For a city of its size, Budapest has a huge choice of things to do and places to go after dark – from opera and folk dancing to jazz and meat-market clubs. It's almost never difficult getting tickets or getting in; the hard part is deciding what to do.

What's On

Your best sources of information for what's on in the city are the weekly freebie PestiEst (www.est.hu in Hungarian), published every Thursday and available from bars, cinemas and fast-food joints, and the more thorough weekly - with everything from clubs and films to art exhibits and classical music - Pesti Műsor (Budapest Program; www.pestimusor.hu in Hungarian), also called PM Program Magazin, available from newsstands every Thursday for 149Ft. The English-language weekly Budapest Sun also lists events and concerts in its useful Style supplement.

Other freebies include the vastly inferior (though English- and German-language) Programme in Hungary/in Ungarn and its scaled-down monthly version for the capital, Budapest Panorama. The free Koncert Kalendárium, published monthly (bimonthly in summer), has more serious offerings: concerts, opera, dance etc. A welcome arrival is Mr Gordonsky's Budapest City Spy Map, a hip little publication with all sorts of insider's tips. It's available free at pubs and bars.

Internet Resources

The best overall website for happenings in Budapest is BTO (www.budapestinfo.hu), though you might also try Visitors' Guide Budapest (www.visitorsguide.hu). Budapest Week (www.buda pestweek.com) has events, music and movie listings. Budapest Sun Online (www.budapestsun .com) is similar but also has local news, interviews and features. A positive favourite and useful in all respects is Pestiside (www.pestiside.hu), subtitled 'The Daily Dish of Cosmopolitan Budapest'. It's an acerbic and often very funny take on the capital and includes lots of listings and reviews of what's on.

Nightlife Strips & Neighbourhoods

There are no concentrated nightlife areas on the Buda side, unless you count sedate (some might say comatose) Castle Hill or the rather dispersed II Moszkva tér (Map pp218–19; M M2 Moszkva tér). The Pest side, on the other hand, has all sorts of strips - from the ultratouristed V Duna korzó (Map p224; 📵 2 or 2/a), along the river, with pricey (and very ordinary) eateries and watering holes, to leafy VI Andrássy út (Map p224; M M1/2/3 Deák Ferenc utca) – always a sophisticated choice for a night out. But the two main areas are über-trendy

VI Liszt Ferenc tér (Map p222; MM1 Oktogon), where you'll have to duel to the death for a spot under the plane trees, and IX Ráday utca (Map p224; MM3 Kálvin tér), a rather subdued (some might say dull) semipedestrianised street in Józsefváros full of pubs and bars.

This cavernous complex of two bars, a restaurant and a courtyard-terrace vegetarian café with décor that combines Euro-techno with Eastern flair is a great escape from the bars of VI Liszt Ferenc tér and IX Ráday utca. In fact, Krúdy utca may be poised to take over as Budapest's next after-hours strip. There are pizzas (880Ft to 1500Ft) and pasta dishes (550Ft to 1050Ft) as well as more substantial mains (1290Ft to 2500Ft) to accompany the liquid offerings.

FEHÉR GYŰRŰ Map p222

The White Ring' has always been a firm favourite and it's still not clear why. Perhaps it's because it is opposite the 'White House' (p82) and it's always fun to spot MPs. More likely it's because there are so few pubs in this area.

This miniscule gay neighbourhood bar with draped muslin and Greek statuary also moonlights as an Internet café (p189) and is just the ticket for boyz who want to log on and get off.

A stalwart of the Budapest entertainment scene, Picasso Point is a laid-back place for a drink and good for meeting people. Great décor.

PÓTKULCS Map p222

The 'Spare Key' is a wonderful little drinking venue, with a varied menu of live music from 9.30pm most nights and *táncház* (p131) at 8pm every Tuesday. The small central courtyard is a wonderful place to chill out in summer.

TRADITIONAL CAFÉS

Old-style cafés, some of which date back as much as a century and a half, abound in Budapest and some of them are classic examples of their type. They were the centre of social life and in them alliances were formed and momentous events plotted. For more, see boxed text, p126. The majority are in Pest, but Buda can lay claim to several good examples.

ANGELIKA Map p220

Angelika is a charming café attached to an 18th-century church, with a lovely terrace overlooking the Danube. The food (salads from 490Ft to 1490Ft, sandwiches from 750Ft to 850Ft) is just so-so; come here for the cakes and the views.

AUGUSZT Map pp218-19

M M2 Moszkva tér

Tucked away on the 1st floor of a building behind the Fény utca market and Mammut shopping mall, this is the original Auguszt café (there are imitators) and only sells its own shop-made cakes, pastries and biscuits.

A bit far-flung, tis true, and you can only nibble on the hoof here; there are no seats. But it gets rave reviews from locals and expats alike and has won the Best of Budapest award for best cake shop.

This grande dame, which reopened a few years ago after extensive renovations, is still jostling to reclaim her title as the place to sit and look intellectual in Pest. It serves meals (mains 1990Ft to 3590Ft) as well as lighter fare such as sandwiches (750Ft to 1190Ft), omelettes (890Ft to 990Ft) and, of course, cakes and pastries.

This is the most famous of the famous cafés in Budapest – bar none. Founded in 1858, it has been a fashionable meeting place for the city's elite on the northern side of Pest's busiest square since 1870. A visit is mandatory. It also does continental breakfast (2880Ft) and sandwiches (1300Ft to 2500Ft).

DRINK

MY CAFÉ, MY CASTLE

Café life has a longer (and arguably more colourful) history in Budapest than in any other city in Europe. The Turks introduced coffee to Hungary in the early 16th century, and the coffee house was an essential part of the social scene here long before it had even made an appearance in Vienna or Paris. In the final decades of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, Budapest had some 600 cafés.

Budapest cafés were a lot more than just places to drink coffee that was 'black like the devil, hot like hell and sweet like a kiss' as they used to say. In them, momentous events were plotted or took place, great alliances formed and rivalries spawned, chefs d'œuvre written or sketched. To the English aphorism about the sanctity of one's house, the great writer Dezső Kosztolányi had a reply in his essay Budapest, City of Cafés: 'Az én kávéházam, az én váram' (My café is my castle).

The Budapest café of the 19th century embodied the progressive liberal ideal that people of all races and classes could mingle under one roof, and acted as an incubator for Magyar culture. Combining the neighbourliness of a local pub, the bonhomie of a gentlemen's club and the intellectual activity of an open university, coffee houses were places to relax, gamble, work, network, do business and debate.

Or start revolutions... On the morning of 15 March 1848, the future novelist Mór Jókai stood on a table on the Pilvax Café in the Inner Town to proclaim the demands of the Hungarian nation. The so-called Youth of March then took over a printing shop two streets away to print copies of their *Twelve Points* (p43) and marched to the National Museum. The rest, as they say, is history.

Different cafés catered to different groups. Actors preferred the Pannónia and businessmen the Orczy while cartoonists frequented the Lánchíd and stockbrokers the Lloyd. But the two most important in terms of the city's cultural life were the Japán and the New York.

The Café Japán at VI Andrássy út 45 — now, fittingly, Írók Boltja (the Writers' Bookshop; p150) — was a favourite haunt of artists and architects and attracted the likes of Kosztka Tivadar Csontváry, József Rippl-Rónai, Pál Merse Szinyei and Ödön Lechner. The New York Café, which opened in 1894 at VII Erzsébet körút 9-11 and quickly became the city's most celebrated literary café, hosted virtually every Hungarian writer of note at one time or another — from Kosztolányi and Endre Ady to Gyula Krúdy and Ferenc Molnár. Molnár, playwright-in-residence at the Comedy Theatre, famously threw the key to the New York into the Danube the night the café opened so that it would never close. And that's just what it did, remaining open round the clock 365 days a year for decades.

But all good things must come to an end, and the depression of the 1930s, WWII and the dreary days of communism conspired against grand old cafés in favour of the cheap (and seldom cheerful) *eszpresszó*. By 1989 and the return of the Republic of Hungary only about a dozen remained and since then even the New York, where the influential literary magazine *2000* was edited right up into the 1990s, has been turned into a swanky five-star hotel.

Nowadays you're more likely to find young Budapesters drinking a beer or a glass of wine at one of the new modern cafés. It's true — the café is very much alive in Budapest. It's just reinvented itself, that's all.

HAUER CUKRÁSZDA Map pp218-19

This café is dressed up in the finest of divine decadence – all mirrors and gold and soft piano music (on weekday evenings) with a nonsmoking section too. The selection of cakes is small but good; try the creamy *Lukács szelet* (Lukács slice).

MODERN CAFÉS

A new breed of café – all polished chrome, halogen lighting and straight lines – now coexists with the more traditional cafés. There are a few of these in Buda but the lion's share is in Pest, especially in VI Liszt Ferenc tér. There are also a few on IX Ráday utca and in V Szent István tér behind the Basilica of St Stephen. Almost all do food, some complete meals, as well as serve hot and cold drinks.

CAFÉ MIRÓ Map p220

A personal favourite in the Castle District; Miró has Med-coloured walls and furniture, snacks, cakes (300Ft to 470Ft) and main courses (1790Ft to 2890Ft) and local artwork and photography on the walls. It's open on two sides. There's also a Pest branch called Miró Grande (Map p222; 321 8666; VI Liszt Ferenc tér 9; 10am-2am; MM1 Oktogon).

CAFÉ PONYVARAGÉNY Map pp228-9

This comfortable café – all done up in warm peach tones and serving breakfast all day – remains the anchor tenant on the sunny side of 'the tér' and the court of Pest's arty aristocracy.

This eclectic place has a mixed clientele, Serbian dishes and chilli (990Ft to 1780Ft) on its menu and a few terminals for logging on to the Internet (100Ft for 10 minutes). It's one of the few places on the strip that is crowded all year.

TEAHOUSES

Teahouses serving every imaginable type of tea and tisane have become very trendy in Budapest in recent years and they're often quite stylish places.

In a small courtyard off lower Váci utca, this is the place if you want to sip a soothing blend made by tea-serious staff and lounge

There's also a Rádav utca branch (Map p224; 215 2101; IX Ráday utca 9; 11am-11pm Mon-Sat, 3pm-11pm Sun).

CLUBBING

Like everywhere else, clubs in Budapest do not really get off the ground until well after Cinderella's coach has turned into a pumpkin – or even later. Budapest's hottest DJs include Palotai, Naga and Yonderboy.

In the southern wing of Nyugati train station next to McDonald's, this positively enormous disco has rhythm and blues on the 1st floor, house and trance on the 2nd, Dance on the 3rd and funk-house (a Hungarian thing) on the 4th. Lots of young suburban types reeking of cologne and on the prowl.

THE HEAT IS ON

During Budapest's (usually) very long and very hot summer, what are called kertek, literally 'gardens' but in Budapest any outdoor spot that has been converted into an entertainment zone (including courtyards and any available stretch along the river), have been emptying out even the most popular indoor bars and clubs since 1999. The venues (and their locations) can change from year to year and a definitive list is usually not available until about May; the best single source of information is the Pestiside website (www.pestiside.hu). Some of the places listed under Bars (p123) and under Clubbing (opposite) have their own outside equivalent, and there are 'gardens' that only blossom in summer. Some of the more popular ones in recent years include those listed below.

Café del Rio (Map pp228–9: 🗃 06 30 297 2158; www.rio.hu in Hungarian; XI Goldman György tér 1: 🔀 2pm-4.30am; (a) 4 or 6) On the northern side of Petőfi Bridge on the Buda side, Rio is stylish but not up itself, with a pseudo tropical/carnival theme.

Cha Cha Cha Terasz (Map pp218–19; a 215 0545; www.chachacha.hu in Hungarian; XIII Margit-sziget; 4pm-4am: 🗐 26. 🛐 4 or 6) In the stadium at the southern tip of Margaret Island. Cha Cha Cha Terasz is an attitude-free venue with great music and dance space.

Holdudvar (Map p224; 🗃 485 5270; VIII Múzeum körút 6-8; M M2 Astoria; 🕑 8am-4am) This large courtyard on the grounds of the ELTE, the city's largest university, has a predictably split personality: earnest and coffee-drinking, wild and out of control.

Mokka Cuka (Map pp226−7; 🗃 453 2120; www.mokkacuka.hu; III Óbuda Hajógyári-sziget; 🕎 2pm-4am; HÉV Filatorigát) On the island that attracts the capital's beautiful people, Mokka Cuka is a leading outdoor underground venue showcasing great indie DJs.

Zöld Pardon (Map pp228–9; www.zp.hu in Hungarian; XI Goldman György tér; 😭 9am-6am; 📵 4 or 6) What bills itself as the 'world's longest summer festival' is a rocker's paradise just opposite the Café del Rio.

GAY & LESBIAN VENUES

What a difference a decade and a half makes! With only a couple of sleazy - actually scary - dives full of Romanian and Transylvanian hustlers a mere 15 years ago. Budapest now counts upwards of 20 gay venues and can lay claim to being Central Europe's gayest city. For useful websites, organisations and other information, see p188.

Budapest's flagship gay club is Angel (p128) but you'll probably do better starting the evening off at Mystery Bar (p124) or CoXx Pub (p124). There's a lot to say for Club Bohemian Alibi (p129) — though we can't think of anything just now - and if you're feeling frisky head for Action Bar (p123). Another great club is Upside Down (left).

Choices are more limited for girlz but there's always Café Eklektika (p123) and Angel (above) on Friday and Sunday nights if they don't mind a mixed scene. Lesbian parties are held on the first Friday of the month at Jailhouse (p132) and on the last Saturday of the month at a bar called **Candy** (Map p224; **789** 2130; V Kossuth Lajos utca 17; M M2 Astoria).

Memorial House (p61); the Military History Museum (p56); the Műcsarnok (p72); the Kiscelli Museum (p60); and the Hungarian Academy of Sciences (p66).

Be aware that many foreign films are dubbed into Hungarian, so try asking the ticket seller if the film retains the original soundtrack and has Hungarian subtitles (feliratos) or is dubbed (szinkronizált or magyarul beszélő). The latter is often abbreviated as 'mb' in listings.

Note the two wonderful reliefs outside and the monument to the 'Pesti srácok', the heroic 'kids from Pest' who fought and died here in '56.

Thermal Baths

Budapest lies on the geological fault separating the Buda Hills from the Great Plain; more than 30,000 cu metres of warm to scalding -21°C to 76°C - mineral water gush forth daily from some 120 thermal springs. As a result, the city is a major spa centre and 'taking the waters' at one of the many gyógyfürdő (thermal baths) or spa swimming pools is a real Budapest experience. Some baths date from Turkish times, others are Art Nouveau wonders, and still others are spic-and-span modern establishments.

At thermal baths, depending on the number of patrons, you will sometimes be given a number and will have to wait until it is called or appears on the electronic board. All baths and pools have cabins or lockers. Find one, get changed in it (or beside it) and call the attendant. He or she will lock the door with your clothes inside, write the time on a chalkboard on the door and hand you a numbered tag to tie on your costume. Note: In order to prevent theft lest you lose or misplace the tag, the number is not the same as the one on the locker, so commit the locker number to memory.

Though some of the local spas and baths look a little rough around the edges, they are clean and the water is changed regularly. You might consider taking along a pair of plastic sandals or flip-flops, however. Most bathhouses now require you to wear a bathing suit and no longer distribute those strange drawstring loincloths. Most of them hire out swimming costumes (around 800Ft) if you don't have your own.

Generally, entry to those baths without a deposit or voucher system (such as the Gellért, Lukács and Szécheny Baths) allows you

to stay for two hours on weekdays and 11/2 hours at weekends, though this rule is not always enforced. Most of the baths offer a full range of serious medical treatments plus services such as massage (1900/2700Ft for 15/30 minutes) and pedicure (2000Ft). Specify what you want when buying your ticket.

Please note that some baths become gay venues on male-only days - especially the Király. Not much actually goes on except for some intensive cruising, but those not into it may feel uncomfortable.

The pools maintain a constant temperature of 44°C, and the water, high in calcium, magnesium and hydrogen carbonate, is good for pains in the joints, arthritis and blood circulation. The entrance fee is actually a kind of deposit; you get back 700/400/200Ft if you leave within two/ three/four hours before 3pm and 500/200Ft if you exit within two/three hours after 3pm.

These recently renovated baths are the most Turkish of all in Budapest, built in 1566, with an octagonal pool, domed cupola with coloured glass and massive columns. It's a real zoo on mixed Friday and Saturday nights, when bathing costumes are compulsory. On men's days only you get back 700/400Ft if you leave two/three hours after you enter.

It is open to both men and women at all times and you get back 800/500/200Ft on your deposit if you leave within two/three/four hours before 3pm and 600/300Ft if you exit within two/ three hours after 3pm.

Swimming

Hungarians are keen swimmers and Budapest boasts dozens of uszoda (pools), both indoor and outdoor. They're always excellent places to get in a few laps (if indoor), cool off on a hot summer's day (if outdoor) or watch all the posers strut their stuff (both).

The system inside is similar to that at the baths (see p135) except that instead of a cabin or cubicle, there are sometimes just lockers. Many pools require the use of a bathing cap, so bring your own or wear the plastic one provided or sold for a nominal fee. Most pools hire bathing suits and towels.

Following are the best outdoor and indoor pools in the city. Some are attached to thermal baths reviewed previously; others are part of hotel wellness centres.

OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

Cycling

Parts of Budapest, including City and Népliget Parks, Margaret Island and the Buda Hills, are excellent places for cycling. At present dedicated bike lanes in the city total about 140km, including the path along Andrássy út, but that is expected to double in the next decade.

For information and advice on cycling, contact the very helpful Hungarian Cyclists' Club (MK; 206 6223, 06 30 922 9052; www .kerosz.hu) or the Hungarian Bicycle Touring Association (MKTSZ; Map p222; \$\overline{\overli mktsz@dpg.hu; VI Bajcsy-Zsilinszky út 31, 2nd fl; MM3 Arany János utca). Frigoria publishes a number of helpful guides and maps, including one called Kerékparral Budapest környékén (By Bike around Budapest; 2200Ft) that takes in the surrounding areas and describes 30 different routes. The tourist offices distribute the free, but less ambitious, Budapest & Surroundings Bicycle Route Map, with 20 recommended tours that range in length from 24km to 177km.

Bicycles can be transported on the HÉV, all Mahart boats and the Cog and Children's Railways but not on the metro, buses or trams.

There are a couple of places to rent bicycles on Margaret Island (p63) but these are just for twirling round the island. Boating

The best place for canoeing and kayaking in Budapest is on the Danube at Romai-part; take the HÉV suburban line to Rómaifürdő and walk east towards the river. Two reliable places to rent kayaks and/or canoes are Óbuda Sport Club (ÓSE; Map pp226-7; **2**40 3353; III Rozgonyi Piroska utca 28; canoes per day 1400Ft; (2) 8am-6pm) and the KSH boat club (Map pp226-7; **3**68 8967; III Királyok útja 31; 1-/2-person kayak per day 1300/ 1500Ft, 3-/4-person canoe per day 1800/ 1900Ft; Sam-6pm mid-Apr-mid-Oct).

Caving

Budapest has several caves, two of which can be visited on walk-through guided tours in Hungarian. Most of the hostels offer 4½-hour caving excursions for 2500Ft to Mátyáshegy Cave (Mátyáshegyi-barlang; Map pp226-7), a cave opposite the Pálvölgy, usually commencing at 4pm on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Pegazus Tours (Map p224; 🗃 317 1644; www.pegazus.hu; V Ferenciek tere 5) organises riding programmes as does the highly respected Favorit Lovarda (257 1065, 06 30 966 9992; XVI Mókus utca 23; HÉV Szabadságtelep) in the northeastern Csömör district.

One of the closest places to the city is this long-established riding centre at Adyliget near Hűvösvölgy, west of Budapest. By the time you read this it may have resumed lessons, paddock practice and trail riding, which were put on hold while Hungary introduced a new system of rating riding schools. In the meantime there are pony rides (1500Ft per quarter-hour) for the kiddies and carriage rides (15,000Ft per halfhour for 8 people).

Skating

Tennis & Squash

Tennis & SquashThere are some three dozen tennis clubs in Budapest usually charging between 2700Ft and 4500Ft per hour for use of their courts (clay and/or green set). Among the best are the Városmajor Tennis Academy (Map p216; 202 5337; XII Városmajor utca 63-69; \$\infty\$7am-10pm Mon-Fri, 7am-7pm Sat & Sun; ■ 28); Szépvölgyi Tennis Centre (Szépvölgyi Teniszcentrum; Map pp226-7; **3**88 1591; III Virág Benedek utca 39-41; 7am-10pm; 65 from Kolosy tér in Óbuda); and Pasarét Sport Centre (Pasaréti Sportcentrum; Map p216; 10pm Mon-Fri, 9am-9pm Sat & Sun; (2) 5).

For squash, book a court at any of the following: A&TSA Fitness Club (opposite) for 2400Ft to 4000Ft per hour; Arnold Gym (opposite) for 1950Ft to 2950Ft; or Top Squash (Map pp218-19; **a** 345 8193; II Lövőház utca 2-6; court rental 2300-4500Ft; (7am-11pm Mon-Fri, 8am-9pm Sat & Sun; M M2 Moszkva tér, (2) 4 or 6) on the 4th floor of the Mammut I shopping mall.

WATCHING SPORT

Hungarians love attending sporting matches as well as watching them on TV. The most popular spectator sports are football and water polo, though horse racing and motor racing also have their fans.

For its size and population, Hungary has done extremely well in the Olympics. It finished 13th overall at both the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens and the ones in Sydney in 2000, with exactly the same number of medals: 17 (eight gold, six silver and three bronze). At the 1996 games in Atlanta, it placed 12th with 21 medals and at Barcelona in 1992 the ranking was eighth with 30 medals.

Football

Hungary's descent from being on top of the heap of European football to a *béka segge alatt* – literally, 'under the arse of the frog' as the Hungarians describe something *really* far down – remains one of life's great mysteries. Hungary's defeat of the England team both at Wembley (6–3) in 1953 and at home (7–1) the following year, are still talked about as if the winning goals were scored yesterday.

There are four premier league football teams in Budapest out of a total 12 playing nationwide, including Kispest-Honvéd, which plays at the city's József Bozsik Stadium (282 9791, 282 9789; XIX Új temető út 1-3; 36), southeast of the centre, accommodating 15,000 spectators; MTK at Hungária Stadium (Map pp218–19; 219 0300; VIII Salgótarjáni utca 12-14; 1 or 1/a), to the east of Kerepes Cemetery, for 8000 people; and UTE at UTE Stadium (369 7333; IV Megyeri út 13; 47 or 96), in Újpest, with room for 15,000 fans.

But no club dominates Hungarian football like Ferencváros (FTC), which is the country's loudest and brashest team, and its only hope. You either love the Fradi boys in their green and white or you hate them. You can watch them play at the FTC Stadium (Map pp228–9; 215 1013; IX Könyves Kálmán körút 26; MM Népliget), near Népliget Park, with space for 18,000. The daily Nemzeti Sport (National Sport; 99Ft), available from newsstands everywhere, has the game schedules.

Horse Racing

The descendants of the nomadic Magyars are keen on horse racing. Kincsem Park (Map p216; 433 0522; www.kincsempark.com; X Albertirsai út 2; M2 Pillangó utca), which was recently renovated, is the place to go for both *ügető* (trotting) and *galopp* (flat racing). Schedules can change but in general three trotting meetings of 10 to 11 races take place each week, usually at 3pm on Saturday and Sunday and at 4pm or 5pm on Wednesday year-round. Flat racing usually takes place from 2pm on Thursday and Sunday between May and early November.

Motor Racing

Reintroduced in 1986 following a hiatus of half a century, the Formula 1 Hungarian Grand Prix (a 28-444 444; www.hungaroring.hu) is part of the World Championship Series that takes place at the Hungaroring at Mogyoród, 24km northeast of Budapest, in August. Practice is on the Friday, the qualifying warm-up on Saturday and the race begins after morning practice at 2pm on Sunday. The only seats with views of the starting grid are Super Gold ones and cost €400 for the weekend; cheaper are Gold (€300 to €320), which are near the pit lane, and Silver (€225 to €250) tickets. Standing room costs €110 for the weekend, €100 for Sunday.

Water Polo

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
