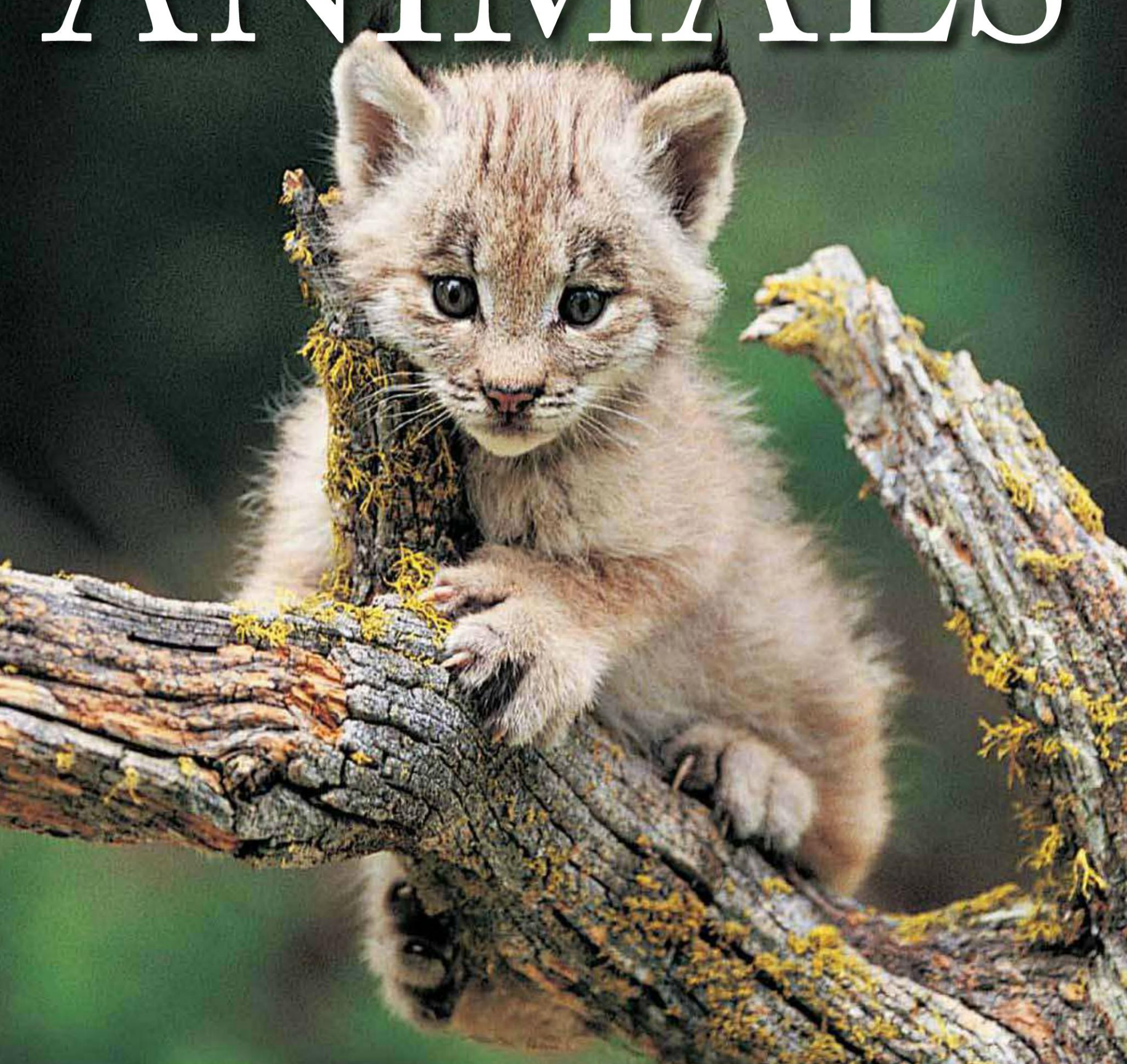

But some baby animals would rather hide way up high in the trees.



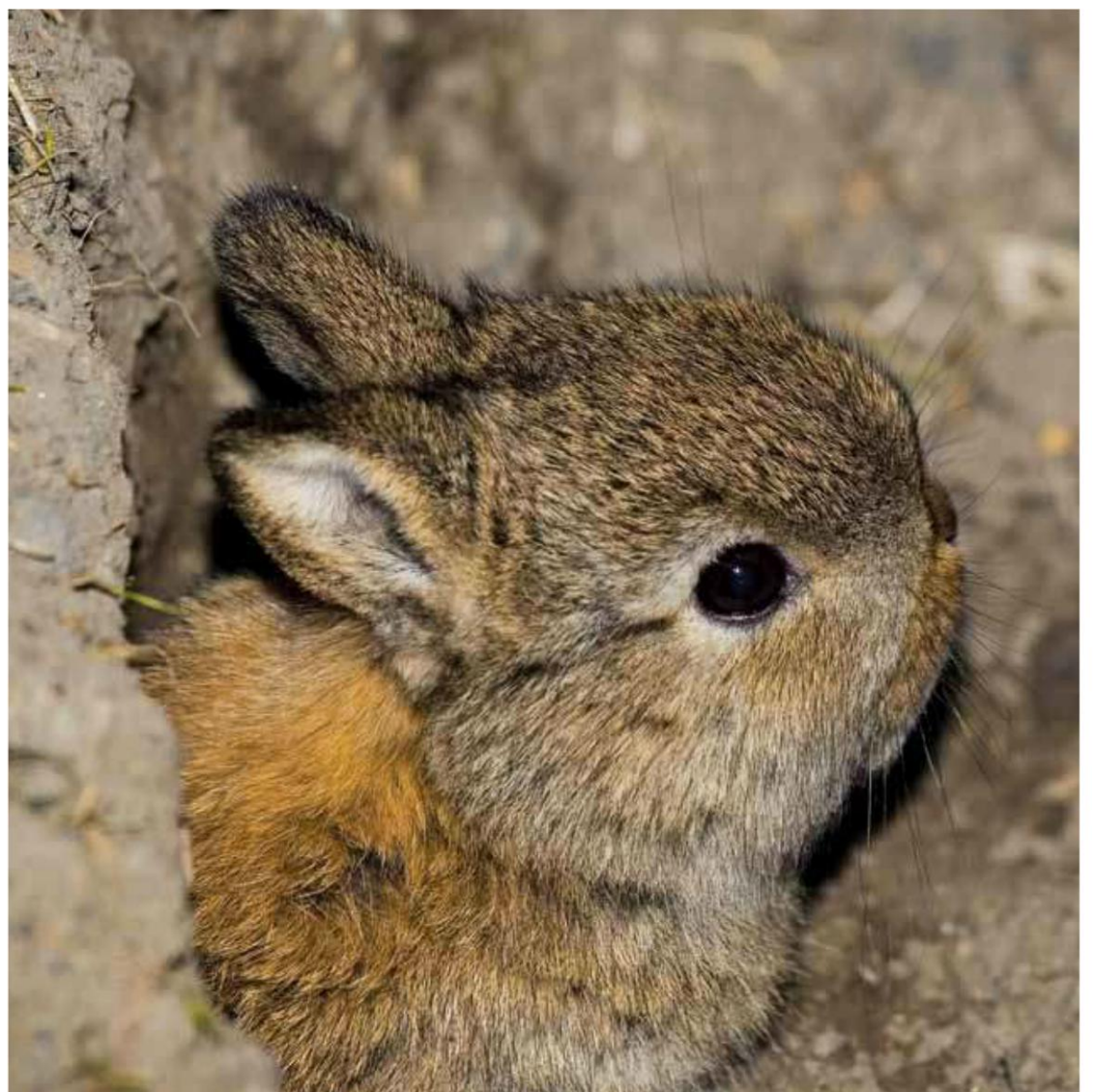
These baby foxes

inside an old log.







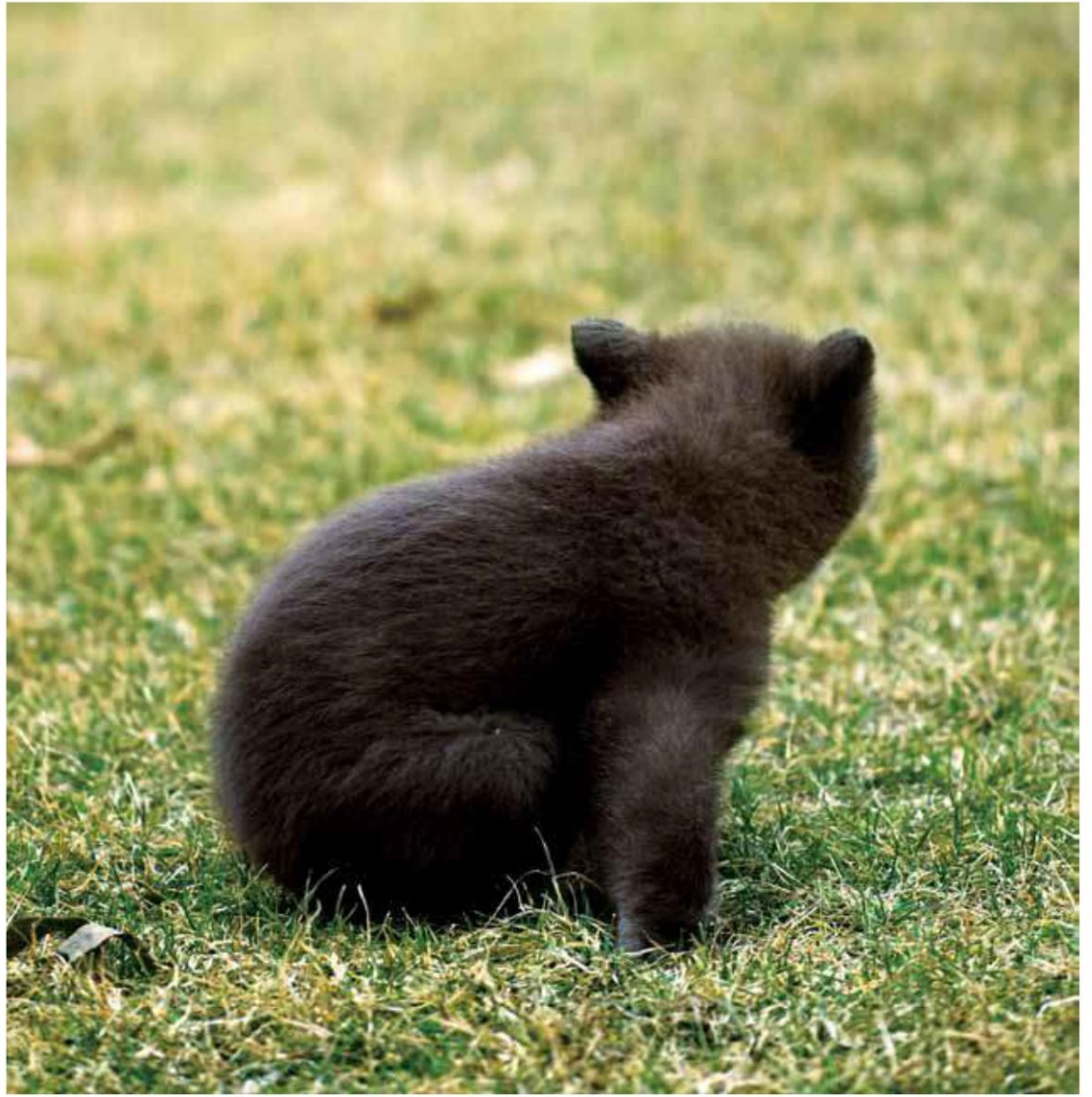
When baby bunnies need to hide, they can hop into their holes.



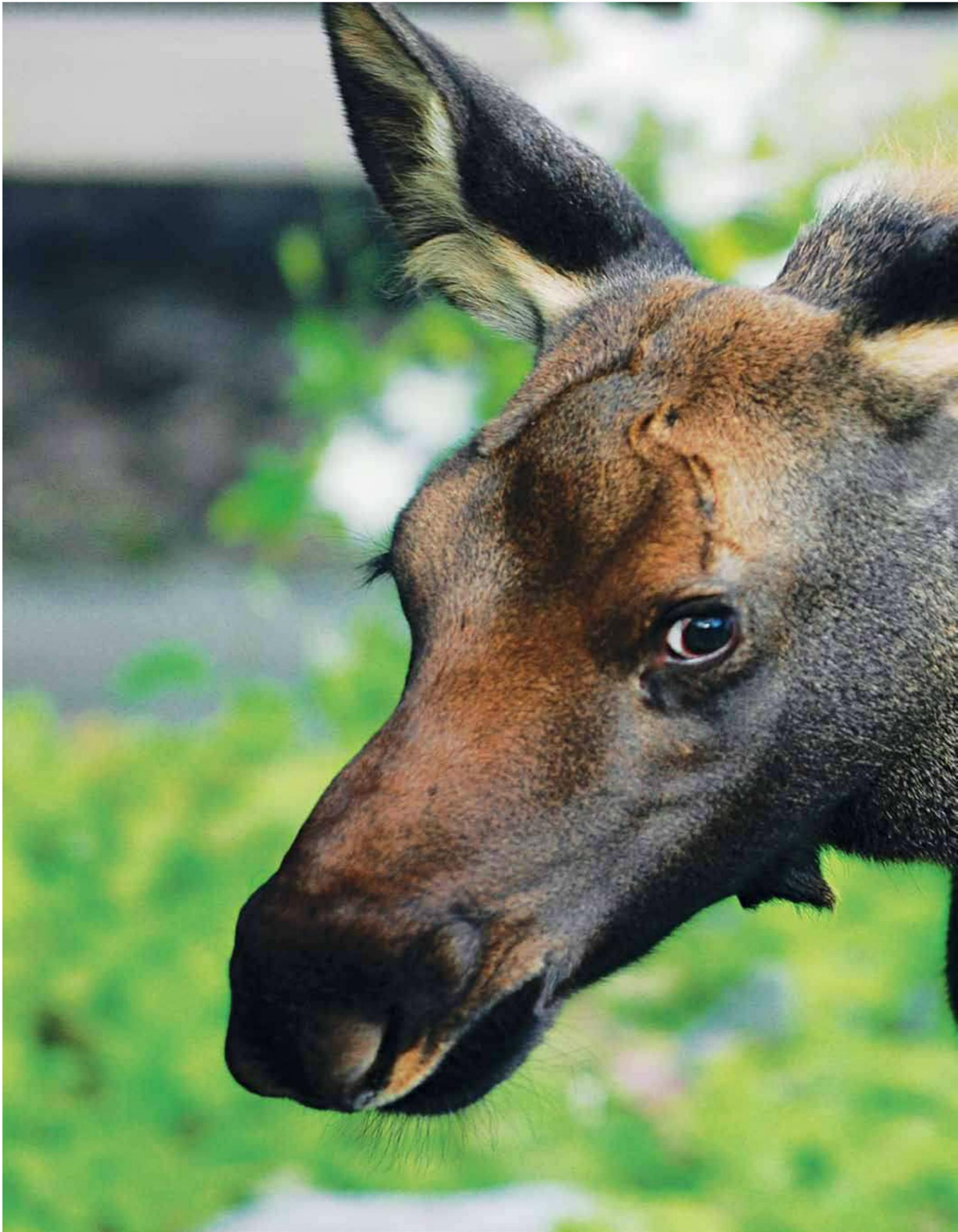


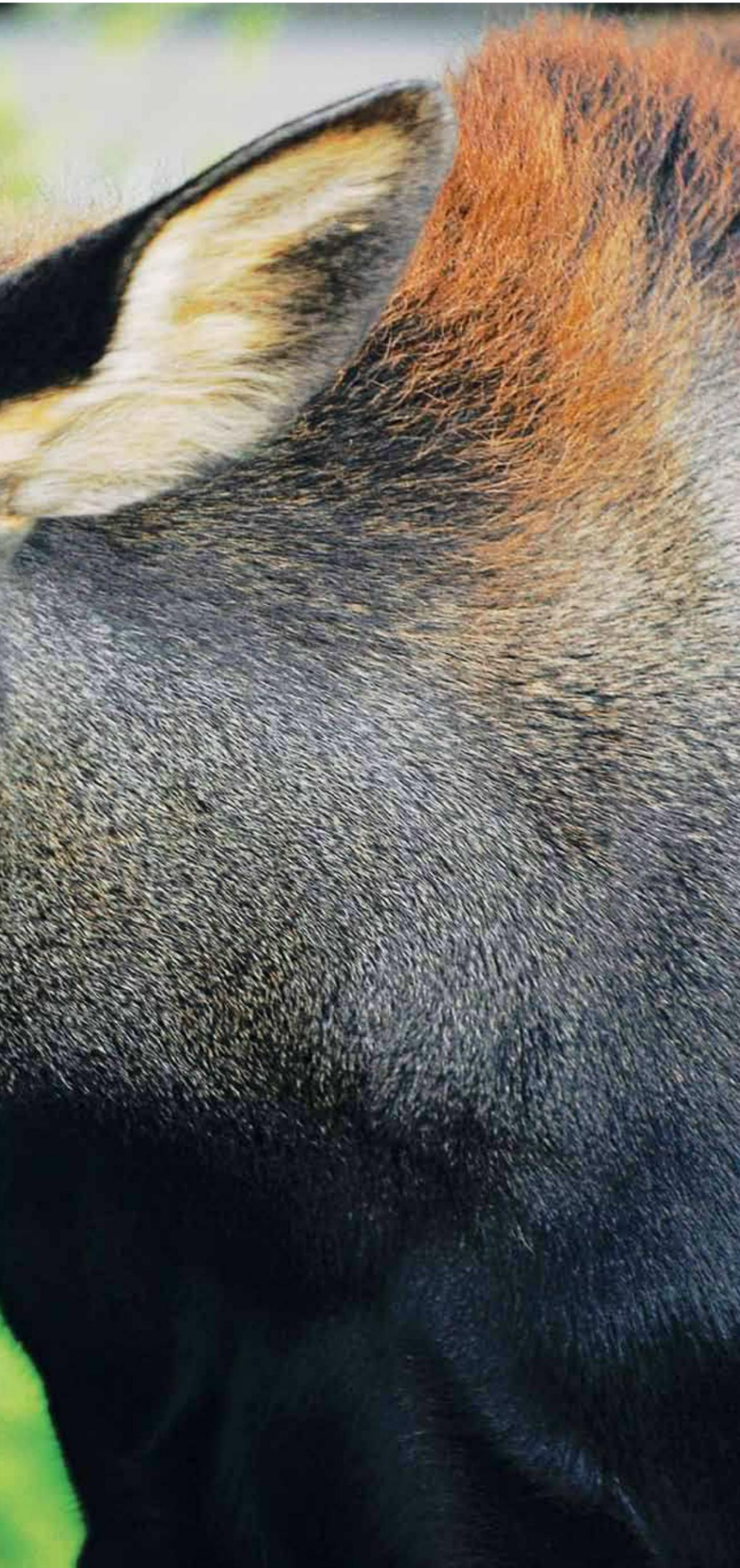


Many baby animals are good at hiding, because they are so little.



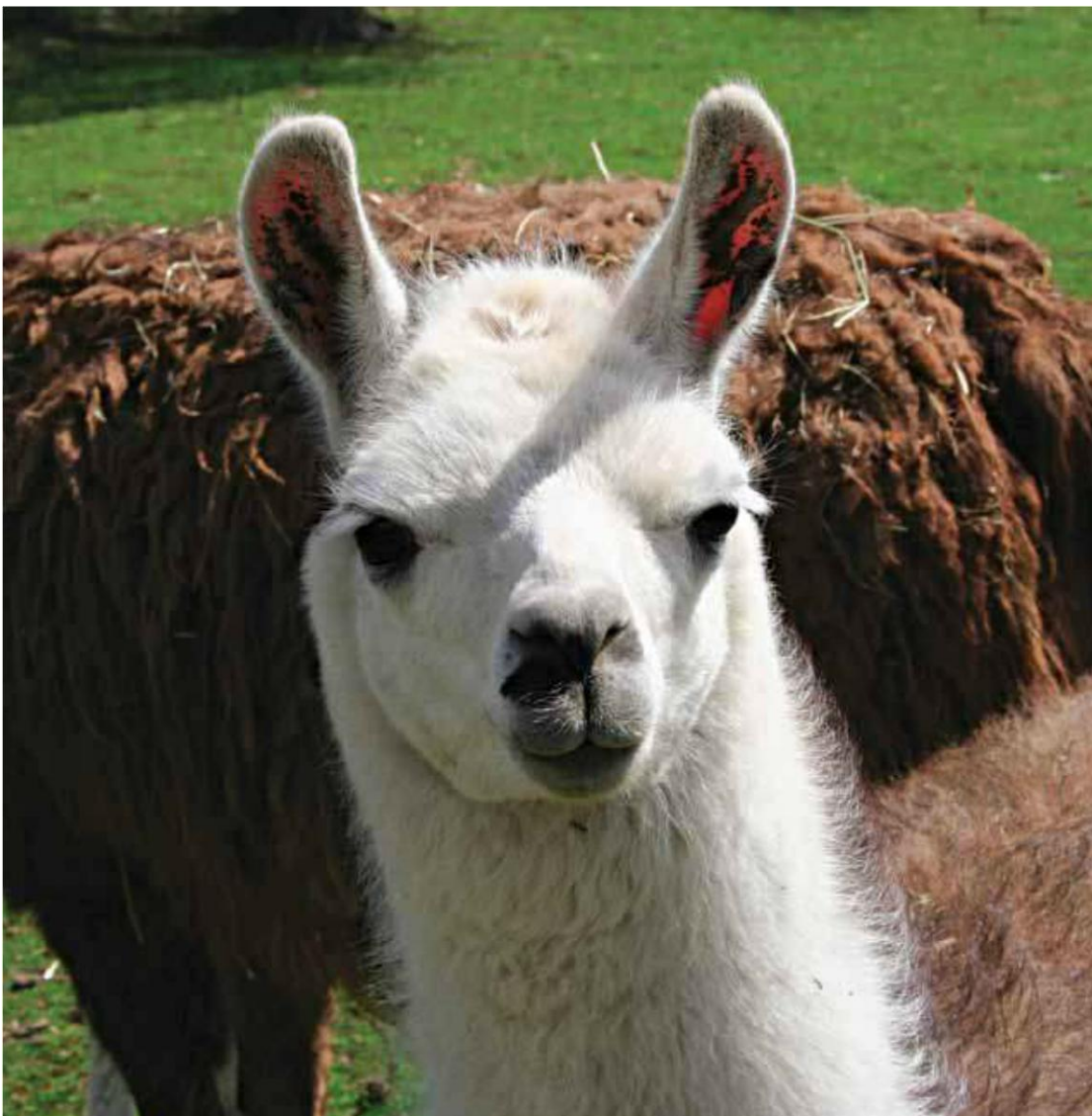
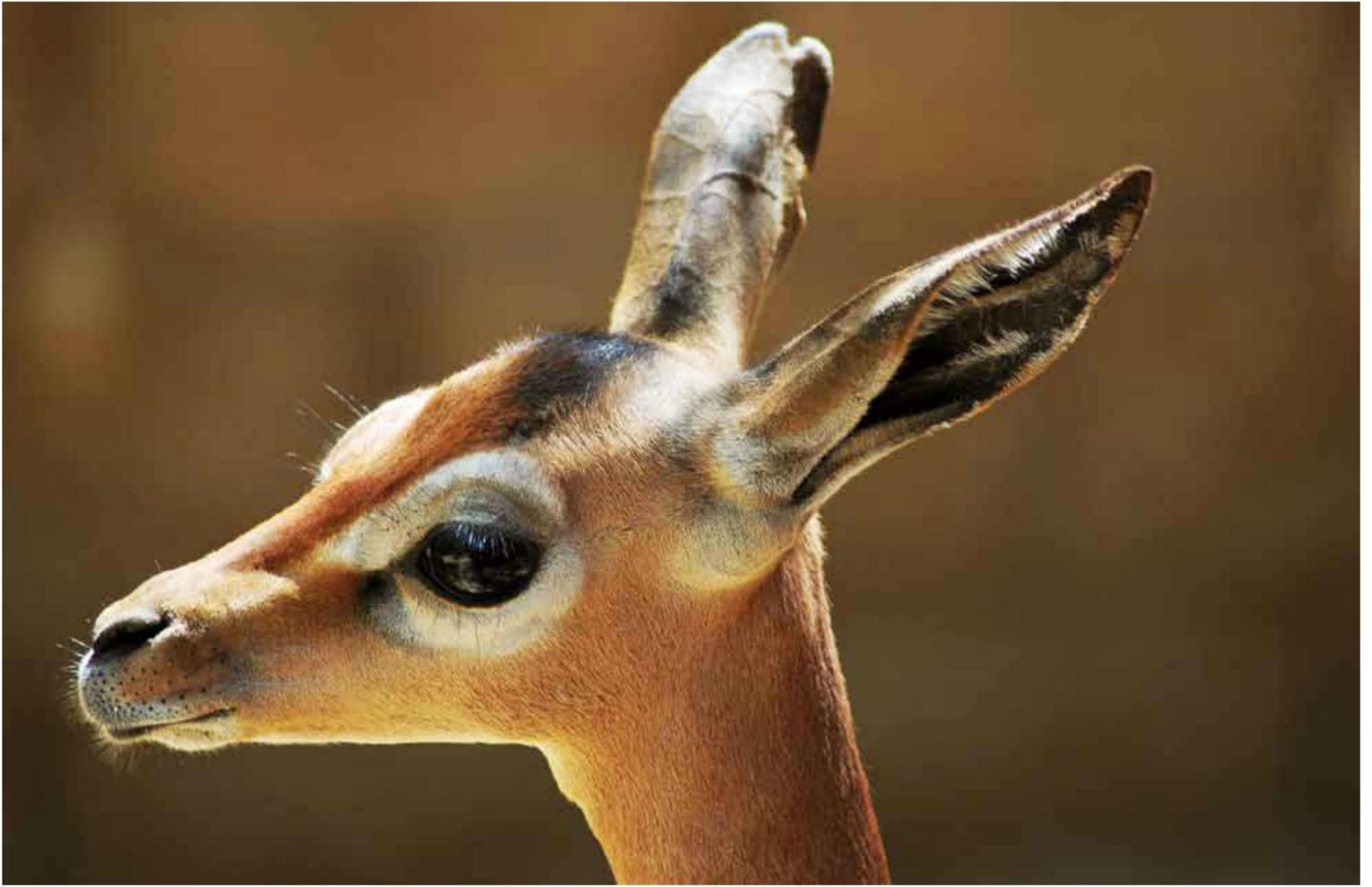






This baby moose

on his long legs.



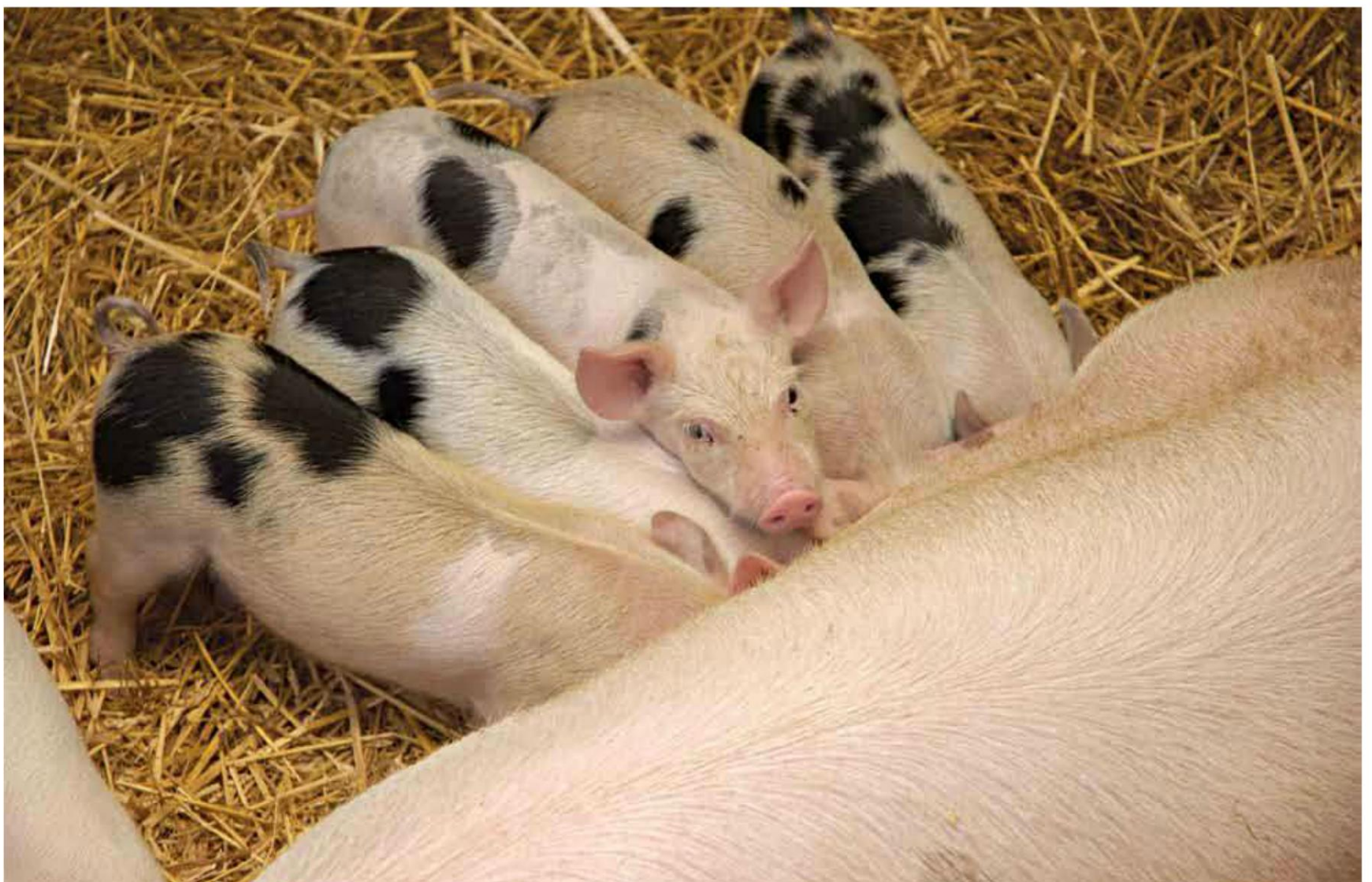


Foals, baby antelopes, and baby alpacas have long legs for running, too.

“egg tooth!”



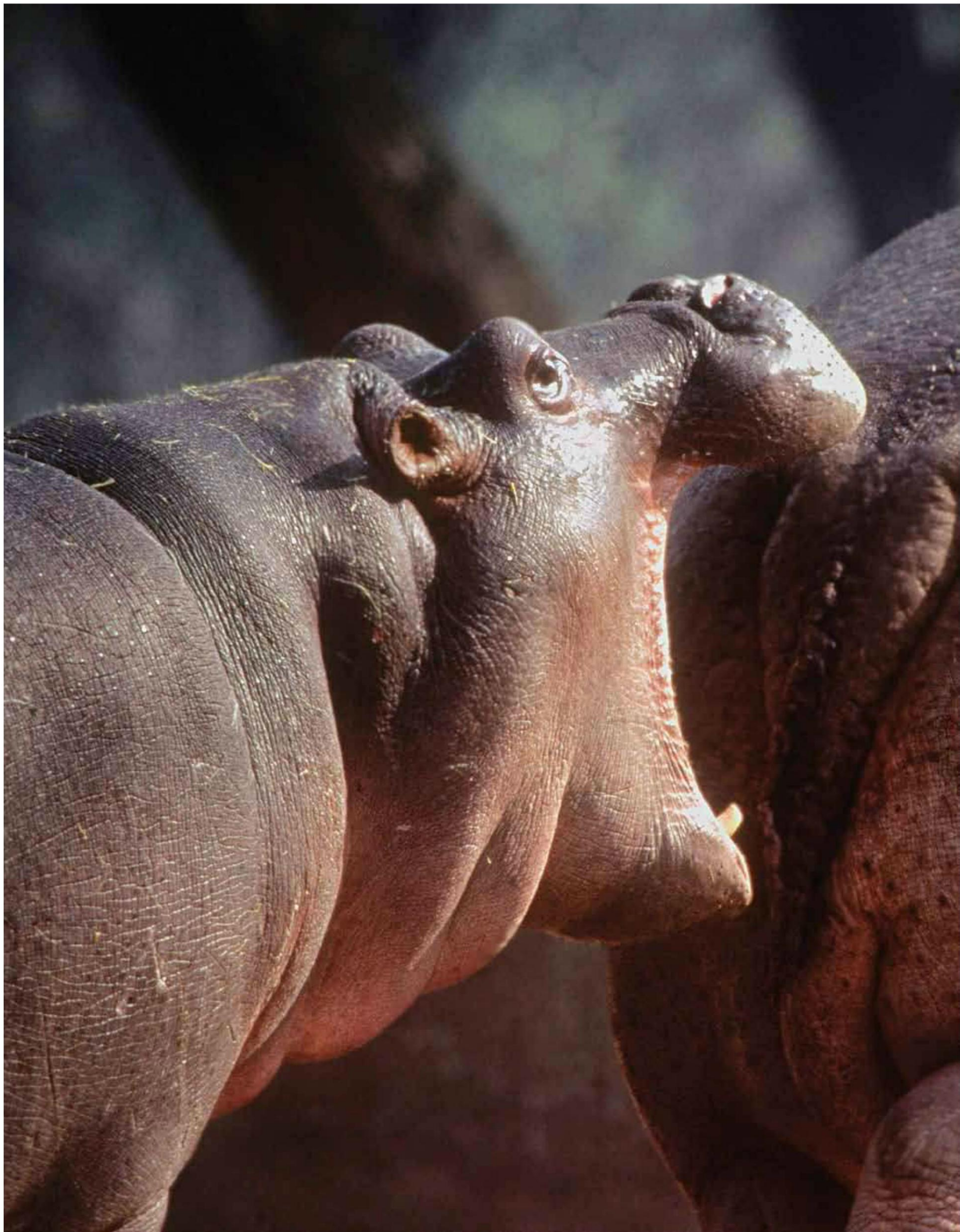






Water dragons,

up to?



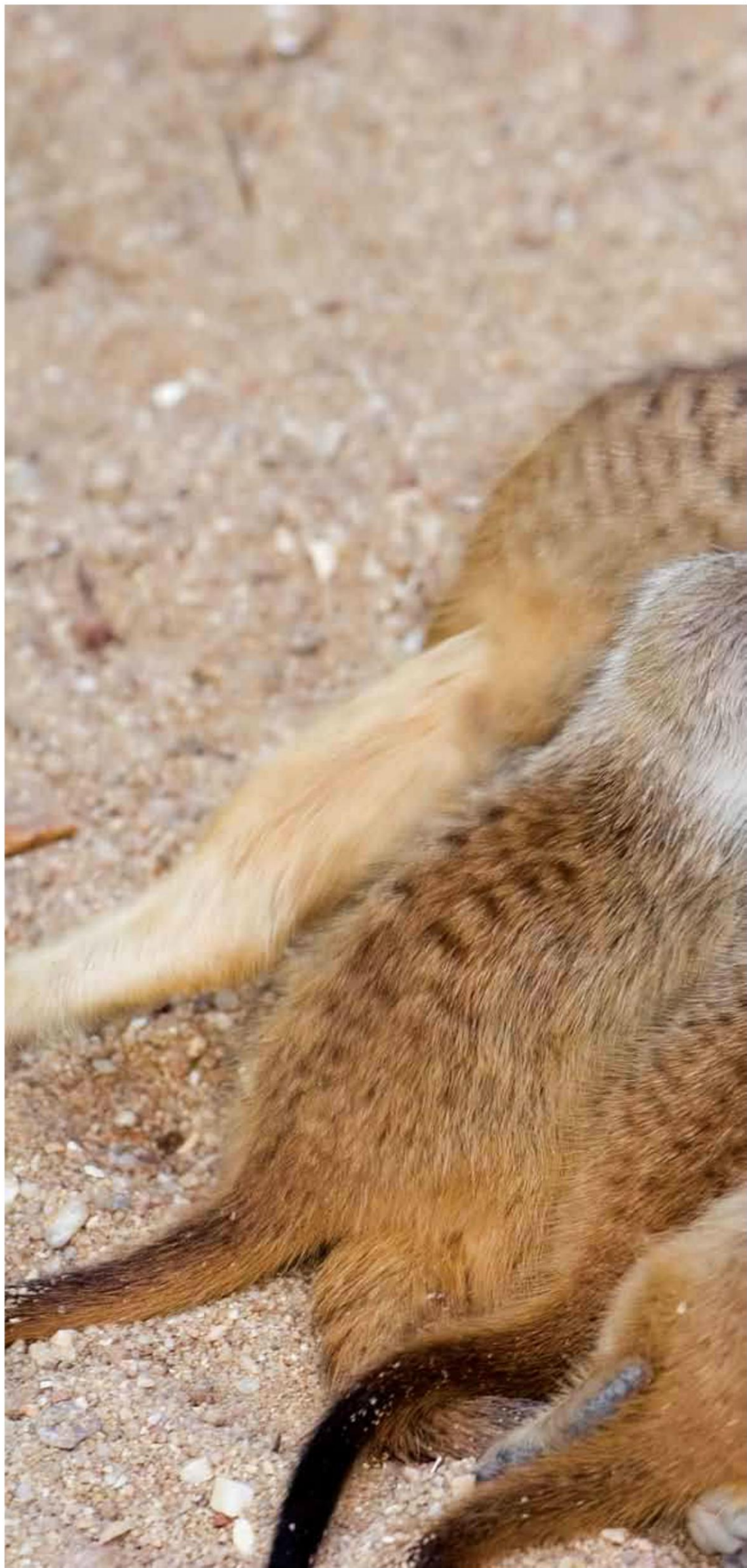


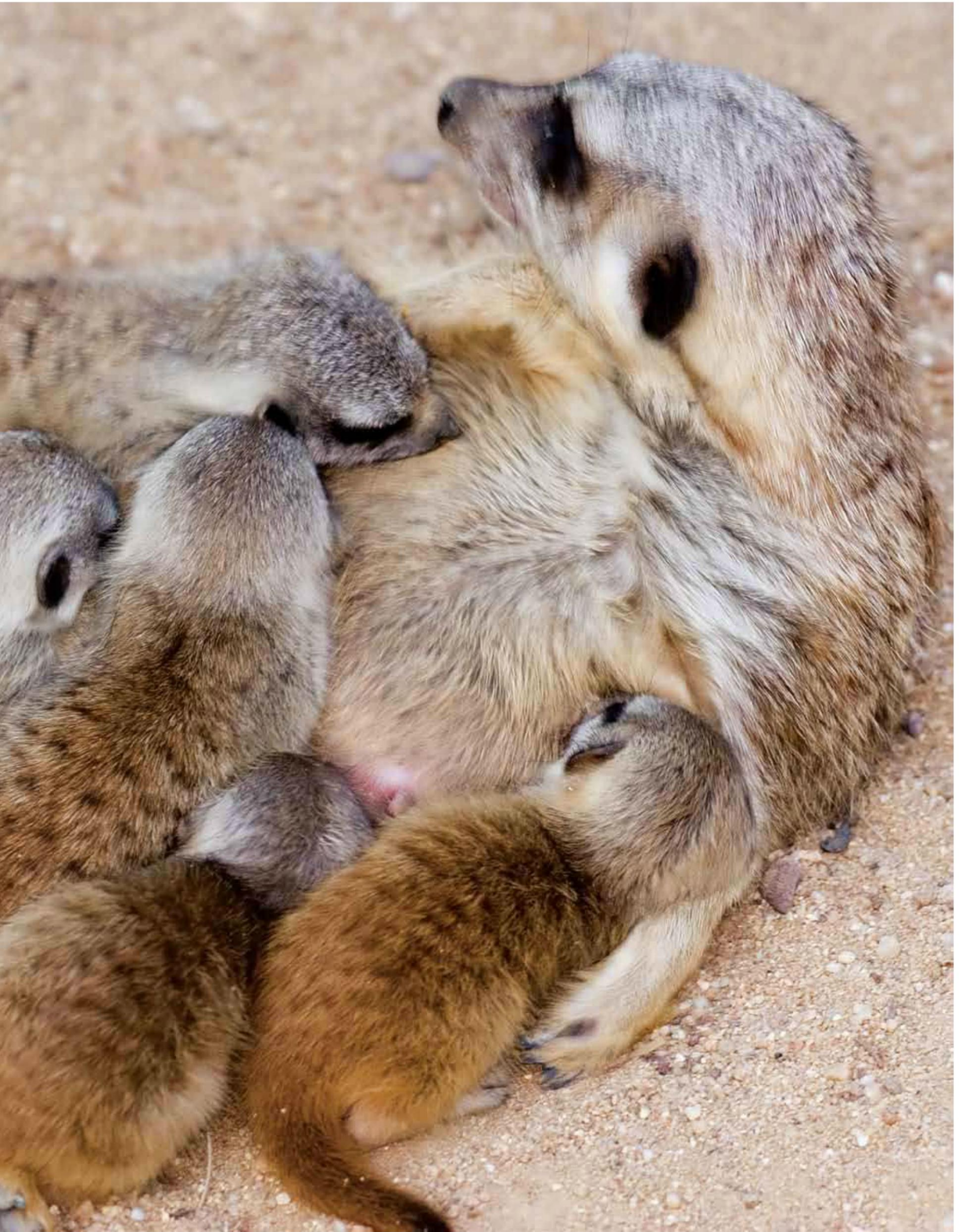
Giraffes, spider monkeys, and zebras usually have only one baby at a time.



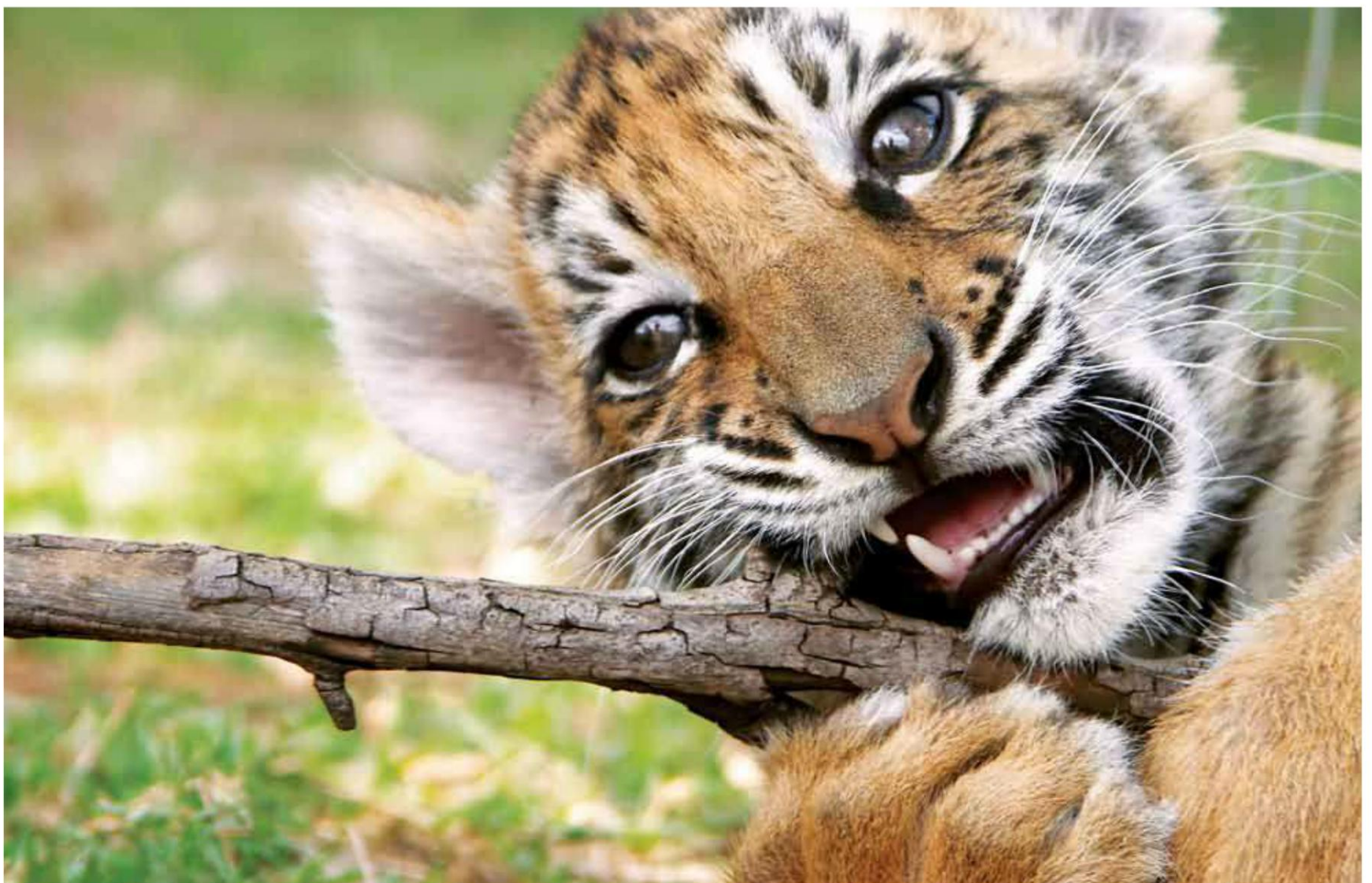

very, very busy!



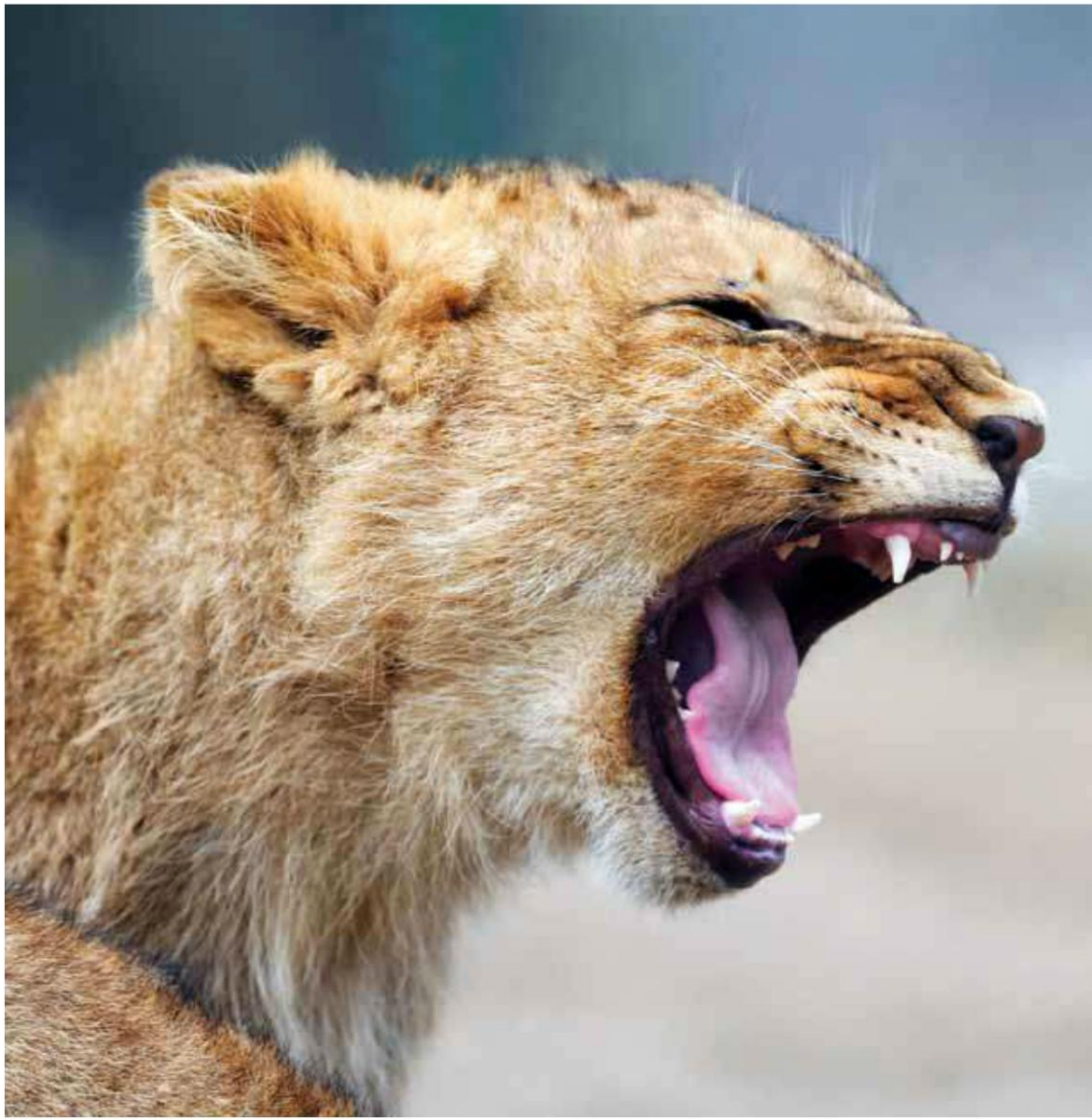


All baby animals like to play, but soon they come back to snuggle. Just like this ring-tailed lemur...
