Speculums*.

That this book was *not printed by Coster himself*, but by his *successors*, appears from

1st. The author, Laurence Valla's having dated his preface the 1st. May, 1438, a sufficient interval took place for a copy to come from Italy to Haerlem to be printed, and it is therefore not probable it should have appeared before the year 1440 or 1441, which was after Coster's decease.

2dly. That although the type in shape and execution resembles that of the *Speculum*, and therefore denotes the same country and fabrication, it is *in no part exactly the same*, as may be ascertained from a tracing on transparent paper.

3dly. That the work gives proofs of improvement in the art, for the printing is more distinct than that of the *Speculum*, the ink is exceedingly black, and there are no traces of blank letters."

Mr. Ottley's letter.

"I have examined this little volume very carefully; and though the characters are very rude, and of very unequal dimensions—that is particular letters, or pieces of two letters joined, as oo, œ, &c., are much smaller than certain other letters, throughout the book.—Still I am decidedly of opinion that the type it is printed with is *cast type*.

The m is, *in every instance*, larger, that is taller, than almost all the other letters, and I think the identity of numerous specimens of that character, as well as of others, is clearly to be perceived upon a careful examination. Again, the different specimens of particular *Capital letters*, nay, I might say of all of them, have that close resemblance to each other, which could not have happened had the letters been cut by hand upon blocks of wood.

Certain letters, as I have said, are *always* larger than certain other letters. Had the book been printed from blocks of wood engraved upon the hand-writing of an ordinary scribe, (for nothing here indicates the hand of a calligraphist) *defects of this kind* might have occurred in every page, but *not the same particular defect*. The writer employed to trace the characters on the blocks, would *sometimes* have erred in making one letter *too big, sometimes another*.

But although I think the characters are cast type, I do not insist that all the different specimens of the same piece—the capital D, for example—came from the same identical mould or matrix: two, if not three varieties of form are to be perceived in different specimens of that letter, and so of some others, and I suspect, that in order to multiply the type, more moulds than one were made of most or all of the pieces; which moulds I do not suppose to have been struck with a steel 'poingçon' or punch, in the way invented by P. Schoeffer, but by some other less perfect process.

I would observe, that this type has some peculiarities, which appear to me so far to connect it with the type of the *Speculum* as to justify the belief that it was made in the same printing-office from which that work issued: viz. the final t, with the fine perpendicular stroke added to the cross-stroke of that letter, and the character used to express *con* or *com* at the beginning of words, (see fol. 15), which

is very nearly the same, as is used in the *Speculum*, and in the *Biblia Pauperum*, but very unlike what was practised by the first Mentz Printers and their followers, which was more like the letter c reversed.

“ P. S. I have mentioned above that certain peculiarities in this type appear to connect it with the printing establishment from whence issued the *Speculum*— I may add that I strongly suspect that the *two pages* in the latter part of the first Dutch Edition of that work, which are printed with type different from the rest, are printed with this type. Lord Spencer’s copy of this Dutch *Speculum* being removed to Althorp, I have not now the means of making the comparison; but I find the *Capitals* in the *Faccie Morales*, to agree so well with those copied from the two pages of the Dutch *Speculum*, in a small plate in my ‘*Inquiry into the Origin of Engraving*’ as to lead me to form this opinion.

This is one of the earliest Latin editions of the author; certainly much earlier than the edition quoted by Dibdin in *Bibl. Spencer. I. 246*, of which there is a copy in the British Museum. The accurate Panzer, *I. 137*, justly attributes it to the press of Sorg of Augsburg, who probably printed it between 1475 and 1480, and has placed it as the earliest Latin edition. Panzer’s references are to Zapf, *II. 247*, from Grass, 223. See also Haym *Repertorium Bibliograph. p. 36*.

These early Latin Editions have almost all the same cuts, evidently taken from those of the Latin edition by Sorg. This edition differs from that quoted by Dibdin from *Bib. Spencer. I. 246*, and from that quoted by Laire *Ind. p. 76*, as it has 43 lines to a full page. The reverse of the First leaf is occupied by a wood cut of Æsop, and the text commences on the following leaf A. It contains one hundred and fourteen leaves.

This edition is evidently not so early as that of Sorg.

Although this edition is sine anno et loco, from similarity of type Audifredi attributes it very properly to the press of Guldinbeck at Rome, perhaps about 1476. Dibdin adopts this opinion in *Bibl. Spenc. VII. 127*. There is reason to think that the version of Rynuncius is from a purer MS. than those of B. Accursius, Valla, &c.

The Bibliographers are not satisfactory in their accounts of the numerous early editions of the Latin Versions of *Æsop*. This edition seems to have escaped their notice, unless this is the edition alluded to in Freytag Adp. III. 790, and supposed by Georgius to be printed at Milan, 1480. Mr. G. Burges supposes this to be the same edition with that of Silber at Rome, 1487, from the singular coincidence of the *t* in the word *apparet* (in the anacephalesis

at the end of the fables) being in both editions printed inversely. He also says, “*Omnes hæ editiones versionis Remicianæ eo magis notabiles sunt quod scripturam exhibeant interpolationibus Boni Accursii immunem et Græco textui convenientem.*” This edition consists of forty-two leaves, the first containing two epistles of Rynuntius, followed by the Life. There are no signatures, but the reverse of the last leaf contains a register.

In Achaintre’s Edition of Juvenal, Præf. II. tom. II. p. 77, this Omnibonus is said to have been P. F. O’Molloy vel Molloy, Hibernus Medensis ordinis min. stric. observ. in collegio S. The Duke of Cassano in his account of this rare and elegant edition says, that Tuppo applied himself to the direction of the press, especially of that of Reissinger; but Dr. Dibdin with great reason suggests that no other book of Reissinger is equal to this in elegance. See *Bibl. Spenceriana*, Vol. VII. p. 3. The present is a remarkably fine copy of one of the most curious publications of the Fifteenth Century. It contains the Life of Æsop and his Fables, with an Italian version, and a moral ex-

planation, a paraphrase, and a parallel story affixed to each Fable extracted from the Chronicles of Italy, or relative to some event of recent occurrence.

This exceedingly curious and interesting tract is, probably, unique. It is mentioned by Herbert, but he does not appear ever to have seen it. The first two pages are occupied in a description of *Armenica* (America), and are adorned with a cut representing the natives of Brazil. Then follow the descriptions of various parts of Africa, Asia, and the East Indies. After which, Prester John's letter to the Emperor of Rome, and King of France, to "late

you understande and knowe of our lande and the maner of lyvinge and of our people beestes and fowles." This last part is purely apocryphal, made up from the wonders recorded in Mandevile and the old Geographers.

The piece is decorated throughout with singular wood cuts, representing faithfully the wonders described. It is believed to be the first printed work in the English Language which contains any notice of America. The printer, John of Doesborow, of Antwerp, printed the first edition of Arnold's Chronicle, Mary of Nemeguen, and other curious English books; the present volume has no date; but from mentioning Emanuel, King of Portugal, and exclaiming against Luther, the present tract may be about 1521 or 1522, when King Emanuel died, and Luther was burned in effigy.

This book is so rare that Nic. Antonio in the *Bibl. Vetus*, II. 324, doubts whether it was ever printed in Spanish. This was edited by Sir Robert Wyngfield, Ambassador from Henry VIII. to the Emperor Maximilian. The interest of this historical tract is equalled by its rarity. The French Ambassadors at the Council of Constance protested against the sufficiency of the English nation to be permitted to send Ambassadors to the Council as was allowed to France, Italy, Germany, and Spain. Their arguments and the reply of the English are here stated at length. The English were admitted, says Hollinshed, to be called one of the five principal nations. The Battle of Agincourt was 25 October 1415, this French protestation of our insufficiency is in the year subsequent to that battle, viz., in 1416!!! The persons sent as Ambassadors by Henry V. to the Council of Constance in 1414 were Richard Earl of Arundel, the Bishops of Salisbury, of Bath, and of Hereford, and the Abbot of Westminster; in 1416 the Prior of Worcester was added to the above.

No other copy, however, has ever been seen printed, "ad instantia de gli HEREDI di Messer Lod. Ariosto." It is remarkable that the same engraving with the name of the artist F. de Nanto, which on this book by Blado surrounds the head of Ariosto, will be found surrounding the title of Besarionis Orationes printed by F. Priscianensis, Florent., 1543.

Which Armado is come to confusion through the hand of the Almighty. It appears that this famous Bull of Gregory XIII. and Sixtus V., found on board the Spanish Fleet, was printed in English both in 4to. and in 8vo. Herbert's *Ames*, 1174, but it is of very uncommon occurrence.

This very rare edition has escaped the researches both of Ames and Herbert. It contains the much controverted additional clause on the Church's Power to decree Rites or Ceremonies and Authority in controversies of Faith in the XXth. Article. In the Life of the Earl of Leicester, 8vo. 1727, it is stated that "there were three editions of the XXIX. Articles published this year (1562) by Jugge and Cawood, which have all this clause, and when it was contested in the reign of King Charles I., Archbp. Laud produc'd an exemplify'd copy of the original book, subscribed by the Convocation, wherein this controverted passage was to be seen. But by the interest and the favour of the Puritanical party with the Earl of Leicester and some other of the great men at Court, a spurious edition of the Articles was this year printed by John Day and this part of the Article expung'd.

'Twas farther omitted in all the Harmonies of Confessions and Collections of Articles publish'd at Geneva or in other places where Calvinism prevailed. And thus it continued till the death of my Lord of Lei-

cester, and then the book of Articles was reprinted in 1593 and the clause inserted as it stood in the publick Registers." Dr. Dibdin says "the first printed copy that now appears with this clause is *said* to be dated 1593." "This is a poem of extraordinary rarity, no trace of it being to be found in any of the various bibliographical works which I have consulted. In the Prologo the author speaks of it as an original work compiled from four ecclesiastical authors, whose names he quotes, and written in verse to be more easily retained. I presume that the same author subsequently wrote on the same subject in Latin prose, because Panzer, Audifredi, Denis, and Mercier, from the supplement to P. Marchand, quote *Jac. de Bangio Tract. de Censuris Ecclesiast.* Aquila, 1482. If this quotation, only found in P. Marchand, is correct, it seems manifest that this Italian Poem must have preceded the Latin Tractatus of 1482, for the author of the poem when he quotes the four books from which it is 'compilata' would not have omitted that he had translated the Latin work into Italian. It is not very unlikely that as the Latin work seems perfectly unknown, the quotation in Marchand's Supplement may erroneously have given a Latin title instead of the Italian poem. Bangio wrote also a short Italian Poem called 'Il Septenario, Aquila, 1482,' *Dib. B. S. VII. 18.*" MS. note.

This is the First Edition in the original language of the very curious work of Ludouico Barthema sometimes called Varthema, sometimes Patricius, who returned to Rome in 1508, after a voyage of seven years. See his four last Chapters. It is so rare, that no copy has occurred in the public sales since that of Crofts, now in Mr. Beckford's Library. It was translated into Latin, and published in the following year, and has also been printed in French, German, Spanish, Dutch and English. Richarderie says of it "Ce voyage est singulierement recherché a cause de son ancienneté, on y trouve en effet les monumens moins dégradés par le temps et la barbarie des Musulmans. Les peuples qui se sont beaucoup plus melangés encore depuis y ont une Physionomie différente de celle qu'ils ont de nos jours. Enfin la naïveté du style donne un certain charme a la narration et garantit en quelque sorte la veracité du voyageur." Dr. Bastwick first printed the Flagellum in Holland in 1633, as an Answer to one Short, a Papist, for which Flagellum he was fined and imprisoned by the High Commission Court, in 1633; during his confinement in the Gatehouse he wrote "Apologeticus," and "the Letany," reflecting upon the Bishops; taxing them with Popery and with injustice: for this he was sentenced by the Star Chamber, together with Burton and Prynne, to a fine of £5000 each, to lose their ears in the Pillory, and to perpetual imprisonment. By petition to the Parliament in 1640, his sentence was reversed, and his fine remitted; in 1641 he reprinted the Flagellum, with an account of his horrible sufferings prefixed to it.

and cost his Lordship 40 guineas. Mr. Koning purchased it at Servais' Sale for 27 francs. I have seen another copy in the Royal Library at the Hague. Consult Panzeri Annales, I. p. 83, with whose description the present copy agrees as having double columns, 40 lines in a full column and 97 folia without signatures, numerals and catchwords. I also concur with him in ascribing the types to Eggesteyn of Strasburgh, rather than to Fyner, as Laire had done in his account of Brienne's copy. Index, I. p. 470. It was begun to be printed in 1502 and was completed in 1517, but not published till 1522, owing to some doubts which were started by the Court of Rome whether it were proper to bring it into general circulation. This is generally known by the name of the Mazarine Bible, and is unquestionably the Edition mentioned in the *Chronicles of Cologne* and *Trithemius*, which contain so many curious details relative to the Invention of Printing. *Trithemius* was told by *Peter Schoeyffer* (the Partner and Son-in-law of *Fust*) that *John Gutenberg*, "L'incontestable Inventeur De L'Art Typographique," says *Mr. Van Praet*, had expended more than 4000 florins on this work before twelve sheets were printed. It is justly praised for the strength and beauty of the paper, the exactness of the register, the lustre of the ink, and the general splendour and magnitude of the volumes. As the earliest specimen of the Art of Printing it is so wonderful a production that its claims to this pre-eminence were doubted by many Bibliographers, until the discovery of a curious MS. memorandum in a copy at Paris, by which it appears that a copy was illuminated, rubricated, and bound by *Henry Cremer*, Vicar of the Collegiate Church of St. Stephen of Mayence in 1456.

In describing Earl Spencer's copy, Dr. Dibdin says "I consider this impression to be the rarest of all known editions of the Bible in the Latin language, not excepting that of Pfister." (This is an exaggeration.) This edition was unknown to all Bibliographers until public attention was attracted to it by the Crevenna Catalogue, where it is styled "Edition jusques ici inconnue." Panzer admits that he derived his knowledge of it from the descriptions of Crevenna and Laire, and says it was "Edit. Cl. Masch. incognita." Braun considers it undoubtedly printed before 1466. It appears from the Chronicle of Philip de Lignamine printed in 1474, that Mentelin commenced printing in 1458. In the opinion of Dr. Dibdin "the letters are here more sharply impressed than in the other productions of Mentelin's press, owing to their newness."

"Of this extremely rare first English Bible I have not been able to ascertain that any copy is quite perfect; if any, it is that at Osterley, of which however the Title Page is questionable, being dated 1536 instead of 1535. In the Althorp copy all the leaves which precede the Text are of

later editions; this copy of mine is a remarkably fine one; the three first original leaves and the third of the Prologue however are supplied by Harris. It is observable that in this Bible and in 'Tyndale's Obedience of a Chrysten man' printed by Coplande the word 'axed' is as frequently used as the word 'asked.' See Lewis, p. 91. The map is copied by Harris from Lord Jersey's and other fragments He made only six, of which this is one." MS. note.

The following letter from Cranmer to Crumwell, published in the second volume of the State Papers, p. 560, refers either to Coverdale's Bible which was published in 1537, or to Matthews's published in the same year.

My especiall good Lorde, after moost hartie comendations unto Your Lordeship. This shalbe to signifie unto the same, that you shall receyve, by the bringer herof, a Bible in Englishe, both of a new translacion, and of a new prynte, dedicated unto the Kinges Majestie, as farther apperith by a pistle unto His Grace, in the begynning of the boke, which, in myn opinion, is very well done, and therefore I pray your Lordeship to rede the same. And as for the translation, so farre as I have redde therof, I like it better, than any other translacion hertofore made; yet not doubting but that ther may, and wilbe founde some fawtes therin, as you know no man ever did, or can do so well, but it may be, from tyme to tyme, amendid. And forasmoche as the boke is dedicated unto the Kinges Grace, and also greate paynes and labour taken in setting forth of the same, I pray you, my Lorde, that you woll exhibite the boke unto the Kinges Highnes; and to obtaign of His Grace, if you can, a licence that the same may be sold, and redde of every person, withoute danger of any acte, proclamacion, or ordinaunce hertofore graunted to the contrary, untill such tyme that we, the Bisshops, shall setforth a better translacion, which I thinke will not be till a day after Domes day. And if you contynew to take suche paynes for the setting forth of Goddes Wourde, as you do, although in the meane season you suffre some snubbes, many sclandres, lyes, and reproches for the same, yet one day He will requite altogether; and the same Wourde (as Saincte John saith) "whiche shall judge every man at the last daye," must nedes shewe favour to theym, that now do favour it. Thus, my Lorde, right hartely faire you well. At Forde, the 4 day of Auguste

“ This is the First Edition of Cranmer’s commonly called ‘ the Great Bible,’ it was printed in April of the above named year, and differs from all the subsequent editions, occasionally in the text, but more especially in the wood cuts having small side ornaments affixed to them, which are wanting to the same cuts in the edition of 1540. It may also be known by the cut prefixed to the 15th chapter of Job, which represents musicians annoying a Saint. This cut as well as the eight which form the border to the Title Page of the New Testament (*peculiar also to this edition*) seems to have been taken from some old Missal. The ornamented Capital D prefixed to the 12th and 16th Chapters of the first Epistle to the Corinthians, but inverted to form a C, is also only found in this edition. Like all the editions of Cranmer’s Bibles it has the singular mistake in the heading of the 39th chapter of Genesis, where *Pharaoh’s* wife is substituted for *Potiphar’s*. Fox gives a long account of the difficulties attendant on the printing this edition (see Acts and Monuments, vol. II. p. 515 et seq.) and says that after the flight of the workmen from France, the remaining part of the impression was eventually struck off in London.” Extract from Rev. R. H. Barham’s letter to Mr. Grenville, giving a description of the copy in St. Paul’s.

In the Collection of State Papers recently published are some curious details respecting this bible, vol. I. p. 575. Coverdale and Grafton to Crumwell, Paris 23 June 1538. “ After moost humble and hartie commendacions to your good Lordship. Pleaseth the same to understand, that we be entred into your worke of the Byble, wherof (accordynge to our moost bounden dutie) we have sent unto your Lordship 2 ensamples : one in parchment wherin we entend to prynt one for the

Kinges Grace, and another for your Lordship, and the second in paper wherof all the rest shalbe made ; trustynge that it shalbe not only to the glorye of God, but a synguler pleasure also to your good Lordship the causer therof and ‘ a generall edefyenge of the Kynge’s subjectes, accordynge to your Lorshipe’s moost godlye request. For we folowe not only a standynge text of the Hebrue, with the interpretacion of the Caldee, and the Greke, but we set, also, in a pryvate table, the dyversite of redinges of all textes, with suche annotations, in another table, as shall douteles delucidate and clere the same ; as well without any singularyte of opinions, as all checkinges and reprofes. The prynt, no doubt, shall please your Good Lordship. The paper is of the best sorte in France. The charge certainly is great ; wherein, as we moost humbly requyer your favourable helpe, at this present, with whatsoever yt shall please your good Lordship to let us have We be dayly threatened, and look ever to be spoken withall, as this bearer can farther enforme your Lordship ; but how they will use us as yet we knowe not, &c.”

Again, vol. I. p. 578, Coverdale, Grafton and Grey to Crumwell send further specimens of the Bible and explain certain marks. Also vol. I. p. 589, Cranmer to Crumwell, 14 Nov. (1538).

“ My veray singuler good Lord. After my mooste hartie commendacions theis shalbe to signifie unto your Lordship that Bartelett and Edward Whitechurche hath ben with me, and have by thair accomptes declared the expensis and charges of the pryntynge of the Great Bibles : and by thadvise of Bartelett I have appoynted them to be solde for 13..4 and not above. Howbeit, Whitechurche informethe me, that your Lordship thinketh it a moore conveniente price to have them solde at 10s. a pece &c.”

A perfect copy of this edition of Cranmer’s first bible is much more rare than it had been described to be. Dr. Cotton’s list quotes as many as eight, all of which have been carefully examined. It turns out that the copy in the British Museum was that given by Dr. Coombe, and instead of being genuine, is made up of copies of 1540 and 1541, though it had been falsely entitled 1539. The Lambeth copy by the Librarian’s account is of doubtful date and wants several leaves. The St. Paul’s copy wants two leaves of the Revelations, and is also damaged.

A very accurate collation of the fine copy upon Vellum in St. John’s College, Cambridge, is inserted in the present copy. This copy differs from all others in respect

of the engraved Title Pages, for in the Vellum copy the only words in the centre are those which distinguish the parts of the Bible, whereas in all the paper copies part of the Contents is added in the Centre.

There is a very imperfect copy in the Public Library at Cambridge, and Dibdin describes the copy at Althorp as imperfect and mutilated. The present copy is quite complete and in very fine preservation. Mr. Lea Wilson is said to have a perfect copy, and the British Museum has recently obtained a fine copy.

This second Edition of Coverdale's Bible is nearly as rare as the first. Ames has incorrectly supposed the two editions to be nearly the same, but Dr. Cotton has printed several of the many variations in his account of this Bible.

The date of this rare Bible is found in the frontispiece of the Newe Testament. Printed in the yeare of our Lorde God, 1553. The only other copies known to Dr. Cotton or to Lowndes are three, viz. St. Paul's Library, Worcester College, and Bridgewater Library. Queen Mary, finding this edition printed a few months before

her accession to the throne, is said to have destroyed the greater part of the impression.

Of this edition Mr. Grenville has been able to trace only three other copies, one at the Bodleian Library, purchased at Evans's in bad condition, one at the Baptist Library, Bristol, and one in the Bridgewater Library, the two latter copies imperfect. This edition is quoted by Herbert in his edition of Ames, p. 883, and by Lewis, *Translations of the Bible*, p. 213. Lewis supposes that there ought to be a preface to the Hagiographi, but as none of these four copies possess it, he is probably in error.

The first leaf is printed upon vellum, and illuminated, and it is in the original very rich binding in compartments with embossed leaves. The best account will be found at p. 253 of Lewis's, *Hist. of the Translations of the Bible*. The date 1569 is on the Title Page of the New Testament.

The copy in the Baptist's Library, Bristol, wants the whole of Genesis; that in Sion College, the whole of Deuteronomy, and also all the Marginal Notes cut off as directed by an Act of Parliament in 1542. The copy in the B. Museum wants four leaves, including the first and last, and that of Mr. Tutet's supposed to be the late Mr. Heber's; see his Cat. Part II., No. 545, wants thirteen leaves, including the beginning and end." Note by Mr. Evans.

This is, therefore, the only perfect copy known, and is in the most extraordinary beauty and preservation. It was purchased at Mr. Wilkinson's Sale.

This very fine and complete copy of a work of excessive rarity with the 40 plates uncoloured and not pasted together, was formerly in the Gaignat and Mac-Carthy Collections, and is thus noticed in a letter to Mr. Grenville from Mr. Ottley. "The Biblia Pauperum I find to be of the Edition which Heineken calls the *second*; it has all the particular marks which he describes as occurring in that Edition. The Vignettes in the Speculum are printed from the same identical blocks in all the editions,

but not so the pages of the *Biblia Pauperum*, which were copied by tracing, by various wood-engravers, and probably in different parts. Had I an opportunity of comparing the different editions of the *Biblia Pauperum* together, I think I should find a something of spirit in the original one distinguishing it from the others. I have always thought that this work, the Book of Canticles and the *Speculum*, are productions of the same school, and the paper-marks of all the copies I have seen are the same as are commonly found on letters or books of accounts written in the low Countries, and in France and England in the Fifteenth Century, and different from what we find in MSS. written in the same century in the *central parts* of Germany, from which Heinecken would have us believe the original Editions of all the Block-Books to have proceeded. Your copy of the *Biblia Pauperum* furnishes the best possible evidence that the *two pages* facing each other were invariably *engraved on the same block of wood*. The block from which the two pages 7, 8, is printed had before this impression was taken, been accidentally *split horizontally into two pieces*, and afterwards joined together again by gluing and a white line marking the joining, shows itself strait across both the pages over the heads of the figures in the six principal subjects. At pages 21, 22, the marks of a similar fracture and joining are still more apparent in a broader white line crossing both the pages near the bottom of the principal subjects, and so in pages 23, 24, and in pages 29, 30, 31, and 32, the same white line occasioned as above, may be seen at the top of the principal subjects."

It is not mentioned by Crusius or Fabricius, but is often cited by Du Cange in his Greek Glossary. The heads of the Chapters are adorned with wooden cuts of the story," &c. &c. "It consists of Twelve Books, and is written in Boccaccio's octave stanza, the two last lines of every stanza rhyming together. The verses are of the Iambic kind, and something like the *VERSUS POLITICI* which were common among the Greek Scholars a little before and long after Constantinople was taken by the Turks in 1443. It will readily be allowed, that the circumstance of the stanzas and rhymes is very singular in a Poem composed in the Greek Language, and is alone sufficient to prove this piece to be a translation from Boccaccio."

It appears from the Dedication of this book, 1733, that the work of Julio Clovio which Bonde in this work particularly recommends to the notice of John 5th, K. of Portugal, is a Psalter originally executed by Clovio for John the Great, King of Portugal, but by some chance carried out of Portugal, and, as Bonde describes, bought by a rich Catholic, probably in London, out of the hands of the heretics in order that John 5th K. of Portugal might if he pleased buy it back again, and it is chiefly to induce him to do so that this book was written. Many curious anecdotes of J. Clovio are to be found in Bonde's book. The whole *second* part of the book contains a minute description of this Psalter, and Calendarium executed by Clovio. In his third Book he quotes as authorities for the life of Clovio, "Albertus Durer, qui vitas pictorum multa cum laude scripsit, Vassarius, Rich. Graham nobilis Anglus, et qui et ipse pictor præclarus vitas in arte pictoria magna cum laude mandavit." In speaking of this Psalter Bonde says, "pæne tot, quot habet paginas imagines continet, paginas autem continet ducentas." And again in the first part he says "regem præclarum huic pictori (Clovio) pro uno libro duo millia nummum aureorum dedisse." In the third part he mentions as particular patrons of Clovio, Charles Vth, Maximilian II, and Philip II.

The Colophon seems to have been cancelled on account of the omission of "Domine Salvos fac Regem et Regnam," which were afterwards inserted.

No accurate collation has hitherto been given of this very rare edition, Melzi, *Bibl.* p. 274, only quotes it from the Hibbert. *Cat.*, and also remarks at p. 359, that the author died at the age of 22, leaving the poem unfinished, which was published by his brother, and dedicated to Card. de Medici; but no such dedication appears to the present edition.

PRINTED UPON VELLUM. FIRST EDITION. Only three copies are known upon vellum of this very curious work, one in the King's Library, one in the Royal Library at Paris, and the present from the Mac Carthy Library. This copy was also formerly in the Harleian Library, and the following description is taken from the Catalogue, vol. III. no. 3213. "This Book is an uncommon Object of Curiosity, as it is, perhaps, the first Book of Travels that was ever printed, and is adorned with Maps and Pictures very remarkable. The View of Venice is more than five Feet long, and the Map of the Holy Land more than three; there are Views of many other Cities. The Book is written with great Exactness in the Form of a Journal, and contains an Account of a Journey to Mount Sinai and Jerusalem, undertaken in 1483, by John Solms, Lord of Mintzinberg, Bernard de Breydenbach, Dean of Mentz, the Author, and Philip de Bicken. The First part contains an Account of their Voyage, a Description of the Places at which they touched, and of the Holy Land. The Second part treats of the Manners, Rites, and Errors of those by whom the Holy Land is now inhabited. Of whom he first mentions the Mahometans, and relates the History and Tenets of Mahomet. He then proceeds to the Jews, Syrians, Nestorians, Armenians, Georgians, Abissinians, and Maronites, and afterwards treats of the Causes of so many Sects, and laments the unhappy State of the Church. The Third part relates their Pilgrimage from Jerusalem to Mount Sinai, and their Travels in Egypt, where he gives an Account of the Egyptian Custom of hatching Eggs in an Oven, which I shall subjoin as a Specimen of his Stile and Sentiments. At the end of the volume is another very rare and curious tract in black letter, being in the form of a letter, and subscribed, "At London the XIII of October 1571. Your louyng Brother in Lawe R. G." consisting of five leaves, A 3-7. On the last leaf G. Harvey has written. "The Lord Treasurer's hed, supposed to be in the conveyance of this letter missive. I heard it reported in the Court, and affirmed in London, this November." It is very curious, relating principally to the Scottish Queen and the Duke of Norfolk. See Herbert's Ames, p. 538, but he is probably wrong in ascribing it to R. Grafton."

Probably his great antiquity as an Italian Poet created an interest in him, which would not be otherwise created by his works. He is supposed to have been born in Florence circa 1380.

The author states that he was banished by the Earl of Essex, and visited, as a slave, the Ottoman Empire, &c. It contains also many curious particulars relative to the History of Ireland.

He wrote and published several pieces with this view, which he circulated through all the Continental Courts, but the writer of this note adds that all his enquiries have failed to discover any one of them extant in any English or Irish Library.

Some brief notices of this writer, who was of the Dominican Order, will be found in the Hibernia Dominicana.

Mr. Grenville has not discovered any differences of orthography in the Second Edition. They are both of very great rarity, and till these few years were quite unknown.

With regard to the merit of those Galanes y eloquentes dezires I must tell you, that in my humble opinion the greatest of them are written, with that charming beautiful (galana) and impressive peculiarity of the style of that age, which was afterwards lost to all the Spanish writers both in prose and verse."

From Sir H. Ellis's account (in the *Archæologia*, vol. 18, p. 33,) of a rare Tract in the British Museum called "Marye the Ladye" printed by Pynson, it seems probable that he printed this in English, as well as in Latin, but no other English copy has been seen, neither is any quoted by Ames. The subject of the poem is the embassy from Maximilian for a proposed marriage of his grandson Charles (5th) with the Lady Mary 3rd. daughter of Henry VII. concerning which see Hall's *Chronicle*, p. 455. Bacon's *Henry VII*, p. 635, and *Rapin*, I. p. 689.

First Edition. Though there is no printer's name or place, the type is evidently that of Vindelin de Spira. Audifredi very truly observes, p. 123, that a few very rare copies exist, with the addition of Propertius and Statius, of which collection there is a copy on vellum in the Cracherode library at the Museum. Most of the copies, as Audifredi observes, have the works transposed, and Catullus placed first, contrary to the order of the Tabula at the end of the book, by which it stands third. In this copy which was in its original binding, it stands as it is described by Laire, Index, I. p. 288., Dr. Dibdin in his Bibl. Spencer, I. 294, says, “ there is no life of Tibullus, whose poems end on recto of 29th fol.” but on the verso of that leaf is the life of Tibullus followed by a 30th leaf containing Ovid's elegy on the death of Tibullus. The last leaf of the Statius enumerates the four poets comprised in this edition in this order, Tibullus, Propertius, Catullus, Statius; they are all very rare, but the Statius is the rarest. In the present copies all of them, except the Propertius which is also very fine, have rough leaves.

The following is an accurate collation of this extraordinary edition of Catullus which appears to be entirely unknown. Catulli ejus civis (sic). The book contains in the whole forty-one leaves, and concludes on the reverse of the 41st thus

followed by a Register. A full page contains 30 lines. It is without signatures.

This edition differs in some lines from the edition of 1472, which has hitherto been received as the first, and therefore is probably printed from a different MS. Lord Spencer and other good judges believed the type to be that of Ulric Han.

Of the present Audiffredi had never seen but one copy, and that wanted the dedication, which this has, to M. de Marco.

His work was translated into German and into French, and amplified by Labat in 1732; but the original work is the most desirable, and is not of frequent occurrence.

CAVELLUS, H. The Mirror of the Sacrament of Penance composed by the poor brother of the Order of St. Francis, Hugh, the son of Angil, Lecturer of Divinity in the College of the Irish Franciscan Brotherhood at Louvain. Emanuel Telaph printed it permissu Superiorum, 1618. 12mo. R.

The above is the English Translation by Dr. Ch. O'Conor of the Irish title page to this book. H. Cavellus the author of this book is described by Ware as a man of great learning; being at Rome when Peter

Lombard the Titular Primate died there in 1625-6. Cavellus was appointed Primate but died at Rome the same year while he was preparing for his journey to Ireland. There are seven other Theological Works by Cavellus. See Ware, *Writers of Ireland*, p. 104. Patrick Fleming who wrote the *Life of St. Columbanus* wrote also the *Life of Cavellus*, 1626, Ware, p. 113.

Of the second part not more than two editions have as yet been discovered.

No. 817, in beautiful condition, and wanting only the first leaf, is now in the possession of Lord Ashburnham.

The signatures are from B to Z, and in sixes, with the following exceptions; B, four leaves; C, eight leaves; D, eight leaves; R, eight leaves; S, eight leaves; T, four leaves; U, five leaves; Y, four leaves. After sign. Z there are fifteen leaves without the usual letters for signatures, but they have marks, used by the printer to distinguish one sheet from the other. The last of these leaves has the colophon with the date, 1498. Then follows a leaf, on the front of which is the wood cut (used in the Prologue) representing the Pilgrims at their Banquet, and on the back, there is Caxton's Monogram. After which will be found Lydgate's Treatyse of Goddis and Goddesses. It commences on A. i. and on the top of the leaf, the wood cut of the Banquet is repeated. This portion of the volume has fourteen leaves, Sign. A, having five leaves; B, six leaves; C, three leaves; on the reverse of the last, Caxton's Monogram again appears.

This is a unique copy in fine preservation of an Edition hitherto unknown to all Bibliographers. Ritson in his *Bibliographia Poetica*, p. 20, mentions an edition

printed by Wynkyn de Worde in 1495, but no copy is known to exist.

Of this rare book Salva had never seen but one other copy in the library of Romana, very inferior to this, which belonged to Mayans, by whom the short MSS. notes in it were written. This is usually called the St. Alban's Chronicle, having been first printed there in 1483. It is an enlargement of Caxton's Chronicle, which was first printed in 1480. The Description of Britain at the end is by Caxton, printed with his Chronicle of 1480, and sometimes found separate. This St. Alban's Chronicle was reprinted by Machlinia s. a. and again by Gerard Leew, (see above) and often since. Wynkyn de Worde printed it first in 1497, an edition of extreme rarity. This edition of 1502 is almost as rare as that of 1497. Dibdin in Typ. Antiq. II. 71. from Herbert's MSS. says, that there are no wood cuts in those editions of 1497 and 1502. Herbert therefore never saw this edition for in it are three wood cuts. (Caxton's Description is taken from the Polychronicon.)

This first edition of Notary's Cronycle, (which he reprinted in 1515), is so scarce, that in Herbert's Ames no copy is quoted, but one in the Harleian Catalogue III. p. 392 which Dibdin truly says is a mistake; he might however have found the book in Vol. III. p. 26, No. 392. It would be difficult to find another copy that is perfect.

This copy is quite complete and perfect. There appears to be likewise a copy in the British Museum and Lowndes quotes an imperfect copy of Roscoe's which seems to have been again sold at Inglis's.

This tract is very rare and particularly so, with “the Welcome to M. Frobisher” which is wanting in most other copies.

The “Welcome home to M. Frobisher” is not mentioned in the Title Page. The “Discourse” finishes on the reverse of

K. III. with "Finis." The "Welcome home" occupies signature L, four leaves, and is the only Poem in the volume printed in Italics. Churchyard himself expressly says, "whiche welcome was written since the Booke was put to the printing, and joyned to the same booke, for a true testimony of Churchyardes good will, for the furtherance of Mayster Frobusher's fame." This is a tract of the greatest rarity and peculiarly interesting from the mention it makes of all our early discoverers, as Sir Hew Willobie, Maister Hawkins and Maister Jenkinson, Chancelar and Borrowes, which, Chancelar especially was the *odde man of his tyme* for matters touching the sea. The following notice of Cabot, who is always called Gabotha, seems particularly worthy of attention.

"And albeit that this jorney is a special thing to be spoken of, yet in reading Belle Forest in the second tome and other authours, I finde that Gabotha was the firste in Kyng Henrie the Seventh's daies that discovered this frozen land or seas from sixtie-seven towards the north, and from thence towards the south along the cost of America, to thirtie sixe degrees and a halfe, as it is affirmed in the sixth booke of the Decade." This passage has escaped the researches of Mr. Biddle in his *Life of Cabot*. Heber, Part IV. No. 312.

Julio Clovio was born in Croatia in 1498 and died in 1578. In 1556 Martin Henskirck engraved from designs of Coccius (see Coccius) Twelve Plates of the Victories of Charles V. Philip II. had tapestry made of these designs, and directed Julio Clovio, at that time in Italy, to paint them upon Vellum. Vasari in his Life of Clovio, mentions his having executed several works for Philip II. whose portrait he had also painted. These paintings remained in the Royal Library of the Escorial till the Invasion of Spain by the French and have retained the original freshness of their colours. They represent.

I. Painting. Charles V. in the centre, on the right Francis I. Pope Clement VII. and the Sultan Soliman; on the left, the Duke of Cleves, the Landgrave of Hesse and the Duke of Saxony.

II. Battle of Pavia. Francis I. surrendering his sword.

III. The Constable Duke of Bourbon killed at the Siege and Sacking of Rome.

IV. Pope Clement VII. making terms in the Castle of St. Angelo, 1527.

V. Charles V. in Armour at the repulse of Soliman from Vienna.

VI. The Spanish Expedition to South America, 1530.

VII. The Entrance of Charles V. into Tunis, 1535.

VIII. The Duke of Cleves surrendering to Charles V. 1543.

IX. Count Egmont joins Charles V. with the Flemish Forces, 1546.

X. Battle of Muhlberg, 1547. Frederick Duke of Saxony surrenders to Charles V.

"Mr. Ottley, Mr. Douce and Mr. Payne Knight considered this one of the most eminent of Julio Clovio's Works. Mr. Knight told me he thought this much finer than the famous Dante by Julio Clovio, which he had so often admired at the Vatican Library at Rome." MS. Note.

The Dante MS., alluded to in the above note, came from the Collection of the Duke d' Urbino the great patron of Titian and Clovio. It is of the Fourteenth Century upon Vellum, and the Inferno and Purgatorio contain very remarkable miniatures of that period. The Paradiso alone is painted by Julio Clovio and in many instances, perhaps from the difficulty of the subjects, not very successfully. The Va-

tican Library also contains, a Life of the Duke of Urbino, a Fol. Volume upon Vellum with two glorious Miniatures by Clovio, but his chef d'œuvre is in the Royal Library at Naples. It is a Roman Missal in 12mo. painted for Cardinal Farnese and contains in Clovio's hand-writing, a dedication to the Cardinal, dated 1547, and signed "Julius Clovius Macedo." The Calendar and almost every page is ornamented in a most exquisite manner and in many instances the figures justify the expression of Vasari "non eccedevano la misura di una picciola formica."

It appears to have been originally written in Spanish, and was in the same year translated into Latin by Aleander de Cosco, and printed at Rome by Eucharius Argenteus. Whether the edition with or without date is the prior of the two seems difficult to decide. This is the rarest.

The French translator of Navarrete's Columbus, II. 363, ventures to accuse Bossi of errors in his copy of the Milan letter, though he had never seen any one of the original editions. Bossi's copy is quite correct, and the French criticism is totally unfounded. Hitherto no third copy of this small edition has been seen.

"This edition is of much greater curiosity than the preceding. The 4th page quotes the assent of the Scotch Protestant Church from letters to Beza in 1566, which seems singular, because the famous twenty-five articles of the Scotch Church had been ratified by the Scotch Parliament in 1560, but Knox in his Hist. of the Church of Scotland p. 436. says Nov. 1566; "The Churches of Geneva, Berne and Basil, with other reformed Churches of Germany and France sent to the whole Church of Scotland the sum of the confession of their Faith, desiring to know if they agreed in the uniformity of doctrine, alleging that the Church of Scotland was dissonant in some Articles from them." It is evident that this *Confessio Fidei* is that alluded to by Knox. I have seen no other copy of this edition of 1568. A copy is quoted by Hartshorne as being in the Public Library at Cambridge of the Scotch Confession 1561, but none of this of 1568. p. 167." MS. Note.

In Knox's History they are quoted as 25.

Herbert in his Ames I. 216 quotes a copy of Six leaves ending with "Mercy Lorde I will amende" (being the end of the eight leaf) which he inclines to think is perfect, and Dibdin, in his Edition of Ames, II. 341. adopts his opinion: a perfect copy being unknown to them.

This work, highly praised by Palmyreno, was prohibited by the Spanish Inquisition. This is one of three publications that were objected to Lord Strafford by the Scottish Covenanters at his Trial. See Rushworth. The Author was T. Corbet, Minister of Bonyl in Scotland, who having fled into Ireland, for fear of the Covenanters, was murdered there in 1641. This author is a different person from T. Corbet of Magdalen Hall, Oxford, who is mentioned by Wood.

This is the Dedication copy presented to Prince Henry by the Author. It is bound in red velvet, and the original cipher H. P. on the sides has been preserved. The cuts are also coloured. By the Prince it was given to his Chaplain, Mr. Pomfret, from whom it descended to Mr. N. Pomfret Williams, who in 1796 gave it to the Revd. Hugh Cholmondeley, and at his death it was given by his bro-

ther, Thomas Cholmondeley, Esq. of Vale Royal, to Mr. Grenville. There has since been subjoined to this book a curious letter in MS. from the author, Thomas Coryat to Sir Michael Hixe, in which he desires his influence to obtain a license for this book, 15th Novr. 1610. The Preliminary and laudatory verses which precede this work were reprinted by T. Thorpe, 1611, under the Title of the “*Odcombian Banquet*,” without the Travels. They contain no additional poetry, and the Greek Epigram by Farnaby at g. 4 in this book is omitted in the “*Odcombian Banquet*.”

Meuselius supposes the fourth never to have been printed separately, and in truth, of it there are not three perfect copies known in England. The present copy has the second as well as the first edition of the second letter printed in 1523, an edition unknown to Panzer. It has been completed from that at Heber's Sale, and is now, perhaps, the only perfect copy in this country. It should be observed that Meuselius could not have seen the first edition of the second letter, which he quotes as having fourteen, whereas it has twenty-eight leaves.” MS. note.

It is dedicated to the *Eletti* (viz. the Magistrates *elected* by the people) of the city of Naples. Caraccioli was one of them, but his name is followed by those of four others in Tупpo's address, which address is not in the Neapolitan Dialect, but in a kind of bastard Italian, somewhat tinged with the writer's Dialect. Have you observed that Tупpo says, that he has caused several law Books to be printed by the Germans (undoubtedly Reusinger.) I have never heard of such publications before. The text also of this edition is very remarkable for its excellent various readings, so that in every respect this is an addition to your collection, and worthy of it, and no more can be said in its praise."

This important Collection should not be regarded merely as a book of curiosity on account of the number of its Engravings, and the extreme difficulty of forming a complete and well preserved copy. These Histories of Voyages and Travels made several Centuries back, in countries a large part of which are even now imperfectly known, contain, in the midst of a multitude of fabulous details, very interesting particulars and valuable information, of which they are the primitive and in some instances the only source. Many subsequent travellers are said to have eked out their own personal knowledge of the countries they have described by copious and unacknowledged extracts from these volumes. Doubtless the astonishment produced by the novelty of the objects around them, would easily lead into exaggeration the first discoverers of these distant countries, but they had the peculiar advantage of seeing them in their primitive state, before the changes of all kinds produced by the subsequent and often calamitous visits of the nations of the old world. De Bry's Collection is especially useful in the present day, for the purpose of instituting comparison between his narratives and those of modern travellers to the same countries, and many of his statements formerly reputed fabulous or exaggerated have been confirmed by more recent accounts.

The present copy was originally formed by Mr. De Bure at Paris in eight volumes, and purchased by Mr. Payne about the year 1790, when it was considered a complete copy, but since then Mr. Grenville has lost no opportunity of procuring from a variety of other copies whatever the Memoire of Camus (published by order of the Institute in 1802) or his own observation could supply to make it still more perfect.

The following details respecting the contents of this extraordinary copy will be read with interest, more especially as no account of these Voyages has been published by English Bibliographers. We commence with Hariot's Virginia, the first

publication of De Bry, and which probably suggested the collection to him.

THIS FORMS THE FIRST PART OF THE VOYAGES TO THE WEST INDIES OR GRANDS VOYAGES. Previously to its being added to the Collection it was separately printed in French, and verbatim from this 4to. in English, in Latin, and German by De Bry at Frankfort in 1590, as hereafter described.

This edition is so rare as to be quoted only in Wood's *Athenæ Oxonienses* by Bliss, II. p. 301, but is unknown to all modern bibliographers. The only other copy which has been seen is one in the Bodleian Library. "Thomas Hariot or Harriot tumbled out of his mother's womb into the lap of the Oxonian muses anno 1560." Wood. He was in Virginia with Sir W. Raleigh and died in 1621.

This is the only part of the Collection that was published in French, and by the date of the Dedication, 24 March, 1590, it appears to be prior to the English Virginia of 1 April, 1590, to the Latin Virginia Kal. April, 1590, and to the German Edition of 3 April, 1590. The French Edition is even rarer than the English; not more than four or five copies are known.

Next is to the Reader wherein he sets forth that Sir Walter had at his own expence undertaken the discovery in 1584, was there himself sundry times, as first in 1584, then 1585, then in 1586, and now of late this last year 1587.*

The book is divided into three parts. The First part treats of *Merchantable Commodities*, as 'tis intitl'd—but it properly is, a Natural history of the Country from the Observations then made. The Second part is intitl'd, Of such Commodities as Virginia is Known to Yeelede for Victuall and Sustenâce of Mans life. The Third and last part is a description of the manners of the people—and advice to those who shall plant and Inhabit there. Next follows the Conclusion which is dated February, 1588. Then comes another title page as follows, The True pictures and fashions of the people in that parte of America now called Virginia discovered by Englishmen sent thither in the year of our Lord 1585 at the Special charge and direction of the Honble Sir Walter Raleigh Knt. Lord Warden of the Stanneries in the Duchies of Corenwal and Oxford who therein hath bynne favor'd and auctorised by her Majestie and her Letters patents. Translated out of Latin into English by Richard Hackluit.

Diligently Collected and drawne by John White who was sent thither speciallye and for the same purpose by the said Sir Walter Raleigh the year abovesaid 1585 and also the year 1588. Now cut in copper and first published by Theodore De Bry at his Own charge.

The gravings are very well performed, and to each print there is a printed description, describing the same.—After which is added 5 prints of the Ancient Picts which Mr. John White sent Theodore de Bry, saying he took them from an Old Chronicle.

Then there is an Alphabetical Table of Contents. After which comes the Errata.

Camus, p. 39, requires for Plate 4 that in which a great *S* begins the text, and for Plate 9 that which has 8 lines of text at the bottom; and for Plate 15 that which has 11 lines at bottom; but DeBure does not, and this volume has been selected as being the best impressions, and agreeing with De Bure.

Pars II. 1591. Camus, p. 44, after Plate 42 requires a leaf with the date of

year and place which is not described by De Bure.

Pars III. 1593. Camus, p. 57, is mistaken in saying that p. 144 is of the 2d Edition if it has the Adam and Eve, because that plate will be found to have the mark of the "retouche" "Jo" Theodore de Bry fecit, in this copy p. 144 has the Original plate with "Theodore de Bry fecit" he likewise mistakes in referring in p. 57 to *Tumum* p. 248 as an error in the 1st Edition. This 1st Edition has not the error, but the 2d Edition has; this error therefore distinguishes the 2d Edition.

Pars IV. 1594. In this copy the map of The W. of America precedes the Text instead of preceding the 24 Plates.

Pars V. 1595. This copy has a duplicate Preface and Argument, as Camus and Rothelin differ in opinion as to which is of the first Edition, the head of Columbus is much the finest, where it is followed by 11 lines of text, instead of 13.

Pars VI. 1596. In this copy the map fronts Cap: 2. The Frontispiece to the Plates has the additional Title pasted on, which, according to Camus and De Bure, very rarely occurs.

Pars VII. 1599.

Pars VIII. 1599. In this copy, at p. 78, and at p. 3 of the subsequent Preface, each of these leaves has a small map subjoined to the bottom of the leaf; they are so rare that they are not in the very numerous collection of De Bry in the Royal Library at Paris, nor does Camus appear to have ever seen them, though he quotes l'Abbé Rothelin for their Existence.

Pars XI. 1619. De Bure places after the 9 Plates of this Part, the Map of the Fretum Magellanicum: but Camus does not agree in this. In truth the same Plate being previously used in the 9th Part, and again subsequently in the 13th Part, seems unnecessary to be inserted a third time. According to Camus every copy of the Appendix to this Part is on discoloured paper; the Appendix likewise has in the 2nd Plate the Fretum Magellanicum, which seems to prove that Camus is right in not inserting it after the 9 Plates.

Pars XII. 1624. Camus says of p. 130 that this is generally pasted on, but in this copy it is Engraved on the leaf.

Pars XIII. 1634. These two last parts are excessively rare, and generally found in very bad condition and without the Maps.

Pars VII. 1606, Camus, p. 224, mentions three variations of Dedications, all of which are in the two editions of this Collection, but he is mistaken in describing the Plates as not having numbers or cyphers; in this copy most of them have numbers, and many of them have cyphers.

Pars VIII. 1607.

Pars IX. 1612. There are two Frontispieces which differ, both of which are found in the two editions of this collection. In this copy also are the Plates of St. Helena and Mosambique, which are noticed by Camus, p. 246, but were unknown to De Bure. According to Camus the third Plate of the Suppt. should have the city on the right. It is so in the copy of the first German Edition.

Pars XI. 1619. The seventh Plate in this copy is the true one; extremely rare.

This first edition in German is so rare that Camus, p. 17, says he had never seen it, neither is it in the very voluminous collection of De Bry in the National Library at Paris. In the Register of this Edition, twenty-three plates are marked, because in this the Map is included, the Register of the 2d edition marks twenty-two plates, not including the map. The text of this is of thirty-three pages; in the 2d only of 31 pp. It is remarkable that plain Dietrich Bry in the title page of the *first* part assumes in the subsequent ones the title of Dietrich von Bry or Theodorus de Bry.

some of the plates of this part appear to be wanting in this first ed. :—they are all in the 2d edit. but of an inferior impression. The Register at the end of this part in this 1st ed. has the subscription of Feyerabend, which is not in the 2d edit.

The last line of the first page of Dedication shews by its difference, that the other is a reprint, and so of the following Ad Lectorem. After that, in this 1st ed. is a plate of 7 coats of arms, not in the 2d edit.—Plate 1, in this 1st ed. differs from that in the 2d ed.—leaf 84 seems wanting, but is in the 2d ed. The 11th and 12th Parts when printed first and separately by Fitzer have Title-pages and Dedications, as may be seen by reference to the copy of them in this collection.

When printed with this Abridgement, they have no titles or dedications, but they have at p. 18 of the 12th part, a map of China, at p. 55, a plate of Macao, and in the 13th part, at p. 106, a Map of the E. Indies, none of which are to be found in the 12th or 13th parts, as at first published in German.

Robert Dudley, was the son of Robert, Earl of Leicester, by Lady Douglas Sheffield; his father dying in 1588, his legitimacy was disputed in the Star Chamber, by the influence of his mother-in-law; he left England in disgust, and settled at Florence, where he was created Duke of Northumberland, by the Emperor Ferdinand II.; he died at Florence in 1649, having lived to publish this extraordinary book. I intend to bring downe with me all those transcripts from your old evidences and, upon my returne to perfect that business before Christmasse, wishing heartily that you were here, if it were but one day and two nights, that I might confer with you and consult about it. When I returne I will advertise you thereof by a Letter.

I have had a very grievous losse there by this wofull fire, in my own particular; for though my study was saved, as were the Bookes of our publiq office, I lost about 300 of my Bookes of the History of Pauls, and about 500 of those of my History of the fenns and some of the monasticons, all which were in the rooms above my lodgings, besides some considerable Household Goods and furniture: but my greatest losse was in Foster lane at my printers; where the whole Impression, within a very few that were sent and given to my friends, and delivered to some Booksellers of my last Booke, intituled *Origines Juridicales* (whereof I sent Mr. Crew of

Utkinton one) as also the greatest part of Sir Henry Spelman's Glossary and Councils, which were unsold, and wherein I was to have had my share, in regard of my extraordinary paynes in perfecting the latter, and care of them at the presse, was consumed by the fyre. This is a sad story; but there is no help but patience. Sr I beseech you to present my best service to my worthy friends your good neighbours, I meane Sr Tho. Manwaring and Mr. Crew: and if you shall please to take a journey hither upon my return from London, I shall take it for a very high favour, resting

This very rare Spanish Romance seems to have been unknown to all the bibliographers, till a copy was noticed in Brunet's Manuel from Renouard's Library without any date except that in the Privilegio of 1528 and without any Colophon, but supposed by Renouard to be printed at Madrid; that copy Mr. Grenville purchased, and soon after he purchased the only other copy hitherto seen, which came from Meerman's sale (see Brunet N. R. II. p. 31). It is the same edition as that of Renouard's and with the same Privilegio, but Renouard's copy ends with "Laus Deo" on the reverse of the 159th page, whereas in Meerman's copy there follow after Laus Deo three leaves of a Table of Contents, and on the verso of the last leaf is the Colophon of Caragoça por Pedro Hardouyn, 1530. Renouard's being much the finer copy, Mr. Grenville has added to it the deficient Table of Contents and Colophon. Although it is said that the last figure in the date resembles a *two* as well as a *three*, I have no doubt that the true date is *sixty-three*. A peculiar merit of this edition is that it contains several passages (particularly respecting the Protector Somerset) suppressed in all the subsequent editions. The copy in the Br. Museum and that of Mr. Douce both want the last leaf." Note by Mr. Grenville.

It has the original wood cuts, which are all copied in that of 1684, and the Head of Fox in the 2d vol. by Glover is much finer than that by Sturt in 1684. The text is verbatim the same, except that the Supplemental Leaves of vol. 2 are incorporated in the Text of 1684.

The Censures of a learned Prelate and three Professors of Divinity, dated 1675, followed by Twenty Latin lines, two leaves. Then follows the preface Forty-three leaves.

The Bleeding Iphigenia is Ireland. The author commences with lamenting Andrew Sall's abjuration of the Catholick faith. “After lamenting Sall's woefull conversion, I begin to think of my dear Country's affliction, and with fear and amazement to inquire the ground and cause of persecution there and in England.” And the re-

mainder of the preface is occupied with this inquiry—chiefly against Clarendon and Orrery.

The book is evidently printed by the printer of the “Dolefull fall of Andrew Sall.”

“For the last thirty years I had in vain endeavoured to procure this book, so rare that I knew it only by its title, but had never seen a single copy. It was purchased by Mr. Heber, while on the Continent, and was sold with other of his books abroad, coming ultimately to me at a very heavy price. I have since heard that there is a copy in Trinity College, Dublin.” MS. note.

(the author I have never seen nor knowne) proving clearly Ormond to have been the greatest enemy the Nation ever had (all men say the same) is the most excellent thing of all I saw, sound and well ordered, full of truth, strong in sense, and containing faire and Christian documents &c.”

Sykes nor any of the Collectors of Faithorne's have ever seen or heard of this print, and to prevent its being damaged by folding I had the book inlaid to the size of the print. The face so much resembles that of Henrietta Maria in the character of Magdalen, that I inserted this latter head which seems to me to prove that Faithorne's Mariana was also intended for Henrietta Maria.—Since the above note, I have seen a copy of the Triana with a torn fragment of Faithorne's print in the collection of Mr. White of Litchfield. I have also purchased the only other copy that I have, seen of this work in an early edition of 1654. "This is one of the three editions quoted by Douce, Illustrations, II. 356, as the earliest known, though the priority cannot be ascertained. It is so rare that Douce believed that there was no copy in England. This was purchased at Dr. Kloss's Sale. The only copy in a foreign library that I find which appears to tally with mine is that in the La Valliere Cat. No. 4940, attributed to Ketelaer of Utrecht, circa 1472, but if that has 152 cap. it cannot be the same as mine, where 'sic est finis' closes the 151st cap. By a singular misprint the reverse of folio 9 is found on the reverse of folio 16, and vice versa. The 151st cap. which closes my book, is called 151 in the two editions in my library, which contain 182 cap. The additional chapters are inserted in various parts between cap. 15 and cap. 151 of this early edition. Dibdin in Bibl. Spenc. III. 340, quotes the Edition by Ulric Zell as Ed. Pr. though Douce, to whose authority he refers, expressly says, that the edition by Ulric Zell having 182 cap. cannot be one of the first, which have only 151."

"In the Bodleian Library there is an imperfect copy of an edition containing 152 chapters, the last chapter commencing with "Quida vere p'nceps" the last lines of all being "vera diligētis qm oscula blandientis &c. Et sic est finis."

"Warton calls the author Pierre Bercheur. Douce doubts this. Van Praet, in his Essay, sur Colard Mansion, p. 100, calls him

Elimandus." Note by Mr. Grenville. See also Sir Frederick Madden's Introduction to Gesta Romanorum, published by the Roxburghe Club, 1838, and Brunet, N. R. II. p. 176, who following Van Praet upon the authority of the first Edition of the Dialogus Creaturarum, state Elimandus to be the author. This discovery of M. Van Praet appears to have escaped the notice of Sir F. Madden.

It was so rigidly suppressed by the Inquisition that Mr. Grenville was assured that no copy is known to exist in Spain, except one in the Escurial, which is not shown except by a special order.

The First edition. A copy of this edition was sold at Evans's auction of Mr. Jadis's books in 1828 to Mr. Tunno for £26. 5s. it was described as *unique*, from its having the six suppressed leaves of Drake's Voyage between pages 643 and 644, and from its having the *Map*, referred to at the end of the preface. This copy contains the six leaves, and apparently the Map appropriated by Hakluyt to this edition, until Molyneux's Map (then unfinished) should be completed. In Mr. Jadis's two Editions of Hakluyt of 1589 and 1598, the same map is repeated in both editions, which cannot be right if the preface is correct. The Map in this copy was found in the original old binding of the book.

Second Edition. This fine copy has the map, probably that described by Hakluyt in the preface to his first edition as being then preparing by Mr. Ed. Molyneux. This Map is beautifully engraved; it has not Molyneux's name to it nor the name of the engraver. From the similarity in the ornaments and the writing of the names to those in John Norden's Description of Essex, MS. 1594, there can be little question but that the map was engraved from a drawing by him. This is the Map de-

scribed by Mr. Hallam in vol. ii. of the Literature of Europe, page 491. "The best map of the sixteenth century is one of uncommon rarity, which is found in a very few copies of the first (second Edition) of Hakluyt's Voyages. This contains Davis's Straits (Fretum Davis,) Virginia, by name, and the lake Ontario. The coast of Chili is placed more correctly than the prior maps of Ortelius, and it is noticed in the margin that this trending of the coast less westerly than had been supposed was discovered by Drake in 1577, and confirmed by Sarmiento and Cavendish. The huge Terra Australis of the old geography is left out. Corea is represented near its place, and China with some degree of correctness; even the North Coast of New Holland is partially traced. The Strait of Arian, which had been presumed to divide Asia from America has disappeared, while a marginal note states that the distance between those two continents in latitude 38° is not less than 1200 leagues. The Ultra-Indian region is inaccurate; the sea of Aral is still unknown, and little pains have been taken with central and Northern Asia. But upon the whole it represents the utmost limit of geographical knowledge at the close of the sixteenth century, and far excels the maps in the edition of Ortelius at Antwerp in 1588."

Cochlæus in this Disputatio at the 6th leaf gives the same account which he afterwards repeated in his Vita Lutheri, p. 153, of his informing against two English at Cologne in 1525, being employed in printing an English Version of the N. Testament, these English were Tindal assisted by Roye. The interruption given by Cochlæus perhaps prevented this Cologne edition being completed. See Testament and Alane.

His answers to (Gardiner) the Lord Chauncelor in this very rare little tract announce a bold and sturdy character; but soon after these answers, being imprisoned by Gardiner in the Fleet and having had the weakness to recant, he afterwards so bitterly reproached himself with his recantation, that, having in vain wounded himself with a knife, as soon as he was released he drowned himself. This book is most probably unique: independent of its rarity, it possesses great interest, as illustrative of the manners of the young men of family of the time of Q. Elizabeth, and for the various information it contains concerning parliamentary history. The Author was Arthur Hall, the first English translator of Homer, who at the time of the publication of this letter was member of Parliament for Grantham. The work gave so much offence, that the printer, Henry Bynneman, and all the persons concerned in its production, were brought to the bar of the House. The affair was discussed at various times betweene Feb. 4th and the 14th, 1580. During the proceedings it was elicited that only *eighty or one hundred* copies were printed, all of which were destroyed by order of Parliament, except *fourteen*, previously distributed. The House of Commons declared the work to be a slanderous libel, false, seditious, and erroneous; sentenced the author to be expelled, to be committed to the Tower for six months, fined him 500 marks, and pronounced him disqualified for the then Parliament.

A limited reprint of the work was made in 1815, being No. 5 of the Miscellanea Antiqua Anglicana. 4to.

First Edition. The present copy is well worthy of notice, because though the Colophon at page 264 (of Henry VIII.) gives the date of 1548 the variations of the press from the other copies with that date, and the earlier and older character of the decorations of the capital letters seem to prove, that the main body of this copy makes part of an edition which Tanner ascribes to Berthelet in 1542—that edition seems quite disbelieved by modern writers, because no copy of it has yet appeared. It seems not improbable that in this copy of 1548 Grafton may have availed himself of the unfinished sheets of the press of Ber-

thelet of 1542. The tables of 1550 have been subjoined, and a title prefixed with the same date, but differing from those of that edition of 1550, which in all other copies of that date are found to end the title with a notice that "separate tables are added to each king's reign," a notice not to be found on the title prefixed to this copy. (But this notice is given in Grafton's address to the Reader on a iii.)

Tanner in *Bibliotheca Britannica*, p. 372, says distinctly that Hall published his first Edition by Berthelet, 1542, with the Title of "The union of the two noble and illustrious families of Lancaster and York," beginning "Oblivion the cancard enemy to fame." Grafton continued the edition to the death of Henry VIII. from the MS. of Hall, and printed it in 1548 and 1550; but Fox, p. 1547, observes that this Chronicle was prohibited "regia autoritate," 1555.

Herbert, Ames, p. 530, describes a Copy in the Publick Library at Cambridge which appears to be similar to the present, though he thinks the Cambridge copy unique.

This Catechism is very uncommon. It was compiled by the Archbishop by order of a Provincial Synod held at Edinburgh 26 Jan. 1551. Bishop Keith speaks of it in the highest praise. Lord Hailes unaccountably denies that it was printed by the command of the Archbishop, though the Colophon in the most precise words so describes it. This Archbishop it was who endeavoured to turn Q. Mary Stuart's horse from entering into England. He was himself murdered on a gibbet in 1570.

and his letter to that effect is in the Appendix to Strype, p. 444. In Martin Mar Prelate, "the copies of this book were seized by the Bishops." This Puritan Printer was the author of a Latin Dictionary published in 1588, which went through five editions, but he did not print earlier than 1584, nor later than 1588.

The work is an attack upon Fox's Book of Martyrs. This copy contains the plate of the Cross, p. 507, which is rarely found in the book. N. Harpsfeld died in confinement in 1583.

from the circumstances of its being printed by Pynson and having been (when in Mr. Heber's collection) bound with two other works (*Mirror of good Maners and Salust*) both translated by Barclay, was probably also translated by him. It is a book of extraordinary rarity, no perfect copy that can be traced having previously occurred for public sale.

his Memorials, says he only once had seen a copy of Pynson's rare edition.

Vives, preceptor to William de Croy, afterwards Abp. of Toledo, and Cardinal, was professor of the Belles Lettres at Louvain in 1517, when Wolsey, the founder, named him as one of the first fellows, of Corpus Christi College, at Oxford. Here he became preceptor to the princess Mary in polite literature and the Latin tongue, and was admitted Doctor of Laws. He continued high in the King’s esteem, till venturing to write the present tract against the divorce of Catharine. Henry, in resentment, imprisoned him for six months; but obtaining his liberty, he returned to the Netherlands, and resided at Bruges, and there he married, and taught the Belles Lettres till his death, which is no where satisfactorily recorded.

“In 1534 he was attainted of misprision of treason for being active in the matter of

Eliz. Barton, the maid of Kent. Afterwards denying the King's supremacy over the Church, he was hanged, drawn and quartered in Smithfield 30 July 1510, having before as 'twas thought, written other things, but lost." M.S. note by Mr. Heber.

"The Editio Princeps of Suetonius, Eutropius and Diaconus and the *Historiæ Augustæ Scriptores*, under which latter title the whole work usually passes, consists of three Parts divided into two volumes. The first Part occupies the first volume, and ought to contain 108 leaves. This is the whole of Suetonius. The second Part contains the 6 Hist. Augustæ Scriptores properly so called, and the Third Part Eutropius and Diaconus, making together the 2nd vol. consisting of 192 leaves. Two of these however it ought to be stated are blank (the 5th and the one preceding Eutropius) which may therefore be wanting without injury to the integrity of the Text. This explains certain variations in the different accounts of the leaves this book should consist of. Brunet, who states the total of both volumes at 299, had inspected a copy probably which wanted one of these blank leaves, which is the case with one otherwise perfect which has fallen under my inspection. If the total of printed leaves reaches 298, the book is perfect, the two additional leaves being blanks. How my friend Dibdin in his *Bibl. Sp.* vol. III. p. 12, could state the number to be 247, I cannot guess; either *Ld. Spencer's* copy must be

"The author was a gunner who sailed with Sir John Hawkins on his W. Indian expedition in 1567, and dedicates this account of his Travels and hardships to Queen Elizabeth. It is so rare that I do not re-

collect any other copy, though I suppose it might be found." MS. note.

Lowndes's Title does not agree with the above; but he does not appear to have seen the book.

This interesting Family history is only printed for presents. Several additional plates and notes have been added by the author since 1834. There is no general Title Page to the book. This is a presentation copy, with some letters from the author to Mr. Grenville.

A beautiful copy, apparently upon Large Paper, the Portraits of Howell and Charles II. are most brilliant.

“De Bure, no. 2928, a annoncé ce livre rare, premiere edition mais . . . il n’a pas pu le voir.” Crevenna, III. 243, no. 4459. This edition is not to be found in Panzer or Maittaire. Warton in his history of English Poetry in his Emendations to p. 376 of vol. II. says that this work is attributed to Conradus Celtes; that he was the editor is certain, but it is equally certain that in his dedication of these plays and poems to the D. of Saxony, he ascribes them to Hrosuita a German Nun.

HUBBARD, WILLIAM. A narrative of the troubles with the Indians in New-England, from the planting thereof in the year 1607, to this present year 1677. But chiefly of the late troubles in the two last years. To which is added a discourse about the Warre with the Pequods in 1637. Boston, *by John Foster*, 1677. *Map.* 4to.

The map is considered the first map printed in America, and is extremely scarce. An English copy of this original edition was printed in the same year at London, but without the Map.

HUBERT, SIR FRANCIS. The deplorable life and death of Edward the second, King of England. Together with the downfall of the two unfortunate Fauorits, Gavestone and Spencer. Storied in an excellent Poem. London, for Roger Michell, 1628. 12mo. G. M.

This is the first edition, though spurious. The author of this Book was Sir Francis Hubert or Hobart, as he himself declares in his Dedication of his poem to his brother Mr. H. Hubert in the Edition of 1629. Nicholson says, Richard Hobart, a younger brother to Sir Henry, was the author of this Poem.

This edition of 1629 had become so scarce that it was reprinted, though not without some alterations and omissions in 1721. In that preface the Editor says that he reprints it from a manuscript “the 8^o. of 1629 being so scarce, *if at all in being*, that no light could be had from it.” See Collier’s Bridgewater House Catalogue, p. 149, about the omission relative to French marriages after stanza 343.

This new invented Machine, is a Steam-Boat. It entirely puts an end to the claims

of America to the invention of Steam navigation, and establishes for this country the honor of that important discovery.

Levinus Hulsius, the compiler and publisher of these Voyages, was born at Ghent in 1546, and died at Franckfort in 1606, having published only seven Parts of his Collection. The remaining parts were published by his Widow and Successors, partly from his papers, and sometimes in conjunction with De Bry, to whose Voyages this forms a proper Supplement.

Brunet and Ebert very justly remark that this German Collection of early Voyages, though less known than that of De Bry, is very much more rare and equally interesting; and Asher, who printed an account of all the different editions of the different parts, says "The long lapse of time, full sixty years, from 1598 to 1660, which lies between the publication of the first and last Editions, as well as the different places where the books were published, must have made it almost impossible for one man to collect at the time the whole of these parts, and I doubt very much whether a complete set, complete so as to contain all the editions of all the parts, is to be met with in any Library."

The most essential and the most difficult to find are the Twenty-six Parts in their original and first Editions. The present copy possesses First Editions of all the Twenty-six Parts, and every subsequent edition of every Part, with the exception only of Parts V. and VI. second Edition, which are however promised to Mr. Grenville.

This Collection contains likewise five different parts which were not known to Asher, and it is not too much to say of it, that it is the most complete that exists. The Fifteen first Parts, with the exception of the 10th, have a 2d Edition; the Eight First have a third Edition; the Five first with the exception of the second are all that have a fourth edition. The first and fifth are the only two parts that have a fifth Edition. Referring to Asher's Bibliographical Essay on the Collection of Voyages by Levinus Hulsius and his Successors, published at Berlin in 1839, for an Analysis of the Contents of each Voy-

age, List of Plates, &c. we proceed to notice the peculiarities of these copies, and the corrections they offer to Asher's Bibliographical Details.

Part I. Nurnberg in verlegung L. Hulsii, 1598.

First Edition. Asher, who never saw this rare first Edition, supposes it to have 13 plates and maps because he finds 13 in the third Edition, which is the first that he has seen. It has 72 pages and only 12 plates and maps; the 13th, of the bird called Eme, was added in the subsequent editions, with an addition to the text of the Diary of the 4th Dec. 1596, as may be seen by comparison with the subsequent Editions of this part.

First Edition. Complete 51 pages, 1 Map and 4 Plates. Asher notes 48 pages, which makes the text of the 2d Edition.

Part X. Franckfurt, 1608.

First Edition. Complete, 52 pages, 1 Map and 1 Plate. Asher not knowing this edition quotes the second of 1613 as the first, and 102 pages instead of 52. "The interesting account which forms the subject of the present Part has not been published by De Bry." Asher.

Part XI. Franckfurt, 1612.

First Edition. First Part. Complete, 102 pages and 7 Plates.

First Edition. Second Part. Complete, 167 pages and 4 Plates. Asher

counts only 8 Plates for these two Volumes.

Part XII. Oppenheim, 1614.

First Edition. Complete, 71 pages, of which 4 not numbered in suite and 7 Maps and Plates.

First Edition. Complete, 76 pages, 1 Map and 4 Plates. Asher, page 68, says that *no* other edition is known, but in his list of editions, p. 117, he quotes a 2d. edition of 1627.

Part XIV. Franckfurt, 1617.

First Edition. Complete, 70 pages, 8 preliminary and 62 paged, 1 Map and 1 Plate.

Part XV. Hanaw, 1617.

First Edition. Complete, 75 pages, no Map or Plate.

Part XVI. Frankfurt, 1619.

First Edition. Complete 90 pages, 4 Maps and 5 Plates.

This is the first Edition of the work which has been supposed to have contributed more than any other to smooth James's accession to the Crown. Its rarity and literary value will be appreciated by the following extracts from M'Crie's Life of Melville. "Fond of seeing this work in print, and yet conscious that it would give great offence, James was anxious to keep it from the knowledge of his native subjects until circumstances should enable him to publish it with safety. "With this view, the printer being first sworn to secrecy," says he, "I only permitted SEVEN

of them to be printed and these SEVEN I dispersed among some of my trustiest servants to be kept close by them." I have now before me a copy of the first edition (the present) and I have no doubt that it is one of the seven copies, (perhaps the only one now existing) to which that edition was limited. It is beautifully printed in a large Italic letter. Prefixed to it are two sonnets, the first of which entitled, "The Dedication of the booke" is not to be found in the subsequent editions. On comparing this with the subsequent ones, I find that alterations were made in the work. For though all the charges against the Scottish preachers are retained, James found it necessary to drop or to soften some of his most unguarded and harsh expressions, and to give an ambiguous turn to the sentences which had created the greatest offence. For example, in the original edition he says "If my conscience had not resolved me, that all my religion was grounded upon the plaine words of the scripture, I had never outwardly avowed it, for pleasure or awe of the *vaine pride of some sedicious Preachours*." In the edition of 1603, that sentence stands thus, "I had never outwardlie avowed it, for pleasure or awe of *any flesh*." Several other alterations of the Text are quoted and the following among other sentences is omitted, speaking of the Islanders of Scotland, "Thinke no other of them all, then as Wolves and Wild Boares."

“ Nearly twelve months,” says Wilson in his *Life of James I.*, “ elapsed from the period of Elizabeth’s death to his public entry from the Tower.” James had lingered on his journey, “ banqueting and feasting.” This afforded the Citizens of London ample time to make splendid preparations for the reception of the King. They laboured without intermission. “ The City and Suburbs were one Great Pageant.”

“ We have heard,” says Mr. Gifford, “ much of the expenses incurred by the temporary erections for the celebration of the late peace; but *they shrink to nothing before the cost of the entertainments prepared for the reception of James.*”

The original French Calendrier des Bergers, written about 1497, was first printed by Verard, s. a. according to Van Praet; the first English translation was printed in fol. Paris, 1503, in what seems to be a Scottish Dialect, but it is so rare that it sold at the Roxburghe sale for £180. A very imperfect copy is also in the Althorp Library.

This edition of 1506 is evidently the second, that of Wynkyn de Worde of 1508, used to be called the second, but in both these the language differs entirely from that of 1503.

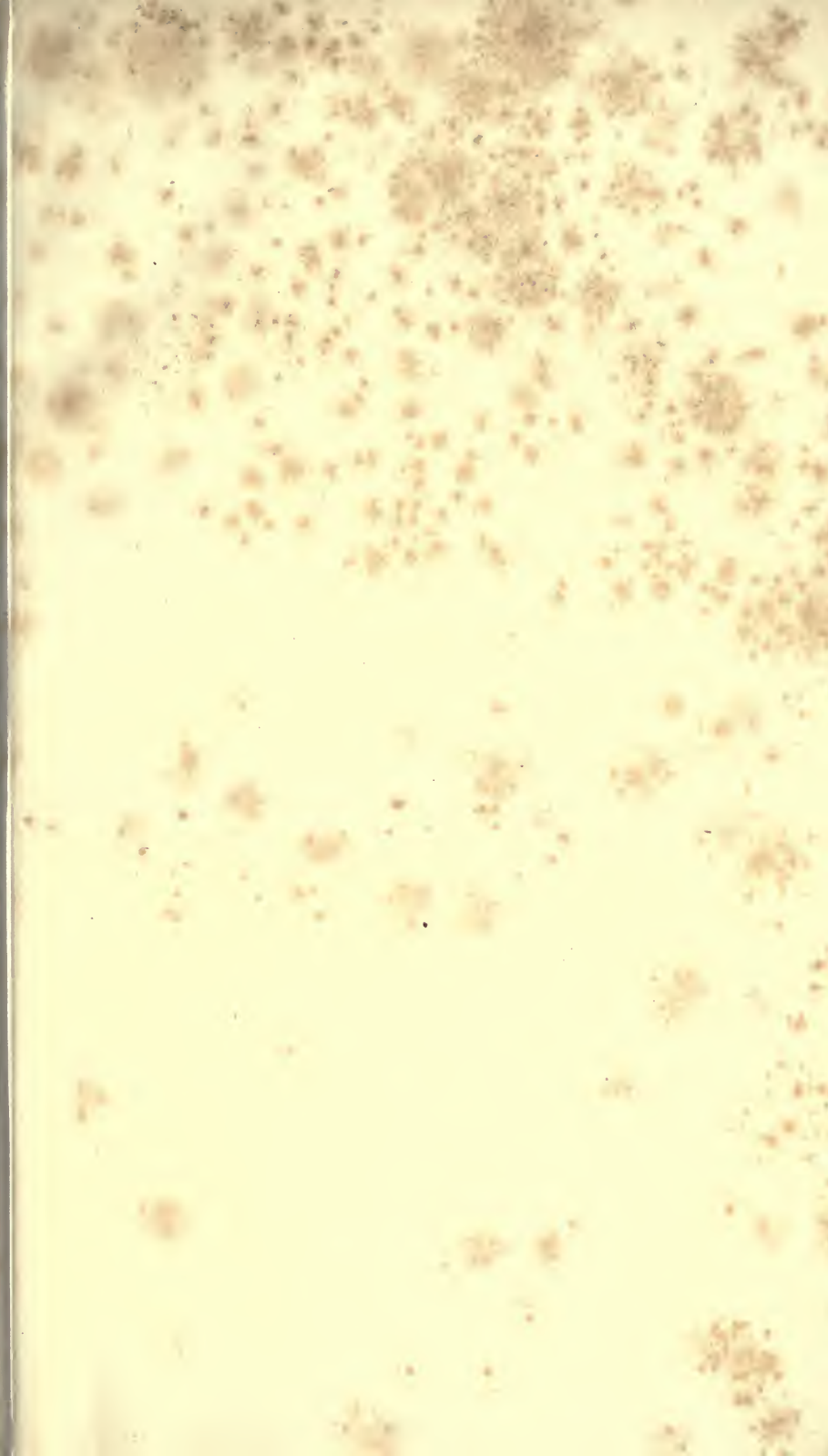
