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# **Activities**

You want to get active? You've come to the right place. Cape Town is nirvana for the outdoor thrill seeker, with plenty of operators around to ensure that you don't go home without having experienced a heart-pumping adventure. With wind-whipped waves and Table Mountain on hand, surfing, walking and rock climbing are hugely popular and can easily be organised. For more-extreme adventures, such as shark-cage diving or paragliding, you'll need to travel out of the city or wait for the ideal weather conditions.

It's not all about adrenaline. Cape Town is an ideal location for a leisurely game of golf, practising your yoga moves, a spot of pampering at the spa, or just kicking back and watching sport in a luscious setting.

# **HEALTH & FITNESS ALTERNATIVE THERAPIES**

Observatory is the Cape Town apex of alternative lifestyles. On the first Sunday of the month a Holistic Lifestyle Fair (Map p256; **☎** 021-788 8088) takes place at the Observatory Recreation Centre, on the corner of Station and Lower Main Rds.

## **CHINESE MARTIAL ARTS & HEALTH CENTRE** Map p256

## **CYCLING**

Despite the mountainous territory and the lack of dedicated cycling paths, cycling is a popular activity in Cape Town. You'll find several places here where you can hire bicycles (see p208), including mountain bikes.

The City Bowl is a relatively flat area for cycling, as are the coastal roads leading to the Waterfront and around to Camps Bay. For mountain biking there are the paths leading off the lower slopes of Table Mountain, as well as those in the Tokai Plantation (see p71), which has a technical single-track. The Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve (Cape Point) is also recommended; both Day Trippers (p91) and the Baz Bus ( 2021 439 2323; www.bazbus.com) offer tours here that include cycling.

Since 1977 the Pick 'n' Pay Cape Argus Cycle Tour ( © 083 910 6551; www.cycletour.co.za) around the peninsula has been held on a Saturday in the middle of March. With more than 30,000 entrants each year, it is the largest bicycle race in the world. Another race to watch out for is the Cape Epic ( 201-426 4373; www.cape-epic.com), an eight-day event covering 900km, from Knysna on the Garden Route to the Spier wine estate just outside of Stellenbosch.

Also check the website of South Africa's top cycling organisation Pedal Power Association ( 201-689 8420; www.pedalpower.org.za) for details of races and cycle tours around the Cape.

You can also hire bikes (R100 per day).

## **GOLF**

Golf tourism is a big deal in the Cape, and there are some 55 courses dotted around the city. Some are superb and many welcome visitors (but you should book and will need to dress appropriately). ### **COOKERY COURSES**

If you're impressed by the some of the unique dishes of the Cape and want to learn how to cook them, help is on hand. The tour company **Andulela** ( **a** 021-790 2592; www.andulela.com) offers both a half-day Cape Malay cookery course (R295) in the Bo-Kaap every Saturday, and an African cooking safari (R295) in the township of Kavamandi, near Stellenbosch, where you can learn to prepare traditional Xhosa foods.

The ebullient Thope Lekau offers a half-day Cook Up (R150) at her Khayelitsha-based B&B Kopanong (p184), where you can learn to cook like an African mama.

Michelin Star chef Conrad Gallagher runs Cooking with Conrad Gallagher ( 2021-794 0111; www .conradgallagherfood.com), a two-day gourmet cooking course (R1850) in Constantia, covering not only everything from breakfasts to braais but also table dressings and flower arrangements. The treatment rooms overlook Table Mountain.

Afterwards you can swim in the complex's outdoor pool.

Dating from 1906, these nicely restored baths, featuring painted murals of citycentre life on the walls, are heated and very popular with the local community. The separate Turkish steam baths (R52) are a great way to sweat away some time, especially during the cooler months. Women are admitted 8.30am to 7.30pm Monday and Thursday, 9am to 6pm Saturday; men 1pm to 7.30pm Tuesday, 9am to 7.30pm Wednesday and Friday, and 8am to noon Sunday. Massages are available for women (R39 massage only, R73 massage and Turkish steam bath).

### SEA POINT PAVILION Map p255

# **OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES ABSEILING & KLOOFING**

Apart from the main abseiling site on Table Mountain, abseiling is also part of kloofing (canyoning) trips around Cape Town. The sport of clambering into and out of kloofs (cliffs or gorges) also entails climbing, hiking, swimming and jumping. It's great fun, but can be dangerous so check out operators' credentials carefully before signing up; two long-running operators are Abseil Africa and Day Trippers (p91).

### **180° ADVENTURES**

☎ 021-462 0992; www.180.co.za Mainly involved in arranging corporate training exercises, this outfit is experienced at running kloofing trips and also offers an interesting Cape Town-based variation: a 2.3km 'walk' from Deer Park to the castle through the stormwater canals running under the city. It only runs during the dry summer months, needs eight people to go ahead and costs R280 per person.

## ABSEIL AFRICA Map pp248-9

The 112m drop off the top of Table Mountain is a guaranteed adrenaline rush, and the cheapest place to book it is direct with the operator, whose office is just off Long St. Don't even think of tackling it unless you've got a head (and a stomach) for heights. Take your time, because the views are breathtaking. The kloofing trips to gorges around Gordon's Bay involve jumps varying between 3m and 22m.

## **DIVING & SHARK-CAGE DIVING**

Corals, kelp beds, wrecks, caves, drop-offs, seals and a wide variety of fish are some of the attractions that make Cape Town a great diving location. The best time is from June to November, when the water on the False Bay side is warmer and visibility is greater. Diving any time of the year off the

greater. Diving any time of the year off the Atlantic coast will require a 5mm wet suit. Shark-cage diving is heavily promoted in Cape Town, even though the action is at Gansbaai, 175km southeast of the city. The closest town to Gansbaai is Hermanus, where several operators vie for trade. This popular but controversial activity (see the boxed text, p154) costs around R1100 for a day trip from Cape Town; in Hermanus you'll pay roughly R300 less and you won't have to get up at the crack of dawn. ## THE TROUBLE WITH SHARK DIVING

Shark attacks have been on the rise of late in Cape Town, and many Capetonians are linking this with the growing popularity of shark-cage diving. Operators use bait to attract the sharks. The theory, according to opposers of the activity, is that these killer fish are being trained to associate the presence of humans with food. There's still no hard evidence linking the two, but don't be surprised to find resistance to, as well as support for, your decision to have a Jaws-like encounter.

generally include breakfast, lunch and diving gear. Most operators will require divers to hold an internationally recognised diving qualification to take part, although some allow snorkellers into the cage. Take note: your chances of spotting sharks are much lower in the warmer summer months.

highly recommended operators in Hermanus. Add R250 for return transport from Cape Town.

Kim Maclean is the shark lady in question, and has been running trips for over 10 years. Ask about the spherical crystal cage dive (R1700), which gets you even closer to the fish and is strictly for divers only.

A guaranteed way to swim with sharks is to dive in the tanks at the Two Oceans Aquarium. No great whites, but several raggedtooth sharks, a 150kg short-tailed stingray, other predatory fish and a turtle make for a delightful diving experience. The cost includes hire of diving gear, and you need to be a certified diver. If not, one-day resort courses can be arranged. It also offers the chance to dive in the aquarium's kelp forest tank (R400), or to dive in an Imperial Navy diving suit with lead boots and an 18kg copper helmet (R650).

The mountainous spine of the Cape Peninsula is a rock-climbing paradise, though it's not without its dangers, chief of which are the capricious weather conditions (see p70). Mountain rescues, and climbing fatalities, seem to occur on a weekly basis. Finding a guide or someone to climb with

is always recommended. For details of guided hikes throughout the Table Mountain National Park, see p74.

Nearby at Imhoff Farm (see p109), on the way to Kommetjie, there's the novelty of camel rides - a great distraction if vou're travelling with kids. Head out to the Winelands to take horseback tours both at Mont Rochelle Equestrian Centre (Map p193; 2083 300 4368) in Franschhoek and Spier (p47).

tandem flight, but should be prepared to lug their paraglider up the mountain. Make an inquiry on your first day in Cape Town – the weather conditions have to be just right.

The South African Hang-Gliding & Paragliding Association ( in Pretoria 012-668 1219; www .sahpa.co.za) can provide the names of operators and schools that offer paragliding courses for beginners.

## **SAILING**

As South Africa gears up for its first ever America's Cup challenge in 2007, the focus will be on Cape Town where Shosholoza, the boat on which the nation's hopes rest, is moored: you can see her opposite the Cape Grace at the Waterfront.

## **SURFING & SANDBOARDING**

The surf scene is huge in Cape Town, with surfing possibilities ranging from gentle shore breaks that are ideal for beginners to 3m-plus monsters for experts only. There are breaks that work on virtually any combination of wind, tide and swell direction: for tips on choosing one, see the boxed text, below, and check out the daily surf report ( **a** 082 234 6353; www.wavescape.co.za) for more details.

A couple of the surfing operators also offer sandboarding, which is just like snowboarding, except on sand dunes. It's huge fun but also, because of all that climbing up and down the sand dunes, a terrifically punishing work-out; expect muscles to ache where you never knew you had them.

Lessons are held in the sheltered environment of the Fish Hoek sand dunes, beneath Peer's Cave. The company also offers traditional surfing lessons and trips, along with fishing trips from Kalk Bay and a host of other adrenalinepumping activities.

## **WEATHER TIPS FOR BEACH BABES & SURFERS**

The following are some local tips if the wind is up and you're deciding which beach to sun on or surf off:

- If the wind is a northerly or northeasterly (mainly from April to September), head to the Bloubergstrand area. You'll avoid the cloud and rain, usually closer to Table Mountain, and the beaches are more pleasant because the wind is offshore and cooling, rather than chilly.
- During the westerlies (from November to March), the coastal area between Muizenberg and Simon's Town is shielded from the worst of the wind by the mountains.
- If the wind is a southerly or southwesterly (throughout the summer), head for Llandudno and Sandy Bay. Sandy Bay, in particular, is shielded by the Sentinel (the tall mountain to the south), and can be gloriously warm when everywhere else is miserable.
- The most famous wind, the Cape doctor, is lifted by Table Mountain, so beaches on the western seaboard, such as Camps Bay and Llandudno, are protected. Kalk Bay is also protected from the Cape doctor. A 'bubble' seems to form against the mountain and creates an area of calm, while just down the road in Fish Hoek, the wind howls onshore.

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With all that summer wind, it's hardly surprising that the Cape coast is a favourite spot for windsurfers and kite boarders. Bloubergstrand is a popular location, as is the lagoon in Langebaan (Map p186), further north.

If it wasn't for nearby South African Breweries messing up the view towards the back of Table Mountain, Newlands would be a shoe-in for the title of world's prettiest cricket ground. There's room for a crowd of

25,000, so this is where all of the Protea's international matches are held. The cricket season runs from September to March with the day–night matches drawing the biggest crowds. Grab a spot on the grass bank to soak up the festive atmosphere. Tickets cost about R50 for local matches and up to R200 for internationals.

## **SOCCER**

With tickets costing just R20, attending a soccer game is not only cheap, it's also a hugely fun night out with Capetonian supporters taking every opportunity to blow their plastic trumpets – bring your earplugs!

The season runs from August to May. Ajax Cape Town, who is affiliated with the Dutch club Ajax Amsterdam, sometimes plays matches at Newlands Rugby Stadium (below). Matches are also played at Green Point Stadium (Map pp252–3), off Fritz Sonnenberg Rd in Green Point, and Athlone Stadium (Map pp244–5), off Klipfontein Rd in Athlone. This last stadium is home to Santos soccer team. Tickets can be purchased through Computicket.

## **HORSE RACING**
