


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
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

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### THE VAN CLEEF FAMILY

### INTRODUCTION

The Van Cleef family in the United States also includes those who spell the name Van Cleaf, Cleave, Cleft, Cleve and Van Clief, and was founded by Jan Van Cleef who emigrated to New Netherland in 1653. Various stories of his origin, indicating him to have been a son of the last Duke of Cleves in the Rhine-land or a scion of that princely house, have been circulated here, but, as none are supported by any factual evidence, they merit little serious consideration. Possibly Jan was born in or near Cleves, since the Dutch "Van" with a capital "V" as used in the early New Amsterdam Church records generally meant "born at," and they usually spelled the Rhineland town and duchy as "Cleef." We see that this tradition of a Rhineland origin was carried into the fifth generation in the memoires of Benjamin Van Cleve, one of the founders of Dayton, Ohio.

The Van Cleef family of Kings County, N.Y., had a senior line which remained there in the vicinity of Gravesend for at least eight generations—the only such instance found by the writer among Dutch families. Others settled in New Jersey, first in Monmouth County, then in Hunterdon, Middlesex and Somerset Counties, where many still remain, and in old Bergen County.

One from Middlesex went to North Carolina, his sons helped settle

Kentucky, and from there Van Cleaves spread into Indiana, Iowa,
and elsewhere in the west. It was some Monmouth County Van Cleves,
however, who settled in Ohio and Missouri, and a Hunterdon County
descendant who founded the Michigan and Minnesota lines, while a
Bergen County Van Cleve left many descendants in Illinois. The
progeny of all these are now found throughout the country.

In general it can be said that those who spell the name Van Cleaf descend from Monmouth County lines; Van Cleave from the Kentucky, Indiana and Iowa families; Van Cleef from Kings and Somerset Counties, although some Monmouth County members who returned to Long Island resumed this spelling; Van Cleft from those in Orange County, N.Y.; Van Cleve primarily from Hunterdon County, but also from some from Bergen and Monmouth Counties who settled in Illinois, Pennsylvania and Ohio, and lastly Van Clief from those who lived on Staten Island, N.Y. It was found, however, that the surname spelling sometimes adopted was that best known in the state or locality, regardless of the settler's origin. It is quite evident that some in the middle generations who could not write left the spelling of their names to the whims of clerks.

### FIRST GENERATION

1. Jan/John Van Cleef, the progenitor of the Van Cleef family in America, was born about 1627 or 1628, according to an official statement he made 14 February 1664, when he gave his age as thirty-six years. It has been said that Jan was from or born in Amsterdam, and, although there are numerous "van Kleef" baptismal records there going back before 1600, Jan's baptism was not found in them. It is notable, too, that he was never referred to by a patronymic, so not even his father's name is known. His surname suggests that his ancestors or he was from the Rhenish Duchy of Cleve (Kleve or Cleves) adjacent to The Netherlands.

According to his oath of allegiance in 1687, Jan emigrated in 1653. It has been said that he first appeared as a farmer in Gravesend, Long Island, in 1656 and possibly was living in New Utrecht as early as 1659 (KCo. 315). But in the published Court Minutes of New Amsterdam (RNA 1:287) on 22 February 1655 "Jan van Cleeff" was a plaintiff in a suit at the City Hall of New Amsterdam. Although previously a property owner, on 23 December 1662 he bought of Albert Terhune 24 morgens of land in New Utrecht, land which he had sold to Balthazar de Vos by 1669. As representative of New Utrecht, he appeared 9 October 1663 at New Amsterdam to warn of a gathering of 300 English at Jamaica, and was in turn

given a letter from the government to take back to New Utrecht (DHNY 14:536). On 14 February 1664 Jan, then aged 36 as mentioned above, was among other inhabitants of New Utrecht who testified in New Amsterdam against the English Captain Scott who was menacing the Dutch settlements. Stiles in his <u>History of Brooklyn</u> (2:339) states that Jan Van Cleef represented Bushwick in the General Assembly 10 April 1664, but this was probably an erroneous reading of the records, since nowhere else does he appear in connection with Bushwick. O'Callahan in his New Netherlands Register shows him in the Assembly on that date, but with no geographical designation. In August 1665 Jan acknowledged owing Willem Jansen 350 gld. in the Gravesend Record (KCo. 166) and in 1668 he sued Pieter Jansen, as per Liber D of the Flatbush Record (KCo. 164), while in 1670 he sold some of his land in New Utrecht to Nicholas de Meyer (KCo. 92). Although living in New Utrecht, it is apparent that Jan maintained his original connection with Gravesend.

Jan and Adriaen Willemsen (Bennet) represented the inhabitants of New Utrecht on 2 February 1672 in a dispute over the common lands with Jacques Cortelyou (DHNY 14:1660). In 1677 Jan was listed as a member of the Dutch Church of New Utrecht. On 27 December the same year he bought of Arie Willemse (Bennet) a pasture lot in New Utrecht, for which in exchange Bennet conveyed to him Lot Nos. 6 & 7 in Yellow Hook (Bay Ridge) where Jan already owned Lot Nos. 13 & 14 (KCo. 315). In the next year Jan was Constable of New Utrecht, and in 1686 he was named in Governor Dongan's patent for the town.

Jan's last appearance of record was in the 1698 census of New Utrecht wherein his family consisted of one male, one female, and four children (DHNY 3:88), or, as in the original transcript, Jan, Enggel, Hannes, Benieniman, Cattryn, and Sytien (PCSB - Peter Cortelyou's Surveying Book, LIHS); Enggel was thus the wife, and the last four the unmarried children still at home.

It was stated (KCo. 314) that Jan Van Cleef married prior to 10 March 1681 Engeltje Louwerens; this was a clerical error for 1661 as on 10 March that year payment of her inheritance to Engeltje Laurens, then wife of Jan Van Cleef, was authorized by the court. Engeltje, who was the daughter of Louwerens Pieterse "de Norman" and his wife Annetje Pieters (married 18 August 1641; he from Tonsburg, Norway, and she from Brutschein, Germany; MDC & NYB&GR 84:81), had been baptized in the New Amsterdam Dutch Church 15 July 1646 (sponsors: Pieter Janszen Noorman, Adrian Laurens de Noorman, and Maryken Thymens). It still seems remarkable that there were no baptisms of Jan and Engeltje's children recorded till 1681, and it was this gap, together with the wrong year of marriage above, that persuaded some (including the writer, at first) that there had been two Jans, father and son. The most likely explanation for this gap is that the earlier children of Jan and Engeltje were all baptized at the Flatbush Dutch Church, as were those later whose records we have, but its extant records only start late in 1677.

Jan left no will, and the time of his death is not known. Although the record does not so state, it is felt that the Angelica Van Cleef who married 1/4 Mar. 1701, Gravesend RDC, John Emans Jr. was Jan Van Cleef's widow (Gravesend TR; RECORD 4:200), as John Emans' children were all by a previous wife. Engeltje as "Van Cleef" (error?) was a baptismal sponsor with her eldest son Cornelius 25 December 1711, Jamaica Dutch Church, for her grandson Joseph (No. 42), son of her son Joseph. John Emans named her in his will 1715; the time of her death is not known.

Whether or not John Emans' wife was Jan Van Cleef's widow or an unrecorded daughter is hard to decide, but the overriding consideration is that there was no daughter Engeltje/Angelica listed in the 1698 census (unless the Enggel appearing there was a daughter and not his wife, as presumed in DHNY) and that Angelica, wife of John Emans, apparently had no children, which seems more like a widow in her second marriage rather than a 21-year old girl. On the other hand, we have to assume that, if a remarried widow, Engeltje's last name was wrongly recorded when she sponsored young Joseph Van Cleef 1711 at Jamaica—an understandable mistake, since

the others at the baptism were Van Cleefs and, as she was the mother and grandmother of the two Josephs, the pastor may have wrongly assumed her married name was Van Cleef.

In this connection it should be noted that there is no record of Jan Van Cleef after 1698, and that he did not appear after that as a baptismal sponsor, as one would expect, for any of his numerous grandchildren. Therefore it seems that he died between the taking of the census in New Utrecht in 1698 and the remarriage of his presumed widow in 1701.

<sup>1.</sup> It seems odd that neither son Joseph nor daughter Maritje were listed in the 1698 census in their father's household. It has been suggested that Joseph was the "Hannes" in the census; this might be acceptable on the assumption that it was an erroneous recording, were there not evidence of another Johannes or John in the Staten Island census of about 1706. So where were Joseph and Maritje living in 1698? Perhaps young Joseph, then about 14 years old, was an apprentice living in another household or was already experiencing the wanderlust evident in his later life. Mary, then only about 13 (if our presumed year of birth is nearly correct), would hardly have been married then (all evidence points to her marriage later), so she was probably living in the household of some relative, perhaps outside New Utrecht—the only town in which all names in the 1698 census are known.

### SECOND GENERATION

Cornelius 2 Van Cleef, eldest son of Jan No. 1 and his wife Engeltje Laurens, was born probably in Kings Co., N.Y., about 1665 and he took the Oath of Allegiance in New Utrecht as a native in 1687. He was probably raised in that town, but in 1700 he bought land in Gravesend from Paulus Dircks Amerman (Gravesend Record, RECORD 64:238), and 10 March 1704/5 he sold two acres of land in New Utrecht for £130 to Anthony Holsart (Kings Deeds 4:77); his wife Femmetje consented to this sale, which included a house and rights to town lands. Then 30 April 1706, Cornelius, as living in Gravesend, sold to Jacques Cortelyou his interest in a tract of land called the "gun-field," also known as Brighton or La Grange, as per an unrecorded deed among the Isaac Cortelyou papers (KCo. 314). He was assessed for 18 acres in 1706. On 10 August 1708 he sold a 21-acre plot in New Utrecht known as the Island, as per an unrecorded deed in the Lefferts papers, and lastly, 26 September 1713, he sold to Cornelis Van Brunt 28 acres fronting on Gravesend-New Utrecht Bay. as per deed among Rutger A. Van Brunt papers (ibid.). His name appeared on the New Utrecht assessment roll of 1693 and the

Gravesend census of 1698, which places his move to Gravesend between those dates. In the census enumeration (DHNY 3:88) he was shown as having a wife and two children, a listing which disagrees with the number of children given below, all of whom are presumed to have been born before 1698.

Cornelius married Femmetje, daughter of Jan Pieterszen Van Deventer and Maria Hogeboom, baptized Holland 4 April 1658 (Van Deventer Family), making her somewhat older than her husband. As Pheby Van Clift she was listed in Gravesend in the 1738 census (DHNY 4:126), having in her household 1 male over 10 and 1 male under 10 years old who have not been identified. Of their issue, son Isaac's will, in which he named his three brothers, ties the four (\*) together, and Lawrence's baptism definitely places them all as sons of Cornelius and Phebe.

- Isbrandt<sup>2</sup> Van Cleef, second surviving son of Jan No. 1 7. and Engeltje Laurens, was born about 1677 probably in Kings County, N.Y., where he was doubtless raised. As a grand juror in the session in 1699 (KCo. 314), he must have been at least twenty-one at the time, and he was listed as aged 28 in the census of Staten Island (NJMis.) which is commonly believed to have been taken in 1706. He did not remain permanently on Staten Island, however, as he was a butcher in New York City in 1713. He and his wife became members of the New York Dutch Church 31 August 1714, with letters from Flatbush (RECORD 59:377), but on 26 July2 1711 they had been baptismal sponsors on Staten Island, which might indicate that they had moved from there between 1711 and 1713 (GBC 4:15). After January 1716 Isbrandt lived in Middletown, Monmouth Co., N.J., where he ran a tavern. As "Isebrandt Van Cleefe of Middletown, merchant," on 1 May 1717 he executed a full power of attorney to his "beloved wife Yannekye" to handle his

affairs and (Monmouth Deeds F:17) presumably turned over his property to her. This explains the small amount of £20.12.3 in the inventory of his estate taken at Freehold 13 January 1728/9. This date suggests that Isbrandt died 1728.

- Much of the undocumented data on this and succeeding families in this generation were obtained from a manuscript genealogy of the Van Cleefs in the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, the authority (except for the three above where baptismal records are cited) for listing those above as children of Isbrandt. In his case, identifying Isbrandt's presumed sons through their naming of sons for his does not work, since, oddly enough, none of his four sons--either known or supposed--named any of their numerous sons for him, although three of them named a daughter Jane for their mother.
- Jan No. 1 & Engeltje Laurens, was baptized with his brother Benjamin 25 November 1683 in the Brooklyn Dutch Church. He appears to have moved from New Utrecht, where he was no doubt raised (although he was not listed in his father's household there in the 1698 census), to Queens County between 1709 and 1711 when his first recorded son was baptized in the Jamaica Dutch Church. It is possible, however, that he had already been to Virginia and owned land there, as on 9-10 April 1712, Essex County, Va., William Bury signed a lease and release for land described as being "by Joseph Van Cleve," but he was back in Jamaica on 15 May 1712 when

he was a sponsor at the baptism of his niece Catrina Van Liew in the Dutch Church there. But he still held land in Virginia and perhaps lived there a while, as in July 1715 land is referred to as "adjoining Joseph Van Cleve" (Fleet, Virginia Colonial Abstracts, 8:14,9:19), although he was also in Queens County again in 1715 when he was listed as a soldier in Capt. Timothy Bagley's Horse. It is perhaps significant that we have no baptismal record for his son Lawrence thought to have been born in this interval. Joseph and his wife Catherine appeared as baptismal sponsors in the Jamaica Dutch Church up through 1721, and we surmise that she may have died not long after that. It was said in the previously cited manuscript (p. 20) that Joseph married secondly and had more children after 1729; this was the Van Wicklen marriage, and from baptismal records of their children it is evident that the family moved to Monmouth County, N.J., where Joseph's twin brother Benjamin was living. Possibly Joseph's second wife died after the baptism of their last child 8 April 1733, as we find Joseph back in Jamaica with Aeltje Dorlant as baptismal sponsors for Garret, son of Evert Van Wicklen (second wife's relative) 13 May 1733.

We lost track of Joseph until 1744 when he and his son Lawrence witnessed the will of Geertie, widow of John Vliet of Six
Mile Run, Somerset Co. (NJ Lib. 3:455); possibly he lived with
his son Lawrence at Raritan in the interval. Joseph's last appearance was as a Freeholder of New Brunswick in 1752 (Monette,

<u>Early Settlers of Piscataway & Woodbridge</u>, 381), and on 6 January

1755 a farm containing 150 acres, a good new house, barn, orchard, saw mill and 6 acres of fresh meadow 6 miles out of New Brunswick on Georges Road, formerly the property of <u>Joseph Van Cliff</u>, was advertized for sale by Peter Pra Van Zandt in <u>The New York Mercury</u> (Library of Congress), so he had apparently died in this interval.

Benjamin<sup>2</sup> Van Cleef, fourth son known to have left 13. issue of Jan No. 1 and Engeltje Laurens, was baptized 25 November 1683 in the Flatbush Dutch Church with his brother Joseph: although the record makes no mention of it. they were probably twins, as their parents had baptized a previous child only two years before. Benjamin settled in Monmouth Co.. N.J.. probably near Freehold, before 1711 when he and his wife were listed as members of the Freehold-Middletown Dutch Church (as well as in 1731), and in the fall of 1711 they were baptismal sponsors for two of his wife's nephews (GMNJ v. 22). Benjamin increased his land holding there by purchasing for \$500 of William Clark land and buildings adjacent to that he already held 30 March 1722, and on the following 27 June another property for £470 (Monmouth Deeds G:62,82). Then 12 April 1729 Benjamin and Lawrence Van Cleef (probably his nephew. No. 24) purchased part of the estate of Ambrose Stelle of Matawan, Monmouth County. Benjamin's name was mentioned in several wills and estates in the county; those of Peter Watson 1713. John Bowne 1714, John Taylor 1721, and as executor in the will of Henry Kip of Middletown 1733. In his own will 26 September, probated 12 November 1747 (NJA 30:494), he named his wife and Children (\*); executors were his sons John, Richard, Benjamin, his wife, and his friend John Brocaw; witnesses were David, Elbert, and Arthur Williamson.

Benjamin married Henrietta (Hank), daughter of Derick Jans Sutphen and Lysbeth Van Nuys, baptized 18 December 1681, Flatlands RDC, who was said (KCo. 291) to have been the widow of Pieter (Benjamin #13 - Cont.)

(\*), and the children of his deceased son Cornelius; executors
were his wife and son Rem; witnesses were Engelbert Lott, Hendrick Suydam, and S. Gerritsen.

Isaac<sup>3</sup> Van Cleef. third son of Cornelius No. 3 and 24. Femmetje Van Deventer, was born about 1694 probably at Gravesend, Kings Co., N.Y., where he was most likely raised. Little is known of Isaac and his family except that he joined in the general family migration to Monmouth Co., N.J.; he was first recorded there in a deed 5 May 1725 from John Job of Freehold to Lawrence and Isaac Van Cleve of Gravesend (Monmouth Deeds H:22). Isaac's will dated 25 August, probated 2 October 1732 (NJ Lib. 3: 160), shows that he died at an early age leaving only under-age children; it was probably for this reason that none of them were named in the will. He did specify that his eldest son was to receive £10 more in the division of his estate, being the legacy left him by his uncle Jacobus (No. 23). He also directed his executors to make title to his brother Lawrence for the "plantation" on which he lived upon Lawrence's discharge of a mortgage of 1112 to his brother John, a statement that definitely ties Isaac into this particular family. Cornelius Van Horne and Joseph Forman were named trustees for the children; executors were his wife and "brother" Joseph Forman and friend Cornelius Van Horne; witnesses were Richard Saltar, Jacob Morris, and Mary Morris. His estate was inventoried 20 September 1731 at 1419.12.6, a fairly substantial sum in those days.

Isaac married Rebecca, daughter of Samuel and Mary (Wilbore) Forman, a prominent English family of Monmouth County, born September 1699, died 19 September 1748 (Hornor, This Old Monmouth of Ours, 99).

Lawrence Van Cleef, fourth son of Cornelius No. 3 and 25. Femmetje Van Deventer, was baptized 25 April 1696 in the Brooklyn Dutch Church, but he was no doubt born and raised on the family farm at Gravesend, N.Y. He was listed in Capt. Thomas Stilwell's Co., Col. Richard Stilwell's Regt., Kings County Militia, in 1715 (DHNY 3:115), but later joined in the family removal to Monmouth Co., N.J., where 5 May 1725 "Lawrence and Isaac Van Cleve of Gravesend" bought/land from John Job of Freehold (Monmouth Deeds H:22). Then 12 April 1729 Benjamin (No. 11) and Lawrence Van Cleef purchased part of the estate of Ambrose Stelle of Matawan, Monmouth County; it is thought that this was actually a purchase of Lawrence with the financial backing of his uncle, who was already well established at Freehold. In 1731 his elder brother Isaac in his will directed the executors to deed to Lawrence the farm on which he lived, upon Lawrence's discharge of a mortgage of £112 to their elder brother John. He apparently remained in Monmouth County through 1742, the baptism of his last child, but whether he later moved to Somerset County where his children eventually settled, is uncertain. It is felt that the earlier references to the name there refer to his cousin No. 43, while those at the time of the Revolution were probably to his son of the same name. As Lawrence left no will, it is impossible to even estimate the time of his death.

Lawrence married Jannetje, daughter of Jacob Laan/Lane and Elizabeth Van Barkelo of Freehold, so named and left 140 in her father's will 1 November 1738.

His own will, dated 13 April, probated 15 December 1772 (NJA 34:536) named his wife and children (\*); his eldest son Chreinyance was to receive the plantation in Hopewell, N.J. and to

pay sons Aaron and Joseph ±300; the latter were to have the mansion after his death and pay son Benjamin ±400, and the daughters were to get ±100 each; executors were son Aaron and son-in-law Waters Smith; witnesses were William North and Benjamin Brearley. John died 6 November 1772, aged 72, and was buried in the Lawrenceville Cemetery.

John married Cornelia, daughter of Crineyonce Van Mater and his aunt Neeltje Van Cleef (No. 6), who died 4 August 1782 (3 August, N.J. State Gazette, 8/7/1782), in her 78th year, and was also buried at Lawrenceville. As we have no baptismal records for any of their children, it is presumed that they had left the Dutch Church.

As an adult he settled in New Brunswick where he and his brother Benjamin were listed as freeholders in 1748 and 1750 (Monette, op.cit., 358,380-1) and where they were in business together. Aaron is said<sup>2</sup> to have gone on a bond for a friend for which he had to pay, and, because of this loss, he moved to Rowan County in North Caroline in May 1750; he had been reported in the Boston Weekly News Letters (NJA) as sailing between Boston and Perth Amboy 1743-4. He bought a farm from Daniel Boone and Rebecca, his wife, 21 February 1764, when the latter went to Kentucky for the first time (Rowan Deeds 5:450). He was listed in the Rowan County tax list of 1768, then that of 1778 as Aaron Van Cleve, Sr. He participated in the Mecklenburg Convention and its declaration of

20 May 1775, which some consider to have been the first declaration of independence in this country. He died in 1780 and was buried with his wife in Joppa Cemetery, Salisbury, N.C.

Aaron married Rachael, daughter of Jan Roelofse Schenck and Sarah Couwenhoven, baptized 19 February 1709 (KCo. 251), in 1734 in Mrs. Wisda's account<sup>2</sup>. His descendants all used the spelling "Van Cleave," sometimes written as one word.

- This listing and birth dates were given by Mrs. Wisda and cop-3. ied by Errett Van Cleave in his appendix to the History of the Van Cleave Family, "from notes of James William Van Cleave" (designated JWmVC to distinguish from James Wallace Van Cleave's The Van Cleave Family, henceforth JWaVC, whose account was presented to the Kentucky Historical Society about 1932 and later to the Indiana State Library; JwmVC's history, also there, was compiled some time after 1899). The specific birth date for Benjamin No. 104 is from JWmVC, who listed them in the order: Aaron "the first son, " Benjamin "second son, " John "third son, " Billy, Ralph, Samuel "married and moved to Virginia," Thisgen "is unknown, moved to Ohio," Jame. As no trace of Samuel or Cary/Thisgen has been found, we doubt their existence, particularly as elder sons, although chronologically it is likely there were two children before John who perhaps died young; both JWaVC and JWmVC state that Aaron had seven sons and one daughter Jane. Miss Moorhouse has suggested that 'Cary' was possibly derived from 'Carolinus' for the family's new home and that he was born in North Carolina about 1751 (Cary is a diminutive of both Charles or Carolius); if an elder son, Cary would have been past middle age when Ohio was first setled. Both names are more likely to have originated in North Carolina rather than in the Jersey Dutch section; when Samuel and Cary are put at the end of the list of children, then the customary Dutch naming pattern seems to have been followed, except that no son was named for the paternal grandfather -- but then none of Aaron's brothers named a son Isbrandt either.

JWmVC's account is inaccurate in that it starts the family with Aaron as the progenitor in America, omitting the earlier generations; though long and rambling, it gives some colorful early history of those in his line. JWaVC's record,

in addition to covering his own line, gives some valuable and interesting original records on the others sons of Aaron No. 33 in Kentucky. The voluminous notes of William E. Van Cleave were the most help with the large group of the family which settled in Indiana even though he concentrated mainly on the Van Cleaves in Montgomery County.

- 5. JWaVC stated (p. 18) that all of Aaron's children were Presbyterians, which could explain why we have so few of their baptismal records, as not many records of Presbyterian Churches in New Jersey have been preserved or published.
- 4. Pre-Revolutionary Virginia included all of what is now Kentucky, first organized as a county of Virginia before being subdivided into other counties, which in 1792 organized as a separate state and was admitted to the union, therefore Virginia with its other western claims covered a much wider area. No record of Samuel has been found in the original State of Virginia of 1789.

Lawrence Van Cleef, eldest surviving son of Joseph No. 43. 12 and Catherine Rapalje, was born about 1713 probably in Essex County, Va., where his parents appear to have lived until 1715, when they returned to Queens Co., N.Y., and then moved to Monmouth Co., N.J. about 1730. According to his children's baptisms, Lawrence settled near Raritan, Somerset Co., N.J. by 1735 and remained there until 1748 or later. It was presumably this Lawrence who, with his father Joseph, witnessed the will 1744 of Geertje, widow of John Vliet of Six Mile Run, Somerset Co. (N.J. Lib. 3:455), and also in 1750 that of John Post of Amwell, Hunterdon Co., who was probably his brother-in-law. Lawrence "Vankleef" and Tunis Post were among those paid by the estate of Christian Horseman of Middletown, Monmouth Co., 1742 (NJA 30:247). After 1748 Lawrence seems to have disappeared from New Jersey records (assuming references to the name during the Revolution were to his cousin No. 86), and it is thought he perhaps moved to Orange Co., N.Y., with his younger brother Gerrit. Although no record has been found of him there, there is good evidence that most of his known children lived in the area. No probate records have been found for him in either state.

Gerrit 3 Van Cleve, third surviving son of Joseph No. 12, 48. this by his second wife Sytje Van Wicklen, was baptized 8 April 1733 at the Marlboro Dutch Church in Monmouth Co., N.J. Presumably he was raised there and in Somerset County where his father later moved. Gerrit appears to have settled in Orange Co.. N.Y., before 10 January 1763 when he witnessed the will of Eda Mier of Orange Township, Orange County. In the will (WNYHS 7:47) Eda named her daughter Willermintie who evidently became Gerrit's wife later. In the Revolution Gerrit or Garret served in Capt. Onderdonk's Company, Col. Hay's 2nd Regiment, Orange Co. militia; also in Capt. Bowen's Co., Col. Weissenfel's Regt. of Levies (CDNY 15:496). He was listed for land bounty rights as of the 2nd Regiment of Orange County (NY in Rev., 254). In Clarkstown 1787 Garret Van Clief was taxed on real estate valued at 121 and on personal property at L4 (Tompkins, History of Rockland County, 436). Some time after that he moved into Bergen County, N.J., where he died 1 August 1816, aged 84.4.17 (born 15 April 1732), and was buried as "Garret Van Cleve" at Lily Ponds (or Crooked Pond) Cemetery at Oakland, N.J., where he apparently lived the latter part of his life . The fact that his baptism was delayed nearly a year tends to support our surmise that his mother died at his birth.

John's bond was referred to in the estate of John Hepburn Jr., of Freehold 1746; he witnessed the will of Sarah, widow of Dr. Nichols of Monmouth County 1755, and he was a fellowbondsman in the estates of Anthony Headden and William Vannorte, both of Monmouth County 1772 (NJA). His will, dated 28 September, probated 3 November 1777, gave his wife Sara half of the movable estate and his brother Richard's son John 10; after the death of his wife, the estate was to be divided between children of brothers Richard and Benjamin, and of his sisters Elizabeth, Alice, Nellie, and Mary.

## FOURTH GENERATION

61. Cornelius Van Cleef, eldest son of Johannes No. 22 and Elsje-Dorland, was born about 1719 probably on the family farm at Gravesend, Kings Co., N.Y. Later he settled in Somerset Co., N.J., where he died fairly young--before Oct. 21, 1749, when his father, John Van Cleef of Long Island, was named administrator of his estate. In 1752 his father also named the children (\*) of his deceased son Cornelius in his will.

Cornelius married Femmetje, daughter of Michael Van der Veer and Belitje Suydam, of New Utrecht, baptized there Dec. 6, 1724 (RECORD 68:210), but there is no record of this marriage. After the death of Cornelius, however, Femmetje/Phoebe married (2) Jacob Cashow, who, in his will May 23, 1765, gave three of his wife's children, Belitie, Michael, and Femmetie, each 140, and Ida, widow of Jacob Lefferts (identified as a Van der Veer by Bergen in his Lefferts Family, 51), in her will of June 6, 1803 (Kings Co. Wills 11:58), named her nephew Michael Van Cleef and her niece Belitje Van Steenberg.

63. Rem<sup>4</sup> Van Cleef, second son of Johannes No. 22 and Elsje Dorland, was born about 1723 probably at Gravesend in Kings Co, N.Y., on the family farm. Nothing is known of his life, except that it was most likely spent in Kings County, as the only later record we have of him is in the baptism of his daughter.

Obviously his two supposed sons, as given in a chart furnished to the Holland Society by Frank C. Van Cleef, belonged to his family, as they were named for their two grandfathers, according to Dutch custom. The time of his death is not known.

Rem married at the Flatbush Dutch Church, 26 October 1745, Maria, daughter of Hendrick Elderts (Van Voorhees) and Greetje Wyckoff of Jamaica. The date of her death is also unknown.

first wife was a Van de Water and that family was not identified with Monmouth County. This was a reversal of the general trend, and therefore it brought his parentage into question; however, he named his one son of record <u>Isaac</u>, indicating that to have been his father's name, and secondly, the only Van Cleef left in Kings County who could have been his father was his uncle Johannes No. 22, who already had a son Cornelius. Little is known of his life.

Cornelius was married three times; (1) 15 June 1745, Flatbush RDC, Enghye, presumed daughter of Cornelius Van de Water & Petronella Clopper (RECORD 98:214), by whom he apparently had no issue: (2) Sara Dorland, possibly the daughter of Karel & Marytje (de Mott?) Dorland, baptized 2 April 1721, Jamaica RDC.

doubt named his eldest daughter <u>Rebecca</u> for his mother; this, together with the elimination of all other possible fathers in the third generation, is good presumptive evidence of his parentage. John moved, first possibly to Millstone, later to Six Mile Run in Somerset Co., N.J., where he made his will. In this, dated 30 June 1808, probated 30 May (inventoried 6 May) 1811 (NJA 41:390), he left his farm of 364 acres and a wood lot of 34 acres in the Great Swamp of Middlesex County to his son John and named daughters and sons-in-law (\*), who, with son John, were also executors; witnesses were Adrian & Benjamin Hagerman and Peter Strycker. He was possibly the John said to have served with Morgan's Ranger as a captain and guide in 1773; there was a "Cap. John Van Cliff" who owed the estate of Peter Van Kirk of Somerset County 123 in 1774 (NJA 34:546). John died 13 May 1811 in his 81st year and was buried with both his wives in Elm Ridge Cemetery, Somerset County.

Although no marriage record has been found, John had a second wife who was buried with him: "Sarah Van Cleef, daughter of William Van Duyn of Raritan," died 7 Jan. 1805, aged 77.1.7, but there is no record of any issue. Sarah was the widow of Andrew Emans of Somerset County by whom she had several children.

73. Juryas 4 Van Cleef, presumed third and youngest son of Isaac No. 24 and Rebecca Forman, was possibly their unnamed child baptized 13 March 1726 at the Marlboro Dutch Church in Monmouth Co., N.J.; he could, however, have been a later, unrecorded child of this family, as it is to be noted that he did not have children until 1751. Also, it is curious that of Juryas's four recorded daughters, none were named Rebecca for his mother; this would cast some doubt as to his presumed parentage, but for the likelihood that his second son was named Isaac for his father.

Like his elder brother John, Juryas also moved to Somerset County, probably near Millstone where in 1771 he inventoried the estate of John Van der Veer (NJA 34:540). Although he was a contributor to the Dutch Church at Neshanic in 1761 (SCHSQ v.7), his will was

made at Millstone 14 February 1778 and probated 4 November 1782 (NJA 34:405). In it were named his wife Ida and his children (\*), including son Isaac "now in Virginia;" executors were sons Garret and Isaac, cousin Lawrence Van Cleef (prob. No. 86), and friend Peter Stryker. His estate claimed losses of £132.13.10 in the Revolution (SCHSQ 1:285).

His wife Ida has not been identified, but she is thought to have been a Suydam, and, judging from the names of her first two children, her parents were probably named Garret and Elizabeth.

Chrineyance 4 Van Cleve, eldest son of John No. 21 and 91. Cornelia Van Mater, was born 1729-30 (grave) probably near Maidenhead, Hunterdon Co. (now Lawrenceville, Mercer Co.), N.J., where his parents had settled after leaving Monmouth County. Under his father's will Chrineyance inherited a plantation in Hopewell (farther north in Hunterdon County) where he made his home. In the town records there he was listed as one of the survevors in 1764-66 (pp. 29-30). In 1771 he inventoried the estate of Vinson Runyan of Hopewell, and in 1773 he was administrator of the estate of Phillip Phillips of Hunterdon County, who was probably his father-in-law. Chrineyance died 8 February 1774, aged 44 and was buried in the Hunt Graveyard, Mercer County; his estate was inventoried at 1563.3.3 by his brother Joseph 10 March; his wife Penelope and brother Benjamin were appointed administrators on 1 April (NJA 34:393).

Chrineyance married Penelope Phillips (CTE<sup>1</sup> 292), probably a daughter of Phillip Phillips, above. No baptismal records for their children have been found; possibly none were recorded, as both Hopewell and Maidenhead were some distance from the nearest Dutch Church, and those of other denominations mostly have been lost or not published.

Benjamin also served as a first lieutenant in the Hunterdon Co. militia, then captain in same at the Battle of Long Island; also captain in Col. Johnson's Battalion, Heard's Brigade 14 June 1776, and was promoted to second major in the 1st Regiment, Hunterdon Co., 15 March 1777. On 13 November 1777 he resigned from the service after his election to the New Jersey Assembly, to which he was almost continuously reelected until 1805; he served as its speaker 1784-86, again 1788.

Several times he was a justice of the peace of Hunterdon County between 1776 and 1797, and he was made judge of the Hunterdon Court of Common Pleas 18 December 1782. He died 29/31 August 1817, aged 71 (<u>Trenton Federalist</u>, 9/8/1817), and was buried in Lawrenceville Cemetery. His will was the subject of celebrated litigation.

When he was on his deathbed, his original will, leaving the bulk of his property to son Joseph and smaller bequests to his three daughters, disappeared from its accustomed place of safekeeping. Since this location was known to at least one of the sisters, it was suspected (as hinted later) that she or they stole it so that Benjamin would appear to have died intestate, and that they would therefore receive a larger share of the inheritance. Benjamin hastily made another will, substantially the same as the first, but when he was to sign it, the only available disinterested witness was a stranger, an alleged ne'er-do-well, passing along the road on foot in front of the homestead. After Benjamin's death, the sisters tried to void the will on the ground that their father in his last hours had been mentally incapable of making a will. When the witness testified as to the old gentleman's apparent mental capacity, the sisters attempted to impugn his character and status in society. The lower courts upheld the will, but two of the sisters carried the case to the federal courts, and it was eventually heard before Associate Justice Bushrod Washington (a nephew of the President), who also upheld the will and gave Joseph the property.

During this controversy Joseph appears to have been favored by the community, and afterwards the two sisters disappeared from

history, so it was said. The full story was given in, "An Interesting Case, Being an Account of the Legal Controversy Over the Will of Benjamin Van Cleve, A Soldier of the Revolution, &c., by Edwin Robert Walker, his great-great-grandson, Chancellor of New Jersey," lecture, Trenton Historical Society, 19 May 1927, later reprinted in a pamphlet.

He married Hannah, daughter of Jacob Carle, who named her in his will in 1800 (NJA 38:59), granddaughter of John Welling, Sr., of Hopewell, who left her \$\frac{1}{2}400\$ in his will 1773 (NJA 37:392); she died either 4 January 1803 (Trenton Federalist, 1/11/1803) or 14 July 1803, aged 52.3.10 (grave), and was buried with her husband. John Welling's will left two-thirds of his estate to his son John, above (the witness to Aaron's will), and one-third to daughter Elizabeth, and named John (error for Jacob?) Carle as his son-in-law, indicating Elizabeth to have been the mother of Hannah.

<sup>1.</sup> Son Jacob Carle Van Cleve apparently was not well regarded by his father Aaron or else was slighted by him in his will, as Jacob was named following son John, which is perhaps why Cooley listed him as the second son. Aaron left Jacob only \$30 and

gave a lifetime annuity of the interest on \$1,000 to Jacob's wife Mary which was to be used also for the education of Jacob's children, who were to inherit the principal at her death. On the other hand, son John was named one of the executors and left \$2,500 plus his bond to Aaron for \$1,333.33, daughter Elizabeth received \$500 and her husband's bond of \$1,333.33 to Aaron, daughter Cornelia received all her father's stock in the Jersey Bank; the 155-acre plantation in Maidenhead was to be sold, but the 6-acre meadow lot there was bequeathed to son John.

95. Joseph Van Cleve, fourth and youngest son of John No. 31 and Cornelia Van Mater, was born about 1742 probably in Maidenhead, Hunterdon Co. (now Lawrenceville, Mercer Co.), N.J., the home of his parents. Nothing is known of his life, except that he apparently spent it in Maidenhead where he made his will 29 January 1775, which was probated 7 January 1776 (NJA 34:357). In it he gave his wife Elizabeth £200 and mentioned an unborn child, but as no child of his has been identified as such, and Cooley (CTE 292) stated that Joseph died without issue, the child perhaps died young. On the other hand, there was a Joseph born 1775-6 as per the Trenton death records (see below) who cannot be identified except possibly as this unborn child. In his will Joseph also named his brothers Benjamin, Aaron, and Chrineyance, his nephew John Van Cleve, and

his sister Jean Smith; executors were his father-in-law Jacob Carle, his brother Benjamin, his brothers-in-law Daniel Hunt and John Rozell; witnesses were Benjamin Brearley, Robert Furman, and Jasper Smith.

John 4 Van Cleave, first (or third) son of Aaron No. 33 and Rachel Schenck, was born about 1739 (in 1739 in Demarest Family, v. 2) probably near New Brunswick, N.J., but around 1751 the family moved to Rowan Co., N.C. John and Aaron, unlike their brothers Benjamin, William, and Ralph, were not listed in the Rowan Co. tax lists for 1768, but they all appeared in the lists of 1778; Aaron was known to have been in the service of Virginia later, and perhaps both were also there in 1768. With his brothers, John was one of the early settlers of Kentucky, then a county of Virginia, which had been opened to settlement by Daniel Boone, their uncle by marriage, builder of the Wilderness Road in 1775, and founder of Fort Boonesborough. John also served in the Revolution; for his war services he received 2 July 1781 a grant of 300 acres on Bullskin Creek in Jefferson Co., Ky. (Bk A:213). "John, Benjamin, Billy and Ralph settled together on Bullskin Creek, while Aaron settled on Salt Creek near Bearstown in Washington Co." (JWmVC) Afterwards John moved to Shelby Co., and in 1794 was apparently living near Benjamin on Clear Creek below Shelbyville (JWaVC) 1. In the 1810 census John was still listed in Shelby County with his wife, both aged 45 & over. with 1 female under 10. On 9 October 1811 John and his wife Rachel sold their land (Shelby Co. Deeds) and moved to Jefferson Co., Ind., where he died 12 May 1812 (IMH 34:493). 2 In his will, dated the previous day, probated 28 May 1812 (Jefferson Will Bk A), he named only his wife Rachel, sons Peter and David, and daughters Leah, Rachel, Charity, and Deborah (the last two being Riker step-daughters), as his other children had all been provided for.

John married (1) Mary, daughter of Capt. Thomas Shepherd and Elizabeth Van Meter, of Shepherdstown, Va., and so named in her father's will 25 March 1776. She and her two youngest daughters were killed by Indians 15 September 1781 in the Battle of Floyd's Defeat, near Long Run and Bryant's Station, Ky.; her daughter Rachel escaped carrying in her arms her younger sister Elizabeth, but son Benjamin in fleeing on horseback across Floyd's Fork fell into the water and only saved himself by grabbing onto the horse's tail (JWa-VC; various accounts of this battle are given in the <u>History of the Boone Family</u>, Shelby County (Ky.) histories, IMH 34:493-4, and by JWmVC, who gave colorful accounts of several skirmishes with the Indians).

1a. It should have been stated above that in "Big John's" family we see the start of the numerous Van Cleave intermarriages in Kentucky and Indiana, and also the designation of various family members by descriptive nicknames.

Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Van Cleave, second (or fourth) son of Aaron No. 33 and Rachel Schenck, was born 15 November (Wisda, Gosney Family<sup>1</sup>) or 22 November 1741 (JWmVC<sup>2</sup>), probably near New Brunswick, N.J., then the home of his parents, but moved with the family to Rowan Co., N.C., about 1751. As Benjamin Van Cleve, he was taxed there in 1768 and 1778. It was probably the next year that he moved\* with his brother<sup>5</sup> to Kentucky, settling first at Lynn Station on Little Beargrass in Jefferson County, a few miles from the Falls of the Ohio (Louisville); there he had land grants of 400 acres on 7 December 1779 (Bk A:5) and 1,000 acres 29 April 1780 (Bk A:36), but soon sold out and moved to Shelby County, where in 1794 he was living on Clear Creek, below Shelbyville; he and wife Ruth sold 330 acres 17 January 1797 in Shelby County, part of a 2,000-acre

tract, and on 16 May 1797 he bought 100 acres from Squire Boone, his brother-in-law (JWaVC). He was listed in Shelby County in the 1810 census with his wife, both aged over 45, and with 1 female 26-45, 1 female 16-26, and 1 male under 10 in his household. Later he conveyed land in the county to his sons; to Aaron 68 acres where Aaron then lived, 20 September 1813; to Benjamin 100 a. on Bullskin Creek, 21 October 1811; to Ralph, land "in line with Samuel Van Cleave," 21 October 1811 (JWaVC). In his will 17 October 1815, probated August 1819 (by Alfred Mount, Shelby Co. Wills 4:474) he named his wife and some of his children (\*), his daughter-in-law Polly with her two children, Elijah & Elvira, and designated sons Aaron and Samuel as executors. He died 27 July 1819, aged 78.8.5 (JWmVC), and his estate was appraised at \$319.38 by William Crawford and Aaron Van Cleave (Shelby Co. 4:500). On 12 December 1819 a property sale was held; among the Van Cleave purchases were Thomas (4 chairs & chain, \$1.75), Aaron (1 small square table, \$1.50, & 1 saddle, \$5.50), Cyrus (1 hand axe & hold fast, \$2.00), Joseph (1 knife, \$2.12), Sam (1 hand saw, \$2.00), John (turning tools, \$1.25), Ralph (1 shovel & tongs, -- ), Benjamin (1 tin pan, \$.75), and Enoch (5 bbls. of corn, \$10.50).

Benjamin married 11 July 1765 Ruth Monson, born 10 July 1746, died 5 December 1823, daughter of Elisaph and Sarah Monson, of Rowan Co., N.C.; Benjamin was a fellowbondsman in Elisaph's estate in 1778 (JWaVC).

Mr. Harvey gave no authority for including the last two, Hope and Thomas, in this family, but Thomas fits in there chronologically, and nowhere else logically. The fact that he married a Van Cleave is good evidence that he was apparently accepted by others of the family, even though the Rev. Samuel (#303) did not include Thomas among his brothers and sisters. Another discrepancy is that Harvey gives the birth of Thomas as "about 1799", some ten years after the last recorded birth in this family (with "Hope (or Hopey)" in the interval but no birth date), which might suggest that their mothers were different.

William 4 Van Cleave, third (or fifth) son of Aaron No. 33 105. and Rachel Schenck, was born about 1743, probably near New Brunswick, N.J., then the home of his parents, but was raised in Rowan Co., N.C., where they settled about 1751. As William Van Cleve he appeared on the Rowan County tax lists for 1768 and 1778. With his brothers he was a pioneer in Kentucky about 1779.\* It was said (JWmVC1) that William!'s wife was a Tory who refused to let him fight in the Revolution, but according to another (JWaVC) he served in the war as a drum major and in 1780 received three land grants in Lincoln Co., Ky. One William Van Cleave, Sr., was listed (Va. Rev. Soldiers, 1:449) as serving in Kentucky in 1779. These grants were apparently the 720 acres on Paint Lick Creek 3 September 1781 (Bk 1:157, surveyed 18 July 1783; Bk 3:214, certificate issued for 1000 acres) and 280 acres the same place 30 April 1783 (Bk 1:401). In his will 2 September 1786, probated February 1788, Mercer Co., Ky. (Will Bk 1:75), he left the 1000 acres "preemption" land, with 300 acres bought from Evan Hinton and 250 acres from Squire Boone, to wife Abigail in behalf of six children (\*); to son Jonathan twothirds of 500 acres, land of his sister Sarah, deceased, "being her own by a gift;" to daughter Phebe 200 acres in Jefferson County "due me from Squire Boone;" executors were wife Abigail and friend William Crow; witnesses, Thomas & William Gilmore, Rachel Van Cleve, and Katherine Anderson.

William married Abigail, presumed daughter of Ebenezer Frost of North Carolina. She was on the tax roll of Madison Co., Ky., in 1789 and 1792 (then taxed on 5 horses, 17 mules, and cattle), and

106. Aaron 4 Van Cleave, fourth (or sixth) son of Aaron No. 33 and Rachel Schenck, was born about 1745 probably near New Brunswick, N.J., then the home of the family, but he was raised in Rowan Co., N.C., where his parents settled about 1751. As Aaron Van Cleve, Jr., he appeared on the Rowan County tax list of 1778. but not that of 1768 when most of his brothers, including the younger Ralph, were listed. As he was known to have been later in the service of Virginia (which included all of Kentucky until 1792), perhaps Aaron was living there briefly, or exploring the western section as early as 1768. It was said (Van Cleave file, Kentucky Historical Society) that Aaron served in the Revolution under General George Rogers Clark, who led in 1777 an expedition of 175 men against the British on the Illinois frontier, "capturing Kaskaskia and Vincennes (1778) in the only successful campaign that American forces conducted in that year" (Oxford Companion to American History, 180). Like his brothers, Aaron was also a pioneer of Kentucky but he settled apart from them on Salt Creek near Bearstown (JWmVC) in 1785, as per a quotation (by JWaVC) from the \* "Memoires of Benjamin Van Cleve (No. 381)." In the fall of 1787 he went west to hunt buffalo but was shot at by Indians and lost a finger and part of his gun (JWaVC). In 1788 he seems to have been again in the state (Virginia) service as a scout of Jefferson Co., Ky. (Virginia State Papers, 5:229). Aaron appeared on the Jefferson County tax roll for 1790, and it may have been he who was on the Mercer County tax list in 1789. He owned 400 acres in Washington

County (JWaVC) where he was listed in the 1810 census (9:140) with his wife, both then aged 45 & over, 1 daughter 26-45, 1 daughter and 3 sons 16-26, 1 son 10-16, and 1 son under 10. He also owned the only wagon in that part of the state, so it was very much in demand (JWaVC). In his will 11 November, probated 13 December 1813 Washington Co. (Will Bk B:269), he named his wife Rachel and child-ren(\*), giving William the plantation after Rachel's death. He and Rachel were buried in the Thomas Graveyard near Loretto (now Marion County), Ky.

Aaron married Rachel Brent, who parents have not been identified. Rachel appeared in the 1820 census of Washington County (18: 109) with another female aged 45 & over, 1 F & 2 M 26-45, 1 F & 2 M 16-26, 1 M 16-18, and 1 M under 10, a listing which probably included married children and families.

John and Ludwell were more likely grandsons of Samuel and wife Elizabeth, as she was 55 and he 57 when they were born. It is interesting to note here that Mrs. Wisda apparently had little or no knowledge of this branch of the Van Cleaves.

living there 20 November 1797, when he and wife Lydia deeded land to John Smock, as witnessed by John Van Cleave (JWaVC). Apparently he died not long after, as his estate was inventoried 15 September 1798 (at 140) in Shelby County (Will Bk 1:97-9); the sale of his property was reported by Gerardus Ryker 31 March 1800 (ibid., 172-3), and among the Van Cleave purchasers were John, Aaron, Jonathan, and Benjamin. His widow Lydia was referred to as the executrix, but Shelby County has no recorded will for Ralph. None of the accounts indicate whether he was ever ordained a minister.

He added that someone reported seeing Ben's body after the battle, but he was not believed, as he was "a bad man" later convicted of attempted murder. In 1769 Squire left to search for his brother Daniel in the west and found him in Kentucky in July 1770, but, fearing Indians, they left their camp and explored the Cumberland River, returning to North Carolina in

April 1771. Later, Squire came back with his family to Clear Creek in Shelby County and erected, where Shelbyville now stands. Squire Boone's Station, or The Painted Stone, which was his permanent home until 1806. In 1781 Squire Boone was elected the first representative from Kentucky in the Virginia legislature; in hunter's garb and suffering from wounds, his appearance more than his appeals won assistance for the defenders of the frontier. After that, he also appears to have lived at Boonesborough various times between 1795 and 1808. Wounded in several Indian skirmishes. defrauded of his property by land sharks, sometimes jailed for debt. in 1806 Squire, with his sons Isaiah, Moses, Jonathan and Enoch (the youngest, born 16 October 1777), and the five sons of his nephew Samuel, formed Boone's Settlement in what is now Harrison Co.. Ind.. about twenty five miles northwest of Louisville. There he built a small mill and founded a populous township, which was later called Boones. He died there in August 1815.

Jane died 10 March 1829 at the home of her son Enoch Morgan
Boone at the mouth of Otter Creek in Kentucky. "By her grandchildren she was called 'Big Granny' to distinguish her from Jane
(Hughes) Boone, whom they called 'Little Granny.'" (JWaVC)

111. John Van Cleft, eldest son of Cornelius No. 34 and Sarah
Marshall, was baptized 26 April 1736 at the Port Richmond
Dutch Church on Staten Island, N.Y., but was probably raised in
Piscataway, Middlesex Co., N.J., where his father was living in
1750. The father apparently died soon after, and the widowed mother
returned with her children to Staten Island. John left there (according to Reynolds ) and moved to Minisink Twp., Orange Co., N.Y.,
where he appeared in the 1790 census, having a wife or daughter, 4
sons over 16, and 1 son under 16 years old. On 14 November 1791 (as
John Van Cleft) he bought of Ephraim Innes for £72/10/- Lot No. 21,
presumably in Minisink, containing 723 acres, one-fifth of which lay
in the Wawayoneta Patent (Orange Co. Deeds G:1). No probate records
for John have been found in Orange County.

Neither have any church records for John's family been found, 2 so the name of his wife is not known. His descendants in Orange County usually spelled their name Van Cleft, but sometimes it was Van Clieft or Van Clief.

commercial publication, and the accuracy of all such works depends almost entirely on that of the informants, which, of course, varies widely—even though in most cases they were family members or other descendants. And the fact that the editors are rarely able to fully check the data they receive is exemplified here in the somewhat erroneous lineage of the earlier Van Cleefs.

- Minisink Township is in the western part of Orange County, quite far from even the nearest Dutch Churches at Deer Park (Port Jervis) or Shawangunk or those now in Rockland County. In even earlier days this section was under the juridiction of the Esopus (Kingston) Dutch Church in Ulster County. The Minisink area is a large one starting probably with the small Pennsylvania village of Minisink (near Stroudsburg) on the Delaware River and extending through northern New Jersey and old Orange County in New York.
- Letter from Judge Charles C. Coleman, Goshen, N.Y., 20 July 3. 1970, an authority on Orange County families, who added, "The family must have moved from the County." In Pine Hill Cemetery he also found a tombstone of a Gabriel Van Cleet, (d.) Nov. 28, 1805, and in the Goshen Presbyterian Church records a Levi Van Cleft who witnessed a marriage there 4 March 1830; this Levi, no doubt a close relation, has yet to be identified. It is not unreasonable to presume, however, that since both John #341 and Cornelius #342 were remembered by the family, or listed in an old family record, they most likely survived infancy and probably were married and left descendants, who have yet to be located. Therefore, the research on the Van Cleft branch of the family is still incomplete--despite extensive coverage of Orange County records. If they are presumed to have moved to another part of New York, the problem is where to look next as there are no statewide census indexes beyond 1790 as in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana.

112. William Van Cleve, born 25 August 1737, enlisted for one year 29 December 1775 at Colts Neck, Monmouth Co.,
N.J., in Capt. Elias Longstreet's Co., 1st Bn., First Establishment, N.J. (Continental) Line, in the Revolution and was discharged as a sergeant in December 1776 upon expiration of service (D.A.R.
Lineage Nos. 463010 & 68583). He was not the William, however, who served later as an ensign and lieutenant in Capt. Smock's militia company as claimed; that was his cousin William No. 138, whose widow Carch(e) furnished a copy of his commission as a 1st Lieutenant in Smock's company in support of her pension application (W-1102), later approved. Rather, it seems that the subject William was the William Van Cleve, ensign in Capt. Mott's (5th) Co., 3rd Bn., Second Establishment, under Col. Elias Dayton, from 29 November 1776 until his retirement 26 September 1780 (ORNJ).

Although William first appeared in Monmouth County in his record of marriage in 1762, it is impossible to place him there in any of the known Van Cleef families. Cornelius No. 34, however, who may be considered a Monmouth Van Cleef as his father settled there finally, had lived awhile just across Raritan Bay on Staten Island where he married Sarah Marshall, who evidently returned there as a widow with her children from their previous home in Piscataway, Middlesex Co., N.J. Their only recorded son, John No. 111, left the island, and it is presumed that they had a second son William, who also moved away—in William's case back to New Jersey where he may have been born. And living in Middletown in 1762, he was probably the William Van Cle(e)f of the Middletown Baptist

Church, who, on 10 May 1777, sat in judgement with others on church matters (NJMis. 1:273); his having been a Baptist (most of whose records there are lost) would account for the lack of baptismal records for his children. Also, he was probably the William who, on 25 January 1791, witnessed the will of John Holmes, of Middletown, but who had "removed to a distant state" (Pennsylvania, meaning, no doubt, a "distant" part of that state) when the will was probated in 1804 (NJA 39:223). The date of death given (D.A.R.) for him, 22 April 1813, was that of William No. 138, so we have no date of death for the subject William.

He married first (N.J. lic. 7 April 1762, both then "of Middletown") Deborah Smith, born 27 December 1743, possibly a daughter of William Smith, of Middletown, who died there 1759 (Hornor, <u>This Old Monmouth of Ours</u>, 341-2)<sup>2</sup>.

<sup>1.</sup> Since there was no son named Cornelius among the six in William's family, and his second surviving son was named Joseph, there is a good case for placing William as the youngest, but unrecorded son, of Joseph No. 10 and Sytje/Sophia Van Wicklen, except for several factors: (1) there is circumstantial evidence that Sophia Van Wicklen died in 1733 after the birth of her last recorded son Gerrit; (2) none of William's nine daughters were named Sophia, as one would expect had she been his mother, and (3) from what is known of Noseph No. 10, in 1737 he was still living in central Jersey where there were numerous Reformed Dutch churches with well kept baptismal records where another son most likely would have been baptized. Lastly, Mrs. Wisda stated (D.110), "He is given as a nephew of Aaron Van Cleave Sr."(#33), but she had his parentage wrong; the only way William could have been Aaron's nephew was as an unrecorded son of Cornelius No. 34.

It should be noted here that the family surname was sometimes recorded as <u>Van Cleft</u> in the New Brunswick Church records, and Cornelius was so recorded in his marriage license 24 July 1775 (23:104), New York. In his marriage record of the same date in the New York Presbyterian Church, however, he was listed as Cornelius <u>Van Cleif</u>, carpenter (then also meaning building contracors), which is only slightly different from <u>Van Clief</u>, the spelling generally used by others of the family (and later Cornelius) then living on Staten Island. One

may question the identification of the subject Cornelius on Staten Island with Cornelius, son of Benjamin No. 37 of Monmouth Co., N.J., in that this Cornelius named neither of his two sons for his father nor his one recorded daughter for his mother, but this may be accounted for in that he was closer to his wife's family on the island, both literally and figuratively, and that he was probably a member of St. Andrew's (Presbyterian) Church where his one recorded child was baptized. On the other hand, he could have been a younger son (No. 114) of Cornelius No. 34, who also lived a time on Staten Island and who likewise married into a Staten Island family; assuming that No. 114 was born about 1741-3, that Cornelius can be more readily identified with the subject Cornelius's marriage in 1775, but to adopt that premise would mean inventing a Cornelius in the family of No. 34 and assuming that the Cornelius recorded as son of No. 37 had died young and/or without issue.

In the 1790 census Cornelius was listed (as "Van Clief") in Northfield Twp., Richmond Co. (Staten Island), N.Y., which is the last record we have of him, as no will nor estate has been found for him. His wife's name, on both the license and in the marriage record, was Elizabeth Garrison, whose parentage has not been determined, although one may well assume from the name of their first son that her father was named Nicholas and her mother probably Hester-names both new to the Van Cleef family.

Benjamin 4 Van Cleaf, second (and possibly eldest surviving) son of Benjamin No. 37 and Rachael Couwenhoven, was born 28 February and baptized 10 May 1747 at the New Brunswick Dutch Church in Middlesex Co., N.J. The family soon moved to Monmouth County, and Benjamin served in the local militia during the Revolution. In his pension application 1832 he gave the same birth date, but said he was born in Freehold Township (Nat. Arch. No. 6354). where he was probably raised, and lived his later life. These records show that he served four months as a lieutenant and twenty months as a captain; also that he was in the Battle of Germantown, was wounded at Trenton, and was in the Battle of Monmouth; his service thereafter was in local actions against the Tories, who were particularly strong around Shrewsbury and along the Monmouth County coast. He was first an orderly sergeant in Capt. Smock's company, then an ensign before he was elected first a lieutenant and later a captain. According to his widow Mary's pension application, 12 September 1836 (ibid.), Benjamin died 27 July 1836, aged 89.4.30.

As of Lower Freehold, Benjamin married (N.J. lic. 11 December) 17 December 1770 (pension papers) Mary Thompson (parentage not yet determined), who in will dated Freehold 15 January and probated 19 February 1838 (NJ 10433M) divided her landholdings among four of her children (carefully delineating the various plots and boundaries) and left money to others (\*); executors were James A. Reid and John W. Davison (apparently her son-in-law), and witnesses were William Preston, Garret W. Conover, and David Crawford.

Both Benjamin and Mary were buried in the Tennent Churchyard, and, according to its records (p. 288) he died 27 July 1836, aged 89.4.30, and she died 6 February 1838, aged 90.1.11.

<sup>1</sup>a. The Texas data gathered by Mrs. J. Gray Golden of Austin in the Texas State Library indicates that most later Van Cleaves in that state descend from those in Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama and Mississippi, and also from one Lorenzo Van Cleve, originally from New York, who went to Texas when it was an independent republic, but who has yet to be identified.

- 2. Both sons William and John generally used (or were designated by) their middle initial "B" probably to distinguished them from their like-named cousins in Monmouth County.

He was among the rateables listed as "John Benj son" (Van Cleave) in Freehold, Monmouth County 1778/80 (SRRCNJ<sup>2</sup>, 215). After

the Revolution in the fall of 1785 John moved his family west to a farm of his brother-in-law, Robert Benham, on the North Fork of Ten Mile Creek in Washington Co., Pa. In 1788 he rented a farm near Washington, Pa., then moved briefly in 1789 to Crawford's Ferry on the Monongahela but left there on Christmas and, having sailed down the Ohio, arrived 3 January 1790 at Losantiville, now Cincinnati, Ohio. There he set up a blacksmith shop but was killed by the Indians 1 June 1791, in their last attack within what are now the city limits of Cincinnati (Bond, op.cit. & Centennial History of Cincinnati).

John married 8 August 1772, New Brunswick Dutch Church, Catherine Benham, born 11 October 1756, died 6 August 1837, daughter of Peter Benham and Anna James, who later settled in Loudon Co., Va. According to son Benjamin's memoires, they had four sons and five daughters, of whom two boys and a girl died in infancy.

The widow Catherine Benham Van Cleve, her new husband Samuel Thompson, and her children (except for William, who drove the cattle overland) left Cincinnati for Dayton by pirogue, arriving 1 April 1796 and landing at St. Clair Street (now Van Cleve Park), and, being the first ashore, she was the first white woman in Dayton

(Conover, <u>Dayton & Montgomery County</u>, 176).

of them are contained in the various county histories covering both cities. Probably the most complete genealogically is Mr. Alfred S. Andrews' Andrews, Clapp, Stokes, Van Cleve, Wright Genealogies (1970), which, with the Van Cleves, carries down from No. 137 various female lines and contains Mr. B. W. Bond's Memoirs of Benjamin Van Cleve, apparently the "Baker copy," first published in The Quarterly Publication of the Historical and Philosophical Society of Ohio in 1922. An earlier genealogical work was Mrs. Lindsay M. Brien's Our Forefathers, typescript in the Ohio Historical Society, which also carries down the female lines one generation, but in addition cites certain publications, mainly county histories, where more complete biographical data are to be found.

In his memoirs Benjamin told of his ancestors coming from the 4. Rhine (my emphasis) and settling on Long Island, and later moving to Monmouth Co., N.J. He also stated, "My great grandfather (Isbrandt No. 7) lived on Staten Island in 1720 (sic) and my Grandfather Benjamin Van Cleve (No. 36) with his brothers and sisters settled in New Jersey near New Brunswick. When my father was two years old they moved and settled in Monmouth Co., N.J. My father married here to Catherine Benham and I was born Feb. 24, 1773, the eldest of four sons and five daughters, of which two boys and one girl died in infancy." He went on to tell of witnessing the Battle of Monmouth, and also mentioned Ralph Van Cleve, cousin of his father (No. 107), who tried "to talk father into moving to North Carolina," but his mother's brother, Capt. Robert Benham who then lived in Monongahela, Pa., persuaded the family to move there. And then he recounted their trip down the Ohio River to Cincinnati (then Losantiville) and gave a vivid account of his father's death in the last Indian attack within the present city boundaries.

"In 1792," Benjamin continued, "we went back to New Jersey to see the family and then on to Philadelphia on a business trip. Went to see Uncle Benjamin Van Cleve (No. 136) and Uncle

William Van Cleve" (No. 138; this statement is important as it helps to distinguish him William No. 196 who also served in the Revolution, but died in prison during it.) Upon his return, Benjamin became an army contractor under his uncle Robert Benham at Fort Washington; he also took part in St. Clair's expedition and in 1794 was with General Wayne at Forts Greenville and Wayne, and at the same time was also Clerk of Hamilton County. Also during this period he served on a jury in Cincinnati, made trips through Kentucky and Tennessee, and started Hardin's settlement, which, in his words "was on Little Hurricane Island on the Ohio River. I don't know that any white people had ever been there before us."

Benjamin was one of the surveyors who laid out the new town of Dayton, Nov. 4, 1795, and his mother, then Mrs. Catherine Thompson, was the first lady to step ashore in the new settlement (Beers, <u>History of Montgomery County</u>, 547ff). It was most likely not long before this that Benjamin had been convicted by a general court martial for selling liquor to a soldier and was ordered to leave the region and never return there as a settler; the time and place were not given, but possibly this was his reason for leaving Cincinnati for Dayton. Apparently this was only a temporary setback, as he was assistant to the clerk of the House of Representatives for territorial legislation 1799-1801, and by Act of Congress Mar. 2, 1799, he and his brother William were permitted to buy federal land at \$2 an acre.

The first school in Dayton was opened Sept. 1, 1799, on the ground floor of a blockhouse with Benjamin as schoolmaster, although there were still only five families there in the winter 1802-3; this later became Old Dayton Academy, incorporated in 1807. Benjamin became postmaster of Dayton in 1803 and opened an office in his own cabin at First & St. Clair Streets, a post which he held till he died. Apparently he was also a farmer, as he reserved the first week of November to gather his corn and let his pupils have a vacation. Later he was an incorporator of the Dayton Library, director of the first bank in Dayton, and a trustee of Ohio University.

138. William Van Cleaf, fourth son of Benjamin No. 37 and Rachel Couwenhoven, was born 1752 (RECORD 81:228-9), in Monmouth Co., N.J., the home of his parents. Enlisting from Free-hold 20 October 1775, William served in the Revolution, first as a sergeant in Capt. Holmes' Company, Col. Symmes' N.J. Regiment, in the northern expedition (National Archives, pension W-1102). While still at Ticonderoga on 20 October 1776, William wrote (his penmanship was good in the photocopy) to the Hon. Nathaniel Scudder at Princeton, colonel of the 1st Regiment, Monmouth County militia, as follows:

Sir:

As I am in the service now and my time is just expired,
I understand that there are 4 battalions to be raised in
Jersey during the war. Sir, I should take it a great
favour if you will take the trouble to provide me a berth,
as I have had a tryel of being in the service this year.
I should be glad to continue in the war with the Blessings
of God. I shall return home in about 4 weeks. Please
remember me to all inquiring friends, so I remain your
humble servant.

William Van Cleaf, Sergt.

P.S.: Sir, as Lt. Holmes is so greatly in favour with the men that there is hardly a man but says that if Lieut. Holmes was Capt. they would enter the service again. He is beloved by both officers and men.

Holmes returned the favor in a letter of the same date from Ticonderoga to Scudder, saying in part, "Sir, Amongst the Commissions that are to be given out, you would remember William Van

Cleaf, a sergeant in our Co. and he is worthy of a commission; as for his character and his family, you know as well as I do." Also, "If I get a commission, should be glad to have Van Cleaf in the same company as he is able to raise several in Freehold, who would have listed if they were sure he would be ensign."

Upon his return, William joined Scudder's regiment as an ensign under Capt. Hendrick Smock and Lieut. Benjamin Van Cleaf, his brother, and was commissioned 1st lieutenant commanding the company 1 September 1777, fighting in the Battles of Trenton, Princeton, Germantown, and Monmouth. Sometime in 1778 he was promoted to captain, serving in various tours to 1782.

In 1792 William's nephew Benjamin Van Cleve of Ohio visited him in New Jersey, according to Benjamin's memoirs (see No. 381); the statement of this event helps distinguish the subject from his cousin (No. 196), presumably the William who died in the Revolution. William died 22 April 1813, as per his widow's pension papers.

William married 5 March 1789, Marlboro Dutch Church, Geertje, baptized 23 July 1769, Marlboro, daughter of Tunis Aumack & Adriana Bennet; in later years she was recorded as Carch(e); Geertje was pronounced <u>Care</u>-sha (GMNJ 46:114), so that spelling was the phonetic rendition of her name, which more often was anglicized as Charity. As William's marriage to Carche was rather late in his life, apparently he had a previous wife, so far unidentified, who was the mother of:

Carch(e) applied 20 August 1838 for a widow's pension for William's service in the Revolution; this was granted 16 October 1841, and she received \$766.65 for five year's arrears. When her estate was inventoried 22 November 1842 (NJ 10690M) some 73 debtors, including presumed sons, sons-in-law, and possibly other relatives were listed. Although no record of the distribution of her estate has been found, there is good presumptive evidence that she was the mother of:

Mary Post, was baptized as "Wilhelmus" 22 February 1741 at the Raritan Dutch Church in Somerset Co., N.J.; it seems that it was sometime after 1748 that the family moved to Ulster Co., New York. On 10 April 1760 at the age of 19 William was enrolled in Ulster County in the New York Provincial Troops, and again at 21 on 7 May 1761. As "William Van Cleve" he signed the Articles of Association at Kingston, N.Y., in 1775 but seems to have taken no other part in the Revolution. He was probably the "William Van Cleve" of Rhinebeck, Dutchess Co., N.Y., in the 1790 census, having then in his family presumably a wife and daughter, although at his age then it is likely he had other married children. He did not appear in the 1800 census, Dutchess County, and possibly he had died in the interval, although no probate records are extant.

According to the one baptismal record we have for William's family, he married Lea Edward, daughter of Marretie Edward, most likely of Ulster County.

under Col. James Clinton and Capt. Daniel Denton, and other records
(N.Y. in the Revolution, 27,46) show that a "Lawrence Van Klief"
served in the 1st Regiment of the Line under Col. Goose Van Schaick,
and in the 3rd Regiment under Clinton and Col. Peter Gansevoort.
Another account (The Reverelles, of Seneca Falls, N.Y.) stated that
he was with Col. Gansevoort when they marched through the territory
of the Cayugas, Onondagas & Oneidas to Albany; that he first went
to Seneca Falls in the spring of 1789, returning to Albany for his
family in the fall; that he built the first frame house in Seneca

(Lawrence #153 - Cont.)

Falls in 1794 on Fall Street, and that although he was granted 600 acres of military lands (Lot 71 in Cincinnatus Twp., Cortland Co., N.Y.) on 8 July 1790, he never occupied the tract and died in Seneca Falls in 1830.

Lawrence is believed to have been the youngest son of Lawrence No. 43 and Mary Post, two of whose other older sons were known to have settled in Ulster County and were the only Van Cleefs so far identified there, or elsewhere in the upper Hudson Valley. Had he belonged to the other branches of the family which remained in New Jersey, it is hard to see why he made his way to Albany to enlist for service in the Revolutionary army--particularly when there were various other line and militia units in Jersey in the counties where the Van Cleefs lived. It has been stated that Lawrence was born or baptized 15 April 1754, a date which checks well with his age in the pension papers, but no such record has been found in any of the New Jersey or New York Dutch Churches.

According to the baptism of Hendrik below, evidently Lawrence married (1) Cathalyntje Jackson, a presumed daughter of Hendrick Jackson & Sarah Clute.

<sup>1.</sup> Lawrence No. 153, who was born 1755-6 according to his pension application 2 November 1819 when he gave his age as 63, has been the subject of several studies with regard to his parentage. Murray Poole in his pamphlet, Descendants of Jan Van Cleef, had 15 April 1754 as his birth or baptismal date in New Jersey, but gave no substantiation and, further, misappropriated Isaac #88 as Lawrence's father, although it is quite evident that Isaac's son Lawrence was born some 18 years later and Isaac's brother Lawrence had been born 18-19 years earlier. D.A.R. records cite the same 1754 birth date, but again with no details. Mr. Frank Chapman Van Cleef, a descendant of Lawrence and long an archivist in the Brooklyn (N.Y.) Hall of Records, in trying to establish his line back to Jan #1 for membership in The Holland Society of New York, stated that he believed Lawrence to have been a grandson of Lawrence #32 and was born at Elizabethport, N.J., but could offer no proof. Among Lawrence's pension papers

there is a letter of 1916 which boldly gives his line as Lawrence<sup>5</sup>-Isaac<sup>4</sup>-Lawrence<sup>3</sup>-Benjamin<sup>2</sup>-Jan<sup>1</sup>, regardless of the fact that Benjamin<sup>2</sup> (#11) left a will naming no son Lawrence. In his pension application, Lawrence merely gave his age and stated that he had enlisted at Albany, N.Y., in the 3rd Regiment, New York Line, under Col. James Clinton and Capt. Daniel Denton, but said nothing as to his place of birth or his early life. On the basis of all pertinent factors and this, the first known comprehensive study of the early Van Cleefs, now revised, it is concluded both on geographical and chronological grounds that Lawrence Van Cleef of Seneca Falls was a son of Lawrence #43, born after the parents had left the Raritan section of Somerset Co., N.J., and so is No. 153 in the Van Cleef family.

161. Joseph Van Cleve, eldest son of Garret No. 48 and Wilmyntje Meyer, was born 2 March and baptized 1 April 1765 at the Clarkstown Dutch Church in Orange (now Rockland) Co., N.Y. Like his father, Joseph also served in the Revolution, entering Col. Weissenfel's Regiment of Levies in Capt. Andrew Thompson's company in the spring of 1781 (N.Y. in the Revolution, 70). He later applied for a pension, which was paid starting 7 June 1832 and was continued to his widow (W211). In his application he said that he had moved to Bergen Co., N.J., in 1787. Settling in Franklin Township, he lived in a stone house still standing, now 21

Breakneck Road, Oakland. Joseph witnessed the will of Simeon Van Winkle 1808, he inventoried the estate of Cornelius Lozier 1809, and he was an executor in the will of John S. Bogert 1813 (NJA). all of whom were of Franklin Township. Also, he was an elder in 1811 & 1822 of the Ponds Church, most of whose records were burned, which probably accounts for the lack of baptismal records for his children. In the 1830 census he was listed in the same township, then as aged 60-70, with 1 F 50-60 (wife?), 1 F 15-20, & 2 M 10-15, the latter no doubt his children. In his will 1837 Joseph named his wife and children (\*), directing that his grandson Henry, son of his son Abraham, was to support his mother as long as she remained the wife or widow of Abraham; he also left a farm in Pequannock Twp., Morris Co., N.J., to his daughter Elizabeth, who was then living on it. Joseph died 4 March 1837, aged 72.0.2, and was buried in Lily Ponds (Crooked Pond) Cemetery, Oakland, next to his father.

While living at New Hempstead, Joseph married 5 March 1787 at the Clarkstown Dutch Church, Elizabeth Stevens, probably the daughter of Abraham Stevens(e) & Elizabeth Van Houten of New Hempstead; she died 16 November 1850, aged 85.7.2, and was buried next to her husband at Oakland.

<sup>1.</sup> All data on Joseph No. 161 and complete information on his Van Cleve descendants was furnished by Lillis Murray, of Olney, Ill., now Mrs. Foster F. Schilt, of Delray Beach, Fla. It was her interest in tracing her Van Cleve ancestry that led her and Mr. Schilt into widening their horizons and gathering data on all Van Cleef/Cleves in their country-wide travels over many years; in the Rutgers University Library they found the writer's 1960

Van Cleef genealogy and in 1969 there began an exchange of data which, from them, now amounts to 354 pages closely typed or handwritten plus unnumbered genealogical data sheets and countless letters. Suffice it to say here that this genealogy would never have been so complete without untiring efforts and contributions of Lillis and Foster Schilt.

- 163. Isaac<sup>5</sup> Van Cleve, presumed son of Garret No. 48 and Wilmyntje Meyer, was born about 1767, probably in Orange Co., N.Y. In the Revolution an Isaac Van Cleef was a sergeant in Capt. Henry Dodge's company, Col. Weissenfel's regiment of Levies, August to November 1781, the same regiment in which his presumed father and

brother served. As he was a sergeant and Joseph a private, perhaps he was the older of the two. And like Joseph he also moved to New Jersey, appearing in 1830 in Franklin Twp., Bergen Co., with his presumed wife both aged 60-70, 1 F 80-90, 1 M 20-30, 1 M 10-15, 1 M & 1 F 5-10, the last two probably being grandchildren; with his age then, one can assume that Isaac had other married children living apart from him. Whatever became of this family is not known.

181. Benjamin<sup>4</sup> Van Cleaf, eldest son of Richard No. 57 and Elizabeth Lake, named as son and executor in his father's will 1765, was baptized 29 May 1743 at the Marlboro Dutch Church in Monmouth Co., N.J., the home of his parents. He is identified as the "Benjamin Vancleave" listed among the rateables of Freehold Township 1778 & 1780 (SRRCNJ 215) and as the "Benjamin Van Cleave Jr." of Monmouth County who died intestate before 19 September 1785 when Garret Covenhoven and David Vanderveer were named administrators of his estate (the "Jr." distinguished him from his older uncle No. 58).

He may have been the husband of Elizabeth Anderson (see No. 58), but, if so, it was likely his second marriage, and in an unrecorded first marriage he may have been the father of one or more in the area whose parentage is not yet known, among them Peter (possibly named for an unknown maternal relative), who follows.

Possible issue:

Peter<sup>5?</sup> Van Clief was born 1763-4, as he died 5 March 1816 "in the 53rd year of his age," according to his grave in the Van Clief Cemetery on his homestead near Waterford, Washington Co., Ohio. He was first recorded in Monmouth Co., N.J., as an apprentice of Joseph Ker of Freehold in the latter's will, 24 September 1773 (NJA 34:287). In the Revolution, as "Peter Van Cleave," he served first in the Monmouth Co. militia (ORNJ 794), and later as Peter Van Cleaf in Col. Spencer's Regt., Continental Line (ORNJ 303). His widow Mary Ann, in applying for a Revolutionary War pension (W6352), stated that he husband served a year before enlisting as a private in Spencer's regiment, from which he was discharged after three year's service 15 May 1780, at Springfield, N.J. (he was only credited with two year's service in Capt. Burrows' company, Spencer's regiment, when Mary Ann was inscribed on the pension roll 20 Feb. 1840 at Pittsburgh). U.S. census records show that Peter and his family were living in Pennsylvania in Huntingdon County (as "Peter Van Clipt") in 1790, and he was probably the Peter "Vanclecf" of Dublin Township in the Huntingdon Co. militia in 1788 (Pa. Archives). According to the pension papers, they stayed there six or more years, but by 1804-5 they had settled on a hundred acres of land in Waterford Twp., Washington Co., Ohio, and then had ten children.

Possibly Peter was a son, named for some unknown maternal relative, of Benjamin No. 181, of whom little is known except that

he lived until 1780 or later. Considered less likely is the possibility that Peter was a son of Benjamin No. 58 and his wife (and niece) Lena Couwenhoven, born between the latter's 7th and 8th children, baptized 1760 and 1767, as the names of Peter's children and those in the latter family bear little relationship.

Peter's wife Mary Ann stated in her pension application that they had been married 4 March 1785. She has been identified as Mary Ann Dorsey, born 19 January 1765 in Ireland, died 6 September 1852, buried with her husband. In his will 3 March 1816 Peter named Mary Ann and mentioned, but did not name, his surviving children. Their names, however, appear in a deed 3 October 1823 (recorded 3 December 1839, Washington Co. 30:410) wherein the heirs (\*) sold their interest in the homestead farm to Peter's son Daniel. His son Peter in an affidavit 1839 in the Morgan Co. (Ohio) court gave the birth dates of the first four of Peter's children and said that his father had settled first at Marietta, Ohio, about 1796. Mary Ann signed her name by mark, both as Van Cleaf and Van Clief, but son Peter signed personally as Van Cleaf; however, in the Washington and Morgan County marriage records the surname was recorded as Van Clief, Van Cleif, or Van Cliff.

<sup>1.</sup> The main reason for placing Peter in this family, at least tentatively and despite the Van "Clief" spelling of the surname later, is that he cannot be placed in any other Monmouth County Van Cleaf family, and the chronology fits. It is quite likely that the Monmouth County scribes wrote Peter's name as "Cleaf" or "Cleave" which was then the usual spelling of the

name in that section then, but the later adoption of the Van "Clief" spelling would indicate that Peter had come from Staten Island, where that form of the name was prevalent and which is just across the Raritan Bay from Monmouth. Daniel #182, however, left a will which named no son Peter; John #111 was almost too young to have been Peter's father, as all his recorded children were not born until some sixteen years later, and so was Cornelius #132, also of Staten Island. Thus he cannot be fitted into any of the known Van Clief families living on Staten Island at the time of his birth.

- 182. Daniel Van Clief, second son of Richard No. 57 and
  Elizabeth Lake, was baptized 13 January 1744 at the Marlboro Dutch Church in Monmouth Co., N.J., the home of his parents.

  Although named in his father's will 1765, he was not designated an executor, as were his brothers. Whether or not he can be identified as the Daniel living on neighboring Staten Island, N.Y.,

  from 1762 is problematical. There is no identification with the family of Richard No. 57 in the names of the children of the Staten Island Daniel; if the latter was the son of Richard, he would have been married at the unusually early age of 17; secondly, the Staten Island family used the spelling Van Clief, which was almost unknown

among the Monmouth families. Possibly he was an unrecorded son of Cornelius No. 34, but of this there is presently no proof.

Daniel Van Clief of Staten Island witnessed the wills of Richard Harris 1771, of Abraham Many 1777, and of his presumed sister-in-law Catherine Parleay 1786; in the last he was described as a blacksmith (WNYHS 8:20, 9:119, 14:93). In the 1790 census he was listed in Southfield Twp., Richmond Co. (Staten Island), having a son under 16, presumably his wife and two daughters, and one other free person, probably an apprentice. In his will as of Southfield 14 September 1790, probated 27 May 1793 (codicil 31 December 1792), he gave wife Martha his home and furnishing during widowhood, named his children (\*), gave his carpenter's tools to sons John & Benjamin, who were also named executors with his wife; witnesses were Joseph Perine, Esq., John Baker, weaver, and James Scharit, innkeeper; to codicil, Richard Channing Moore, rector, St. Andrew Church, Staten Island.

Daniel married (N.Y. lic. 8 Sept. 1761) Martha Marshall, named as a daughter and the wife of Daniel in the will 13 August 1778 of Martha, widow of John Marshall, of Richmond County, who in his will 3 September 1760 named both a wife and daughter Martha (WNYHS 7:381, 12:51). In the 1800 census, Southfield Township, Martha was listed as "Patty Van Clief," then over 45, also 1 M 26-45, 1 M 10-16, 1 M under 10, & 1 F 26-45.

- That Jesse had a large family is confirmed by his listing in the 1820¢ Castleton Twp., S.I. (16:210), showing him & wife aged 26-45, 1 M & 1 F 16-26, 2 M & 3 F under 10 (note none aged 10-16 who prob. d.y.); of these Reynolds gave only Benjamin, Jacob, and John H.
- 1. In clarification, placing Daniel of Staten Island elsewhere in the Van Cleaf/Clief family would mean discarding the baptismal record of the Daniel in Monmouth County (by saying he died young or that nothing more was known of him) and substituting for Daniel of S.I. a highly speculative parentage; of course, chronologically he fits better as another unrecorded son of Cornelius No. 34. On the other hand, there was no known reason for Cornelius to have named a son Daniel, while the son of Richard No. 57 was obviously named for his maternal grandfather; this was the first occurence of the name Daniel in the Van Cleef family.
- 2. John's property, consisting of a homestead lot of 14 acres and a salt meadow lot (3.41 a.), could not be divided and was advertized in the <u>Jersey Blue</u> for sale 6 May 1837; it was sold for \$25 an acre, recorded 23 January 1838 (Bergen Co., N.J.).
- 3. The fact that both Diedricks wives (and sisters?) named sons Jacob suggests that Jacob was their father's name.
- 4. Lake, was born about 1746 probably at Freehold, Monmouth Co., N.J., the home of his parents; since he was named an executor in his father's will 1765, it is assumed that he was nearly of age at that time. He was left 10 in the will of his uncle John 1777, which establishes his parentage, even though no baptismal record has been found. Very likely it was he who served in the Revolution, either as a private, sergeant, or captain (all three ranks given in ORNJ) in the Monmouth Co. militia, and his death in 1778-9 suggests that he may have died in the service. His widow Elizabeth renounced the administration of his estate 16 Feb. 1779 in favor of Peter Schenck (NJA 22:37).

John married (N.J. lic. 3 Mar. 1767) Elizabeth Mount of Middletown, N.J., whose parents have not been identified (see NJMis. v. 4; she was listed in Freehold 1778-80 SRRCNJ 215). As many of the Mount family at this time were still Baptists, perhaps John became one too, which would explain why no baptismal records were found for any of his children--particularly in the Marlboro Dutch Church records. Both John and Elizabeth, however, were buried in the Old Brick Church Cemetery (RDC) in Marlboro. (no dates).

Society of New York 1925, that Lea, John's wife, was married 5 August 1775 and died 26 September 1831, in the Bible.

- 2. Mr. Cocheu in his Van Couwehnoven genealogy (GBR 82:35) had as John's 1st wife Elizabeth Mount, who was actually the wife of No. 183; as this marriage was in March 1767, the subject John would have been not quite 17 (or 19, as per Bible), in either case too young.
- 3. The family's move to Brooklyn placed this most junior line with the most senior line of Van Cleefs in the same area, and, as with their distant cousin Cornelius No. 71, they were moving contrary to the general trend of their times.
- 4. Henry Clinton Van Cleef (see #1324) was the source for the two children of Peter. From his notes with his lineage papers, it is evident that he did some research on his line of the family, aside from that necessary to establish his lineage for membership in the Holland Society. (He also made a good case that the data on Jan No. 1 pertained to two different Johns, father and son; at first, believing him to have been correct, this compiler was thrown off for some time.)
- 196. William Van Cleaf, fourth son of Benjamin No. 58 and Lena Couwenhoven, was born 30 May 1757 (GBR 82:35), most likely also in Monmouth Co., N.J. Probably he was the William who served in Capt. Thomas Hunn's Co., 1st Regiment, Monmouth Co Militia, in the Revolution and died in prison (ORNJ). There were only three contemporary Williams in the family old enough to have been in the Revolution: No. 112 of Monmouth, who left the state and is known to have been living long after the Revolution; No. 138, who was visited in N.J. by his nephew Benjamin (No. 381) in 1792, as per Benjamin's statement in his memoires, and No. 148, who was apparently living in Rhinebeck, N.Y., in 1790 and who was from

Orange Co., N.Y. So, by elimination, this is the logical William --both in chronology and geography--who died in prison during the Revolution. The Catherine Van Cleaf, "relict of William," who died 11 November 1842, aged 72, buried in Old Baptitst Cemetery, Freehol may have been his widow, assuming she was a bit older than indicate however, this was more likely an erroneous recording or transcripti of burial data of Carche Van Cleaf (see #138), whose estate was inventoried only eleven days later and who was aged a little over 73 at the time of her death.

It is possible he was the father of:

197. Joseph Van Cleaf, fifth and youngest son of Benjamin No.
58 and Lena Couwenhoven, was baptized 2 March 1760 at
the Marlboro Dutch Church in Monmouth Co., N.J., having been born
1760 in Freehold, according to his later statement. He served as a
private in the Monmouth County Militia and also as a light dragoon
in the Revolution (ORNJ 794). In his initial pension application
31 July 1832 (S1139), he said he entered the service early in the
summer of 1775 "a few months after he was fifteen years old" under
Capt. Thomas Hunn and Col. Asher Holmes as a substitute for his
brother (probably either Benjamin or Cornelius) for one year. In
his later statement, 10 May 1833, he said he entered the militia

for himself in June 1776, serving monthly tours under various officers until November 1777 when he joined the light dragoons, also
as a private, and took part in the Battles of Germantown and Monmouth, finally leaving the service in January 1783; his record of
service was confirmed by Col. Barnes Smock, formerly his lieutenant. Joseph appeared in the 1830 census as of Freehold with his
wife, both aged 70-80, also 1 M & 2 F 20-30 and 1 M under 5, the
last three being probably son William & wife & their son Sidney
(16:186). In the 1840 census, Freehold (4:251), William was head
of the household and Joseph, "80 yrs of age - Revolutionary pensioner," was living with them. He died 20 July 1843, aged 83.5.14,
and was buried in the Old Brick Churchyard at Marlboro, N.J. He
was probably the Joseph who purchased 14 June 1804 for \$1,505.00
(as the highest bidder) two tracts of land of 110 acres at Topinemus in Freehold (Monmouth Deeds 0:716).

Joseph married 19 Dec. 1782, Marlboro Dutch Church, Neeltje/Nelly/Eleanor, daughter of Jan Schenck and Neeltje Bennet, baptized 17 Feb. 1765, Marlboro, died 23 Nov. 1833, aged 73.8.20, buried at Old Brick Church with her husband. In 1844 Joseph's surviving heirs (\*) gave receipts to his son William, administrator, for their share of his estate (Monmouth M:410-14).

#### APPENDIX I

It has been generally thought that the twin daughters, Nancy and Sally, of John Van Cleave (No. 103) left no descendants as they were either killed or captured by the Indians in their attack on the family at Bullskin Creek, Kentucky, in 1781. Mr. Edward S. Harvey, an authority on the family, in his article in the <u>Indiana Magazine of History</u> in 1938 (34:495) stated, "further record of Sally has not been found; nothing known about Nancy after her capture by the Indians." In the account of the family by James William Van Cleave (written after his death in 1905 by his nephew Errett Van Cleave in 1946) it was said (p. 14), "Polly was carrying one of the twins, Sally, when she was taken prisoner . . . a party of horsemen from Boonesboro made a dash on the Indians . . . and rescued the prisoners. Nancy . . . was carried away by the Indiams. They saw her no more, never learned her fate . . . " But neither said anything further as to Sally or Sarah.

In October 1975 the writer had an inquiry from Mrs. Wilfred L. Bowles, of Bowen, Ill., stating that her husband was descended from Edward McPike and his wife Sarah, born 14 March 1780, a date established by a photocopy of the Edward McPike Bible. That she had been born Sarah Vancleve was established by publication of the McPike Family Record in "The Schuylerite" (1:43, Spring 1972) sponsored by the Schuyler-Brown Historical & Genealogical Society in Rushville, Ill., giving a complete list of her six sons and six daughters with their birth dates and some dates of death from a family record of Margaret Walker on two sheets of writing paper, data which corresponds to that in the Bible. Among the children were Mary, John, Aaron, and Rachel, also the names of the Van Cleave grandparents and great grandparents.

To identify Sarah Van Cleve McPike with the Sally rescued from the Indians there is also a photocopy of a letter written in

the 1930s by Evadna T. McPike to a first cousin, both granddaughters of William F. McPike, a grandson of Edward and Sarah (Van Cleve) McPike, reading in part, "I just learned a bit of family history last week. You probably know it. Aunt Jennie said grandpa said - his grandmother, Sarah Van Cleve McPike, I suppose, was taken by the Indians when a child after they had killed her mother. Later her brothers went and took her from the Indians. Aunt Eva says she remembers it too - that is that Grandpa had told them." Although details vary, this is essentially the same story told by James William Van Cleave. That Edward and Sarah (Van Cleve) Mc-Pike lived in Shelby County, Kentucky, and later in Campbellsburg (now Henry County, formed from Shelby County 1799) where they both died together of a plague in 1830 (confirmed by the Bible and cited family record), has been established by the McPike descendants.

It is therefore concluded that the Sarah Van Cleve who maried Edward McPike in 1801 was the same as the Sally Van Cleave rescued from capture by the Indians in the settlement of Kentucky, both from data given by McPike descendants, and the fact that there was no other Sarah/Sally Van Cleave/Cleve of the right age in that area with whom she can be identified.

### APPENDIX II

The actual dates of settlement in Kentucky of the Van Cleave brothers, John, Benjamin, William, Aaron, and Ralph, sons of Aaron No. 33 of Rowan County, North Carolina, are still open to question. The writer has always believed it was some time after 1778 when they were all listed on the Rowan County tax rolls but now realizes that this is not conclusive proof that all were still living there then. In the case of Ralph, born 1747, there are serious doubts that he was in North Carolina in both 1768 and 1778, when he was listed as taxed, as it is known that he studied for the ministry at Princeton, New Jersey, and that he remained in the north for some time, possibly not settling in Kentucky until about 1785. Considering his age in 1768, it is more likely he was studying at Princeton then.

Mr. J. Wallace Van Cleave has found in "The Certificate Book" published 1923 in the <u>Kentucky Mistorical Society Register</u>, vol. 21, proceedings of a commission which began hearing 13 October 1779 to establish pioneer land claims, wherein they had to prove actual settlement of the properties prior to that date. Squire Boone (see No. 108), brother-in-law of the Van Cleave brothers, testified that in 1776 Benjamin Van Cleve was improving his land on Clear Creek, later in Shelby County, Kentucky, and raising a crop of corn on it; also that Aaron was doing the same in 1776 with his land claim on Bullskin Creek. Similar testimony was offered to show that William was improving his land on Paint Lick Creek in 1777.

Mr. Van Cleave has further pointed out that, whatever the amount of land claimed, all the pioneer settler had to do was to clear one acre, plant and harvest a crop on it to substantiate his claim. And, despite the Indian troubles in Kentucky which lasted at least five years beyond 1776, presumably the three Van Cleaves were able to do that while still legal residents of Rowan County, where most likely their wives and children remained until it was deemed safe to bring them to Aentucky.
