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Entertainment

Cape Town didn't become known as the 'Tavern of the Seven Seas' for nothing. Head out on a Friday or Saturday night to Long St, the Waterkant or Camps Bay for an eye-opening experience of how the locals like to party (or 'jol', as they say in South Africa).

Curiously, on other nights – with the exception of Wednesday – Cape Town's nightspots can be less than pumping, although during the long, warm summer nights chances are you'll always find some convivial place to while away the evening. There's certainly no shortage of bars with stunning views of either beach or mountain and, if getting a workout on the dance floor is more your thing, then there's bound to be a club to suit.

It's not all about drinking and dancing. Cape Town has a decent range of cinemas and theatres, while live music spans the gamut from classical to rock via jazz and marimba. Free live music is a feature of the Waterfront, in particular.

Check the weekly arts guide in the Mail & Guardian (www.chico.mweb.co.za/art/daily/menu -guide.htm) to find out what's going on, and the daily *Cape Argus*' Tonight (www.tonight .co.za) section, too. The bimonthly magazine Cape etc (www.capeetc.com) is also good for listings.

Cape Town's computerised booking agency handles ticketing for all major sporting events. There are outlets in the Golden Acre Centre (Map pp248–9; Adderley St, City Bowl), at the Waterfront (Map pp252–3; Victoria Wharf), in the Gardens Centre (Map p254; Mill St, Gardens) and in Sea Point's Adelphi Centre (Map p255; Main Rd, Sea Point), as well as other places.

DRINKING

As in other major party cities, the line between bar and club in Cape Town has become increasingly blurred; long opening hours (until 4am on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday) and DJs can be found at both. Generally, though, clubs will charge an entrance fee. Long and Kloof Sts, the Waterkant (where you'll find the bulk of Cape Town's gay bars) and Camps Bay pump late into the night on summer weekends, as does the Waterfront. Rest assured though, there are still plenty of regular pubs where you can have a quiet drink. Most open around 3pm and close after midnight, but some stay open much later. Where opening times do not fit these standards, we have listed them in the reviews in this chapter.

With its quirky mix of wall maps, globes and retro furnishings (all for sale), Café du Süd is a mecca for the style set. The food is unmemorable but the drinks divine – sink into the leather sofa for afternoon tea or late-night cocktails.

This historic pub, dating from 1900, has three rooms once frequented by the lawyers, police and criminals who lived and worked in the area that it once bordered: District Six. Expect political incorrectness, nicotine-stained walls and cheap booze. There's a surprisingly smart restaurant upstairs (see p125).

Now with a café at street level, the reggaethemed bar's long balcony on the 1st floor remains the chill-out place of choice for the backpacker set. Catch the breeze and the Caribbean vibe. The original branch is in **Observatory** (Map p256; 2021-448 7656; 96 Station St, Observatory).

Boxed in by new apartment blocks, this old-time survivor (here since 1906) is likely to be around for a while longer. Inside, the Rhodesian and old South African flags remain pinned up alongside a collection of firemen's helmets. Come to watch rugby on the big-screen TV, grab some seriously tasty pizza or just down a lazy pint or two.

The chic, urban black set gather beneath the Urban Chic hotel at this sophisticated bar with squishy sofas, windows opening onto Long St and a nice line in cocktails. It's one of the more-relaxed inner-city bars.

You haven't really partied on Long St until you've moved to the Jo'burg beat. Little has changed here in years – there's still the pool table at the back, there's still that cheeky Bart Simpson light sculpture on the wall, and there's still that infectious blend of funky music, groovy patrons and freeflowing drinks.

Head inside Heritage Sq to discover a sultry slice of Marrakech at this trendy bar. It has plump cushions, low tables and balconies overlooking the restored courtyard.

House, R&B and hip-hop – these are the sounds you're most likely to hear in Cape Town's clubs. Break beats, lounge and electronica are also popular. Local DJs of note include Craig da Souza (tech house), Ready D (hip-hop), Leighton Moody (deep house), as well as the fantastic electro-jazz mixmasters Goldfish. Cape Town's club scene is also firmly plugged into the global dance network, so expect star appearances by the likes of Basement Jaxx and Paul Oakenfield.

Long St and its immediate surroundings are the epicentre of the city's club scene, with Waterkant also a busy clubbing area. Trance parties, such as Vortex and Alien Safari, held outdoors an hour or so from the city centre, still happen through summer; check the websites www.3am.co.za and www.aliensafari.co.za for details or make inquiries at the main backpacker hostels. Admission charges range from R10 to

R50 and most places don't really get going

until after midnight, with a notional 4am

A gay and gay-friendly crowd fill this spacious, fun venue with a fairy-lightfestooned courtyard and rooftop chill-out areas. Upstairs thudding-hard house and bare chests are the go, while downstairs, house and anthems keep the dance floor crowded.

EVOLUTION OF THE MCQP

It's a safe bet to say that there's no costume party in the world quite like the Mother City Queer Project (MCQP). What began in 1994 as a small-scale tribute by 'party architect' André Vorster (who really is an architect) to his deceased lover has grown into one of Cape Town's major annual events, held every December and attracting some 4500 revellers.

Every party has a theme and is always held in an interesting venue: in 2005 it was 'It's a Circus' and the location Ratanga Junction (p148). You have to come in costume (if you don't you won't be let in) which means everyone – gay, straight and everything in-between – joins in the fun with abandon.

In 2005 Vorster sold the MCQP brand to a quintet of local movers and shakers who aim to grow the event from one night into a week-long happening. Innovations already include more nondance-type activities at the party and major sponsorship that has allowed big-time prizes for winners of the costume competition. The new promoters are keen for the party to keep it's original community edge, though. You can buy tickets online, or get them in their collectable 3-D-design form from outlets around the city: see www.mcqp.co.za for details.

Dance to music from across Africa at this urban African club. It has a welcoming, predominantly black audience.

ZULA SOUND BAR Map pp248-9 Control Co

Hosts an interesting range of events including live bands, DJs and even open-mike poetry sessions. The long balcony is the place to watch Long St go by.

LIVE MUSIC

Music in all its forms is the very fabric of Cape Town. There are plenty of free or cheap opportunities to enjoy music all over the city, from buskers at the Waterfront or in Greenmarket Sq to the much celebrated Sunday-afternoon concerts at Kirstenbosch (p11). Live bands play in many restaurants and bars, and concerts don't get any bigger than those held at Green Point Stadium, location of 2003's huge Nelson Mandela concert and 2006's South African debut by Robbie Williams.

JAZZ

It's no accident that many world-renowned jazz artists began their careers in Cape Town. The free-flowing nature of jazz is well suited to the relaxed, cosmopolitan nature of the city. Although there are few permanent jazz venues, the music is performed frequently around the city.

A night at a Cape Flats jazz club, such as Duma's Falling Leaves (🖻 021-426 4260) in Guguletu, is an unforgettable experience, but you are strongly advised not to go alone. Contact companies organising township tours, eg Coffee Beans Routes (p82), which has a Monday-night jazz safari to Swingers.

Jazz-festival highlights include January's Standard Bank Cape Town Jazzathon (www.jazz athon.co.za; p9), a free event at the Waterfront, and the two-day Cape Town International Jazz Festival (www.capetownjazzfest.com; p10) held at the end of March at the Cape Town International Convention Centre, with a free concert in Greenmarket Sq.

To this end it has formed the Cape To this musicians will reflect the ethnic breakdown end it has formed the Cape Philharmonic Youth Orchestra and the Cape Philharmonic Youth Wind Ensemble, with around 80% of members coming from disadvantaged communities. As if that wasn't enough, the Philharmonic also teams up with Cape Town Opera (www.capetownopera.co.za) and Cape Town City Ballet (www.capetowncityballet.org .za), both of which usually perform at Artscape. There also are a couple of monthly classical recitals at the Joan St Leger Lindbergh Arts Centre (p107) in Muizenberg, which are very popular, so book well ahead.

Every Thursday the Cape Philharmonic Orchestra plays in the auditorium of the grand 1905 former City Hall. There are good acoustics (particularly in the main balcony seats), but no air conditioning so expect to sweat it out. Concerts often sell out, but it's usually possible to get a space on the choir benches behind the orchestra at the last minute.

Check the website for the programme of classical music performed at the people's cathedral, including orchestral works by the greats, usually on the last Sunday of the month. It's worth coming to hear the cathedral's magnificent organ.

THEATRE, CABARET & COMEDY

What Cape Town's theatre scene lacks in size it certainly makes up for in ambition. There's often something interesting to catch beyond the blockbusters that check into Art-scape (p145) and the Cape Town International Convention Centre. See p36 for more about Capetonian theatre. For details of the theatre festivals at Spier and Oude Libertas in Stellenbosch, see the boxed text, p192.

There isn't a dedicated venue for comedy in town at present, but shows do happen regularly at places such as On Broadway, home of the hilarious drag duo Mince, Muizenberg's Masque Theatre and Obz Café. There's also **Theatresports** (www.impro vision.co.za), a local version of *Whose Line Is It Anyway*, held Tuesday and Thursday at Artscape's On The Side venue. Good comedians whose shows you

EVITA SE PERRON

His characters touch on everything from South African politics and history to ecology. Nothing is off-limits, including the country's struggle with racism. See the boxed text, below, for more.

SOUTH AFRICA'S MOST FAMOUS WHITE WOMAN

Regardless of their political views, most South Africans (and many foreigners) have a soft spot in their hearts for Evita Bezuidenhout, the republic's own Dame Edna Everage, or as she'd prefer to be known, 'the most famous white woman in Africa'. Quite the cultural icon, Evita has had her own TV chat show, as well as a perfume and wine named after her.

Evita is one of several wonderful comic creations of actor and writer **Pieter-Dirk Uys** (www.pdu.co.za). An audience with her is granted in the long-running show *Tannie Evita Praat Kaktus* (Aunty Evita Talks Cactus), regularly performed at Uys' wonderfully kitsch theatre in Darling. It's an understandable and very funny mixture of English and Afrikaans, covering a variety of pertinent topics, not least her own role in the end of apartheid and the process of reconciliation.

A longtime campaigner for civil and gay rights, Uys' many shows fearlessly tackle all the hot-button issues of South Africa, including AIDS – his AIDS awareness show *For Facts Sake!* has been performed at over 500 schools to more than one million school kids. To find out more about Uys' fascinating career – not to mention that of Evita – read his memoir *Between the Devil and the Deep*.

There's no shortage of cinemas in Cape Town showing all the latest international releases, as well as a decent selection of arthouse movies. Big multiplexes – run by Ster Kinekor and Nu Metro – can be found at the Waterfront (Map pp252–3), Cavendish Square (Map pp246–7; Cavendish St, Claremont), Canal Walk (Map pp244–5) and Longbeach Mall (Map pp244–5; Sunnydale Rd, Sun Valley) near Noordhoek. For the multiplexes the best night to go is Tuesday when the usual R35 entry price drops by half to R18. See the local press for listings of films and where they are showing.
