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Eating

Dining in the Mother City is a pleasure. There are places to suit practically everyone's tastes and budgets, with a particularly strong selection of cafés and delis. With both the sea and fruitful farmlands on hand, you can be pretty much assured of fresh, top-quality ingredients wherever you eat.

If we have a gripe, it's that accomplished cooking tends to run in third place to the inventive décors and lively atmospheres of many restaurants. That old South African predilection for incinerated meat, stodge and viscous sauces seems ingrained. But we have been pleased to see that the influx of capital and demands of overseas visitors in recent years has begun to raise the standard and selection of what qualifies as a great meal.

Most restaurants are licensed but some allow you to bring your own wine for little or no corkage. Call ahead to check the restaurant's policy. For more information on wine, see p40. Many bars serve excellent food; see p136 for some recommendations. And for details of cookery courses where you can learn how to prepare traditional Cape Malay and African dishes, see p151.

The magazine Eat Out (www.eatout.co.za), an annual restaurant guide to South Africa, is the place to look for the latest dining news; the website has a searchable database of reviewed Cape Town eateries.

Opening Hours

Cafés and restaurants generally open seven days a week, the former serving food from 7.30am to about 5pm. A few places (commonly in the City Bowl) are closed on Sunday or occasionally Monday. If a restaurant opens for lunch it will generally be from 11.30am to 3pm; dinner usually kicks off around 7pm with last orders at 10pm.

How Much?

Dining here is good value compared to what you'd pay for a similar standard of food elsewhere in the developed world. For breakfast or a quick alcohol-free lunch you'll be looking at around R50 to R70. The cost of dinner, including a couple of glasses of wine, is more typically in the range of R150 to R200, although you can easily pay R300 or more. The reviews in this chapter are broken down by neighbourhood, and under each neighbourhood heading, the reviews are listed in budget order, with the cheapest first.

Watch out for the sign 'Sq' on the menu where the price should be. This usually applies to premium seafood items, such as crayfish and Mozambique prawns, and means that you'll pay whatever the establishment considers the market price that day. Check what the price is for the dish (not just per kilogram) before you finally order if you want to avoid a nasty shock in the bill.

Booking Tables

Most restaurants take reservations for lunch and dinner, so call ahead if you want to ensure a seat. We've included reservation recommendations for especially popular restaurants.

Tipping

Waiters in Cape Town earn a pittance and rely heavily on tips. The standard tip for good service is 10% to 15%, but leave more if you think the staff have earned it. A few places include a service charge on the bill.

TOP FIVE PICNIC SPOTS

Cape Town's many green spaces and beaches are crying out for a well-stocked picnic hamper. Our favourite locations for an alfresco feast:

- Clifton (p102) sunset supper on the beach. Bring candles for the ultimate romantic experience, but keep the
 alcohol hidden it's actually illegal to imbibe on the beach.
- Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve (known locally as Cape Point; p73) take your pick from several beautiful and largely deserted beaches in the nature reserve, and keep an eye out for hungry baboons.
- Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens (p105) a Sunday-afternoon institution, particularly from December to March when you can enjoy a concert on these verdant, rolling lawns.
- Constantia at Buitenverwachting (p44) picnics come prepacked (R90); book on © 083 257 6083 or 082 974 8543. Or take your own to enjoy in the lovely grounds of Groot Constantia (p44).
- Silvermine (p72) spread your picnic blanket beside the tannin-stained waters of the reserve's central reservoir.

Self-Catering

Cape Town has some fantastic delis, such as Melissa's (p129), Gionvanni's Deli World (p129), Newport Market & Deli (p130), New York Bagels (p130) and Carlucci's (Map p254; © 021-465 0795; 22 Upper Orange St, Oranjezicht), which are ideal places to stock up for a picnic.

The main supermarkets – Pick 'n' Pay, Checkers and the more upscale Woolworths (modelled on Marks & Spencer in the UK) – are also well stocked and reasonably priced. You'll find branches of the three operations at Victoria Wharf (Map pp252–3; Waterfront), Gardens Centre (Map pp254: Mill St, Gardens) and Cavendish Square (Map pp246–7; Cavendish St, Claremont) shopping malls. In the City Bowl there is a Pick 'n' Pay (Map pp248–9; Picbal Arcade, 58 Strand St) as well as a Checkers (Map pp248–9; Golden Acre Centre, Adderley St).

Meal Times

Capetonians start the day early, particularly in the summer months; join them for breakfast between 7am and 9am. Lunch runs anywhere from noon to 3pm, while dinner starts around 7pm and finishes at 10pm. Note that at weekends dining later in the evening is more common, so if you're finding it difficult to get a reservation, ask for an early dinner and promise you'll be done by 9pm.

CITY CENTRE

Dining options are spread liberally across the city centre, with particular concentrations in the hip Waterkant district, Heritage Sq (which has no fewer than five restaurants and cafés), and that eternal favourite, Long St. Cafés are plentiful around Greenmarket Sq and St George's Mall, too. The Bo-Kaap, a good location for Cape Malay food, is best visited during the day; in the evenings it's dead.
