COURSE REQUIREMENTS

There are no exams, but you will be required to write two short thought essays (about 5 pages each) and a 12-15 page term paper. All papers must be typed. I will assign topics for the two short papers, the first of which will be on the origins of the Final Solution, but the term paper can be on a subject of your choice. Some examples: hidden children, the Allies, Hitler's Euthanasia program, the other "Holocausts," bystanders (both individuals, institutions, countries), Jewish resistance and accommodation, the Jewish Councils, the SS, postwar adjustments. The possibilities are practically endless.

In addition, except on days when the class doesn't meet or when one of the thought essays are due, you will be expected to submit a concise summary of that week's assigned reading. The summary needs only be a paragraph or two, and it can be submitted via e-mail or hard copy placed in my history department mailbox. But it must be turned in no later than the morning of that day's scheduled class meeting.
